THE ITALIAN HORROR.

Living Victims Dug Out of Ruins at Messina.

MORE EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS SATURDAY NIGHT.

MESSINA, Jan. 11.—(Special)—Search for the buried victims of Italy's great earthquake continues. Yesterday noon a man named Ben-saga, who had spent fourteen days without food, locked in the ruins of his home, was taken out unconscious and resuscitated. He had been caught in a kind of straight jacket, formed by the debris, and was unable to move, and was compelled to watch the lingering death of his wife and four children.

Saturday a married couple were removed from a natural tomb, not only living but conscious. Their imprisonment had lasted 13 days.

On Saturday night a terrific tempest, accompanied by earthquake shocks, arose, causing a number of fresh collapses in the ruined city, and spreading new terror among the survivors. Most of the people in Messina were camped under tents and huts, and nearly all of these

were destroyed by the wind and blinding rain.

Over 600 feet of the landing quays in the harbor was swept away, carrying off a large quantity of provisions, stored there, and several horses. Three soldiers narrowly escaped death.

Near Giarre an immense fissure opened. It was 650 feet long, three feet wide and sixty-five feet deep, and has been styled by the people "The mouth of hell."

The disinfecting of the city is progressing rapidly. Two depositaries connected by ferries have been established and disinfectants will be also transported along the Sicilian and Calabrian coasts for distribution in the inland villages. The illumination of the city by electric light has been practically re-established. The survivors of the city fathers will meet January 15, to elect new officials to replace those dead.

NORTH SHORE WEDDINGS.

In One Event a Chatham Alderman was the Bridegroom.

CHATHAM, N. B., Jan. 11.—(Special)—The Pro-Cathedral was the scene this morning of a ceremony in which two of Chatham's most popular young people were united in marriage.

The principals were Miss Esther L. Keoughan, daughter of Michael Keoughan, and Henry Morris. The bride looked very charming and was assisted by her sister, Miss Susie Keoughan, who was a very pretty bridesmaid. The groom was attended by his brother, Michael Morris. Nuptial mass was celebrated by Father O'Keefe, after which a wedding breakfast and reception was held at the home of the bride.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris, the hosts of friends who testified to their esteem in very tangible manner. The happy couple left on the 10.30 train this morning for St. John, Boston and New York. On their return they will reside on Wellington street.

A wedding of much interest to Chatham people took place this morning at Caraquet, when Miss B. M. Lynch and Ald. A. P. Williams of Chatham, were united in marriage. Both are well known in Chatham and other parts of the province, and have plenty of good wishes for future happiness. Miss Medley of St. John, and W. J. Moran of Chatham, were attendants.

LONGBOAT'S TRAINER.

Indian has Parted Company with Flannagan--
Next Race Jan. 26th at New York.

TORONTO, Jan. 11.—(Special)—Tom Flannagan returned home from New York yesterday where he went to train Longboat, for his race with Alfred Shrubbs in Madison Square Garden on January 26th.

His return was unexpected and the news he has brought back is cyclonic. He has severed his connection with the Indian and is no longer his manager or partner in the running games.

The breaking of the tie was a sad parting but the two Toms parted on

the best of terms. The Indian presented Flannagan with a souvenir pin an Indian's head, remarking "you are a fine fellow, and I'll always remember you."

He left him in the hands of P. T. Powers, and his contract calls for 50 per cent of all takings, an even split with Powers who pays all bills and looks after the training and pulling off of races, everything but the running.

The first race under the new management will be against Shrubbs at Madison Square, January 26th.

ST. JOHN, Jan. 11.—(Special)—Edna Goospeed, the young forger, who favored five years in Kingston to one in the home of the Good Shepherd here, was today sentenced by Judge Forbes to one year in the Salvation Army Rescue home.

She accepted this without objection. Edna will be allowed out doors only when accompanied by an army officer.

DR. PUGSLEY'S MISSION

Minister Speaks Hopefully of Early Settlement of Canada's Disputes with the United States.

He spent a week at Washington.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—That the treaties between Canada and the United States designed to settle satisfactorily all outstanding questions relative to international boundaries and fisheries, are in a fair way to conclusion is the assurance which Hon. Dr. Pugsley brings back from Washington. The minister of public works spent a week in the United States capital in conference with the government regarding details of the treaties which required certain adjustments and returned to Ottawa on Saturday.

The minister in an interview with The Telegraph correspondent said that his visit to Washington had been a pleasant one. "I was impressed," he said, "with the disposition evinced by Mr. Root, the secretary of state, and other influential men, to promote the most amicable and friendly relations between the two countries, by removing all causes of friction."

"There are several questions," said Dr. Pugsley in answer to a further question. "There is the fisheries question, which it has practically been agreed to submit to the Hague tribunal; the adjustment of certain indemnity claims on both sides, and most important of all, the question of the boundaries through interna-

tional waters." Asked as to the scope of the St. John River commission the minister replied: "The commission has been appointed to consider the question of obstruction in the St. John river at Van Buren and generally to report on questions which relate to the river, where it forms the international boundary between New Brunswick and the State of Maine."

"It is expected that the commission will after investigating the subject carefully report as to what means may best be adopted in order to preserve the river and prevent interference with the flotation of logs down the St. John."

"It is not unlikely that the commission will deal also with the erection of storage dams on the tributaries of the river in order to store large quantities of water so as to equalize the flow during the dry season."

"The government has appointed two practical commissioners (Messrs. Barnhill and Keefe of St. John) and it is expected that the United States government will do the same. The four commissioners will take up the whole question pretty soon."

To the prime minister Dr. Pugsley will likely report to-day, the result of his negotiations.

NOVEL SCOTT ACT CASE.

I. C. R. Station Agent Being Prosecuted Against for Storing Liquor.

The case against Mr. R. Z. Walker, station agent of the I. C. R., charged with receiving and storing liquor was taken up in the police court this morning and at the request of Mr. Peter J. Hughes, counsel for the defendant, was stood over until afternoon. Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., appeared for the prosecution and Mr. E. H. McAlpine, K. C., of St. John, agent for the Department of Justice was present in court but took no part in the proceedings. When the case was resumed this afternoon Policeman Foss was called to the stand and told of serving the search warrant upon acting Station Agent Swift and making the seizure. The case is the first of its kind taken up since the amendment to the Scott Act was adopted at the last session of parliament, and considerable interest attaches to it. In all probability it will eventually find its way to the Supreme Court. In the meantime the liquor seized at the I. C. R. station remains locked up in a cell at the police station.

HEAVY LOSS OF LIFE.

Swiss Church Collapsed Burying Worshipers in Ruins.

BERNE, Switzerland, Jan. 11.—During divine service yesterday an ancient church near Sign suddenly collapsed, burying the worshipers in the ruins. Practically all the members of the congregation were killed or injured.

The wildest panic prevailed, those who escaped rushing through the fields, shouting that an earthquake had overtaken the village. Other villagers joined in the outcry, and were with difficulty calmed.

After an hour's exertions, the fire company of the place extricated forty corpses, but it is believed that there is still a number under the timbers. Sixty persons were badly injured. The collapse of the church was caused by the time-worn pillars in the underground crypt giving way.
