BIG OFFER COMING?

Canada About to Give Money to Defence, Says Rumor.

ADMIRALTY IS GIVING WAY

According to a Report Current in London Canada Is Going to Give Money For Improvement of Defence — Idea of Local Navies Finds More Favor With the Lords of the British Fleet.

London, June 12.—(C.A.P. Cable).—It is stated here that the Canadian Government is contemplating a "very generous financial offer to the Imperial Government," to be expended on naval defence in such a way as may be decided by the Imperial Defence Conference.

Balfour's speech has encouraged Canada to believe it possible to come to an agreement with the Imperial Government on lines of an autonomous local navy, working in harmony with the Admiralty. It is added that the Admiralty is now less inclined to oppose the formation of local navies than was the case.

"Omens are favorable, therefore, for an agreement between the Dominion Government and the Admiralty on the lines of their present proposals," is the statement made.

The week's brilliant functions in connection with the Imperial Press Conference reached a climax last night with the Government's dinner. Earl Crewe presided. Premier Asquith, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Col. Seeley, Lord Cromer, Lord Northcote and other distinguished men were present. The Premier proposed the toast to the guests. He claimed there ought to be in a sense a partnership between Governments and the press. It was the duty of an Imperial press to promote in highest forms, for its worthiest purposes, the spirit of Imperial unity. He referred to the one voice and settled conviction where-with the statesmen of both parties had dealt with the question of Imperial defence.

Mr. Langlois of Montreal first responded. Speaking for two and a quarter millions of French-Canadians, he declared that in all crises Quebec would stand by the Empire. There would be no discordant voice. Should the occasion arise, Canada would be united as a mighty whole to defend the common cause.

French-Canadians were proud of the British flag, which floated over a peaceful and contented people in Quebec.

Speaking in French he expressed pleasure at the entente cordiale. French-Canadians were grateful to Britain for safeguarding their religion, customs and liberties. He recalled with pride that in the dark days of 1812 French-Canadians had saved Canada. What they did then they could be relied on to do in the future. Cunningham Fenwick responded for Australasia.

Lord Crewe said the Home Government would meet the overseas representatives as equals and allies. Nothing could be further from the Minister's thoughts than to dictate to them any policy or act. He thought the International Press Conference would have effects as far-reaching and beneficial as any conference that had been, or would be, held.

The St. Petersburg Novoe Vremya, exalting British Imperial policy as demonstrated in the Imperial Press Conference, exclaims, "How great will be the might of the Empire if the policy initiated by Chamberlain has already yielded such astonishing fruit." Other newspapers join in the apotheosis to British Imperialism.

G.T.P. Passenger Train. Winnipeg, Man., June 12.—The first regular passenger train service on the Grand Trunk Pacific will be inaugurated June 14 between Winnipeg and Scott, Sask., 560 miles, to be extended as the roadbed is completed. It is expected that the service will be extended to the foothills of the Rocky Mountains this autumn, and to Fort William and Port Arthur, giving a continuous completed line of about 1,500 miles west from Lake Superior, besides the section built eastwardly from Prince Rupert. Settlers are rapidly taking up land along the line.

Prompter Trade Reports. Ottawa, June 12.—F. C. T. O'Hara, Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce, has decided upon a radical move in respect to the manner of issuing the annual report of the Department. Commencing with the report of 1909, it will be issued in seven parts. In this way the most important features of the trade statistics of Canada will not have to be held back until the completion of the other statistics. By adopting this system the Department hopes to present the principal details of the trade of Canada in much shorter time.

Western Counties Want Asylum. Chatham, June 12.—Yesterday afternoon the County Council unanimously passed a resolution asking the counties of Essex, Middlesex, Elin and Lambton to co-operate with Kent in building an insane asylum, centrally located in the western peninsula, to take care of the many lunatics which at present have to be taken care of in the local jails because the Government asylums have no room.

\$12,500 For Dislocated Spine. Welland, June 12.—Lafayette Upthegrove, of Port Colborne, has been awarded \$12,500 damages against the Great Western Railroad by an Iowa court for injuries received in an accident on Sept. 5, 1907, when he was brakeman on the road. He suffered a rotary dislocation of the spine, permanently disabling him.

A Million Dollar Scheme. Winnipeg, June 12.—It is rumored that the Dominion Government have plans for opening navigation at a cost of less than a million dollars between North Dakota and Europe, via the Red River, Lake Winnipeg and Hudson Bay.

FIRST FORESTRY DEGREE.

University of Toronto Convocation Celebrates Notable Event.

Toronto, June 12.—The annual commencement exercises of Toronto University were held in convocation hall yesterday afternoon.

Among those on the platform were Dr. Hoskin, Prof. Goldwin Smith, Principal Gaudier, Dean Fernow, Provost Macklem, Principal Hutton, Dr. Kennedy, Dr. Reeve, Dr. Ham, Mr. Justice McLaren, Dr. King, Dean Galbraith and Prof. Ramsay Wright.

Two hundred and eight new B.A.'s were accepted, 50 M.A.'s, 87 M.B.'s, 62 B.A., Sc., 36 Ph.D., 10 V.S., and 24 B.A.

Sir Charles Moss, in presenting Z. A. Lash, K.C., for the degree of LL.D., referred to the service rendered by him to the university in the erection of the new residences. These buildings accommodated at least 140 students. If the senate were satisfied with the experiment he believed there would be friends enough of the university found to erect others.

Prof. Vander Smitten presented W. Wedd, M.A., and Canon Welch was presented by Provost Macklem, both for honorary degree of LL.D.

In presenting Principal Andrew Smith for the new degree of D.V.S., President Creelman of the O.A.C. referred to the unique position of the Ontario Veterinary College for over 40 years. One man had been its founder, owner and principal. Over 3,000 students had gone through his hands.

Two gentlemen received the degree of doctor of philosophy, Austin Perley Misener, M.A., of the staff of Victoria College, and John Francis MacKay, M.A., for the last two years a member of the university staff.

A unique feature was the conferring of the degree of bachelor of forestry on James Herbert White, M.A. He was presented by Dean Fernow, who stated that Mr. White was the first man to receive this honor on Canadian soil.

The candidates for the other degrees were presented by various members of the staff. The winners of medals and prizes were also presented.

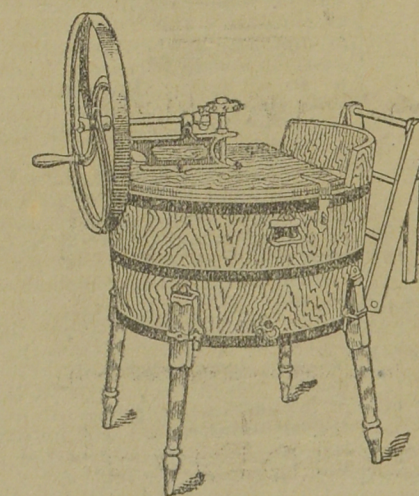
