

ENQUIRY FINISHED.

Mr. Arthur Robinson Denies that he Violated the Game Law in 1908.

MR. GREGORY DOES NOT THINK THAT UNCLE HARRY RECEIVED A SQUARE DEAL.

On Wednesday morning, the inquiry into the alleged violation of the game law by Mr. Arthur Robinson was continued. The witness, Mr. Gregory, testified that he was the means of having Mr. Robinson fired some time ago for having in his possession a moose. The witness told about finding the skeleton of a moose at Jack Lake early last year. The bones were bleached and it was his opinion that they had been there all winter. Witness visited Jack Lake on July 12th last, and could detect no odor from the two moose skeletons in that vicinity. The witness was next called upon to give expert testimony in regard to the mushroomed bullet put in evidence by Mr. Braithwaite. He thought the bullet had struck some kind of a smooth surface. He did not think that it had passed through the body of a moose. The witness was next asked if he heard Mr. Braithwaite make a statement reflecting on Mr. Arthur Robinson in the presence of the late Deputy Surveyor General Flewelling. Mr. Gregory objected, and the Surveyor General, although he had previously stated that the investigation was not to go back farther than the year 1908, allowed the question. The witness said that he had heard Mr. Braithwaite say that either he or Mr. Robinson would have to get out of the country. The witness disagreed with Mr. Braithwaite's testimony that the carcass of a moose shot in warm weather decomposed rapidly. To Mr. Gregory, the witness said he had heard Mr. Braithwaite make the statement to Mr. Flewelling in July, 1907. The witness went on to say that he had seen the remains of two moose on the shore of Jack Lake. It was pointed out to him that his description of the location of one of them was at variance with the testimony of Hon. Mr. McLeod and Mr. Braithwaite. His explanation of this was they may have seen a different moose from the one he saw. Mr. Gregory read from the evidence of Hon. Mr. McLeod, and the witness thought that he was wrong in regard to the location of one of the moose. The witness said that when Mr. Braithwaite made the statement to Mr. Flewelling he (Braithwaite) was then in Mr. Robinson's employ. To Mr. Powell, witness said that many sportsmen and fishermen visited Jack Lake during the summer season. (Continued on first page.)

TESTIMONY CONCLUDED.

MR. JOHN ROBINSON, of Newcastle, testified Wednesday forenoon. Mr. Lawlor started in to question him in regard to a statement in a letter alleged to have been written by Mr. Braithwaite, in which it was stated that "Jack Robinson was fixed." Mr. Gregory objected to the question on the ground that it was not relative to the enquiry, and related to matter that had been introduced by the other side. After rather a warm brush between the Surveyor General and Mr. Gregory, it was announced that the question would be admitted. Mr. Robinson denied that he had ever been bribed by either Mr. Robinson or Mr. Braithwaite. When he visited Mr. Robinson's camp in July, 1907, to investigate a moose killing case, he was told by Mr. Robinson to do his duty, and he would abide by the consequences. It

BECH FAMILY IN NORTHERN WILDS.

Many marvellous things have been performed by the Bech family in the northern regions of Canada. Explorers have suffered from lack of food and endurance, in trying to solve the mystery of the north and made a considerable journey through the trackless wilderness. Last winter two women crossed from Hudson Bay to Winnipeg, a distance of some seven hundred miles. Mrs. Ray and her three children, accompanied by a corps of guides and half a dozen dog teams, crossed from York Factory to Lake Winnipeg. A much greater performance was that of Mrs. Bech, who, accompanied only by her husband and son, with two dog teams, crossed from Fort Churchill to Winnipeg. Fort Churchill is farther north, the distance to Winnipeg greater, and there was no corps of trained guides to insure the party's safety. This ninety day trip made by the Bech family must ever be memorable in the annals of Canadian travel.

This performance, by the first white family to travel by dog train from Fort Churchill to Winnipeg through eleven hundred miles of wilderness, is made all the more remarkable when the ages of two members are considered. Mrs. Bech is 56 years of age, and her husband is 60. For a couple so great a journey was certainly a hazardous experiment. The Hudson Bay officials believed that the successful accomplishment of the enterprise was exceedingly doubtful, and could provide them with guides only as far as the Nelson river.

The Bech family left their home on the east side of Churchill river on Dec. 10, 1907. It took them seven days to accomplish the journey along the coast from the mouth of the Churchill to the mouth of the Nelson. When they arrived at the latter river they found it free of ice, and as no boats were available they were forced to wait until the ice had formed. The Nelson river is a wonderful river, draining as it does almost the whole of the vast district between Hudson Bay and the Rocky Mountains. Its current is strong and the volume of water passing down is enormous. At its mouth it is fourteen miles wide.

During this wait at the Nelson river, which lasted twenty-three days, the Bech family were located in a rough shanty on the bank of the river, which they shared with five Indian families. They had only such provisions as they brought with them and the food for the dogs had become exhausted. During the whole of this tedious three weeks the dogs had not a bite to eat. When at last the river froze and a crossing was effected, the dogs were scarcely able to draw the loads over the ice. After the crossing, an Indian chanced along with scant provisions and relieved the situation for a few days. He and Mr. Bech started off on a hunting trip which lasted nine days, but not a deer, rabbit or game of any kind was sighted. Eventually, however, the party managed to reach York Factory. Here they fared a little better, but it was not possible to obtain a candle, a can of condensed milk or a bit of butter. All supplies at Fort Churchill and York Factory are controlled by the Hudson Bay Co., and it is not the policy of that great company to encourage the invasion of its territory by independent persons.

Medicine Hat Game Trade.

Reports from the Medicine Hat district give an excellent account of the conditions of the cattle trade there. The season is described as the best that has ever been experienced. The past winter was so mild that the stock lost little weight, and picked up very rapidly in the ensuing spring. Shipments will in consequence be marketed much earlier than last year, and the beef will present a much better appearance. Prices are high, and great satisfaction prevails among the cattlemen. Few if any cattle will go from the district to Chicago this year. Last season over half the output went to that market. This fact may have had some influence on the increased prices offered by Canadian buyers, and also on the more encouraging treatment now enjoyed by shippers.

CARE OF MONUMENTS.

Much Needed Step Is Being Taken by Ontario Office Regarding Relics.

The Historiographer of the Education Department of Ontario has issued a circular which is being sent out to the historical societies in the Dominion, asking for more complete information as to statues and monuments erected in Canada and illustrative of Canadian history. In connection with this movement it is interesting to note that The London Spectator, in its current issue, refers to a movement along similar line in Great Britain. It says:

"The appointment of a royal commission to make an inventory of the historical monuments best worth preserving in Britain is one of those tardy but welcome acts which, we hope, will eventually bring our system of caring for the relics of the past abreast of those of most western nations. France, Germany, Italy, and other countries are all ahead of us. The inventory which is ordered will, perhaps, be formed on the French model more than on any other, for the 'classement' of 'monuments historiques' is the feature of the French laws, which, however, are too highly centralized. The only objection we know of to the creation of a formal catalogue is, as we have pointed out before now, that by implication it sanctions a certain carelessness in the case of monuments not catalogued. The state, as it were, publicly withholds protection from objects not on its list; yet many of them, if they are near the dividing line, may be almost quite as well worth preservation as those which have been exalted to the honors of the catalogue. This danger may easily be exaggerated, and it could not become serious unless one is to assume a considerable lack of common-sense or the presence of ill-will somewhere. Indeed, if no other danger than this exists, it is obvious that there is an overwhelming case for the making of the inventory. We hope that it will be produced without delay, and will not err on the side of scantiness. The limitations will be strict enough in the nature of things, because no monument is to be considered which is dated later than 1700. We can think of a good many buildings later than 1700 which could not be removed without national disgrace, even if we look no further than some of the churches by Wren or founded on Wren's designs."
