WITH THE SPECULATORS.

Tenderfoot Tells What He Sees in a Toronto Bucketshop.

You go into a very ordinary looking room furnished with a few chairs, and perhaps a table, and you see a dozen or so earnest-looking men gazing at a black-board covered with figures. You feel sorry for these men at once, because your natural conclusion is that early in life their educations were neglected, and that now they have awakened to their defects and are endeavoring to study up on arithmetic.

You are an expert on arithmetic yourself, and you look again at the blackboard to see if there are any problems there you can't solve. After looking awhile you conclude there are. The arithmetic seems to be excessively complicated. All along the top of the board there extends a line of utterly unintelligible initials, and underneath each initial, pair of initials, trio of initials there droop columns of figures of varying lengths and in all sorts of fractional dimensions, to which a busy young man in black is constantly making additions with a piece of chalk.

The busy young man interests you. He is so excessively busy, and you wonder how he knows which column to put his figures in. Then you notice that he consults a long, narrow strip of paper which he tears off from a seemingly endless roll which keeps unwinding off a seemingly endless coil in the corner, where a noisy little machine keeps up a perpetual ticking. You go over and investigate this ticking thing, and you find it punching cabalistic figures and initials on the paper strip as it unwinds. "A C P," it says, "1,000 2 1-8, U P 100, 9 3-8," and so on ad infinitum, with other initials and other figures. Every minute or so the brisk young man steps up and tears off the strip, and transfers the figure to the blackboard.

Meanwhile, some of the men who have been studying the blackboard white surface and come over and get tired of looking at its black and study the little ticker and its constantly unwinding tape.

It seems to be a free and easy school they study in, for some of them smoke and some of them chat, and some of them occasionally read newspapers, but they always come back to the blackboard and the ticker.

Sometimes one of them gets up in a hurry and walks back to the counter and talks to one of the men behind. Then you hear something ticking over there, talking back to the little ticker by the blackboard, probably.

You go away, finally, puzzled exceedingly, but you come back again, and probably again, and finally you begin to see through it a little. The little ticker in the corner is talking off the fluctuations in stock quotations in New York, and the brisk young man in black is copying them off on the blackboard. For instance, the "A C P, 1,000, 2 1-8," means the sale of 1,000 shares of Amalgamated Copper at 72 1-8, and "U P, 100, 9 3-8," means the sale of 100 Union Pacific shares at 99 3-8, and so on. The answering click from behind the counter comes when one of the blackboard students turns in an order either to buy stock which he hasn't got, but thinks he needs, or to sell stock which he has and which he sees he can sell at a profit.

You see men in these little offices whom you seldom see anywhere else. Doubtless they have homes, and doubtless they get their meals somewhere, but you never see them anywhere save in one of these little offices studying these figures.

Some of them are young, but some of them are grey-haired. It is doubtless interesting to them, but to you it looks like an awfully monotonous way for a fellow to spend his life, sitting in a chair gazing at figures on a blackboard.—Ravenspur, in Toronto Star.

POULTRY POINTERS.

A safe rule in feeding is to give enough to satisfy and no more.

Droppings should not be allowed to accumulate in the poultry house longer than a week.

Bone dust supplies an abundance of bonemaking material and counteracts any tendency to diarrhea.

When possible, give the poultry house a southern exposure and furnish that side with an abundance of light.

While wheat is one of the best grains to feed to fowls, it should not be fed to excess or it may cause diarrhea. Feed it with other grains.

Loss of feathers is generally caused by want of green food or want of a dust bath. Supply both, and as a local application, use mercurial ointment.

Breed the best flesh formers for market; then feed them up to as great a weight as possible. Well fattened, well dressed poultry bring the best prices.

A Point of Order.

One of the conspicuous features in the decorations of a certain official building is a full length portrait of George Washington. Being just behind the speaker's chair, it is in full sight of everybody who rises to speak. 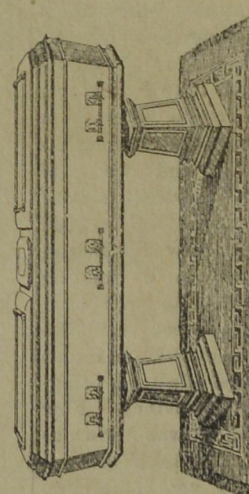
