

WE'RE ON TOP.

Fredericton Football Players Wiped the Earth With St. John.

MEN OF THE FOGGY CITY NEVER SCORED

While the B. & B. Club Champions Put up Twelve Points,

(Telegraph.)

It is seldom that a poorer exhibition of football has been offered the sporting public of this city than that given yesterday in the Fredericton-St. John match. From the beginning it was quite evident that the local players were no match for the visiting team. The forwards of the Frederictons were too heavy for the home line, which was exceedingly light and apparently not in practice. The passing of the backs, on both teams, was very poor and there was a great deal of fumbling of the ball.

The ball was almost as frequently picked out of the scrimmage as it was heeled out, while outside play was far too common for men supposed to be familiar with the game. The following was the lineup:

Fredericton B. & B. Team—Full back, Babbitt; half backs, Malloy, C. Allen, McLellan, Hopgood; quarter backs, K. Allen and Sadler; forwards, Christie, McLeod, H. R. Babbitt, Smith, Farris, Wandless, Adams and Delong.

St. John—Full back, Trumppour; half backs, J. Fairweather, Thomson, Howard and Malcolm; quarter backs, F. Fairweather and Wm. Murray; forwards, Shaw, Law, Whittaker, Scovil, Powers, D'Oloqui, Porter and Raymond.

The Frederictons kicked off with the sun in their eyes, and against the wind. For a few minutes the play was up and down the field with the advantage in favor of the visiting team. From a bad fumble by Howard, in a pass from Malcolm, Fredericton rushed the ball up to the five-yard line of the home players. Scrimmage after scrimmage followed in close proximity to the St. John goal, when finally DeLong got the ball and succeeded in making a try which W. Babbitt was unable to convert into a goal. 3-0.

Shortly before half time Wandless was successful in again getting the sphere over the St. John line and the score stood 6-0.

Within three minutes after the resumption of the game Fredericton scored another try but failed to convert and the score stood 9-0.

The home players now began to wake up and rushed the ball to the Fredericton end and succeeded in forcing the latter to make a safety touchdown which was soon followed by the home team having to resort to the same course to relieve the pressure.

From the kick-off at 25 yards the play continued in St. John territory until C. Allen obtained the ball and made a fine run, scoring the fourth try for Fredericton. This and a run made a few minutes later by Jack Fairweather were the only two interesting plays of the day.

Just before the close of the game Trumppour made another safety touchdown and the match resulted in a victory for Fredericton by 12-0.

Farris, Hopgood and C. Allen, of the visiting team put up a very good game, and for the home players Powers, J. Fairweather and Malcolm showed to the best advantage, although the passing of the letter was at times very erratic.

S. A. Jones was referee and H. Fowler and N. McLeod touch line judges.

The Sun's Account.

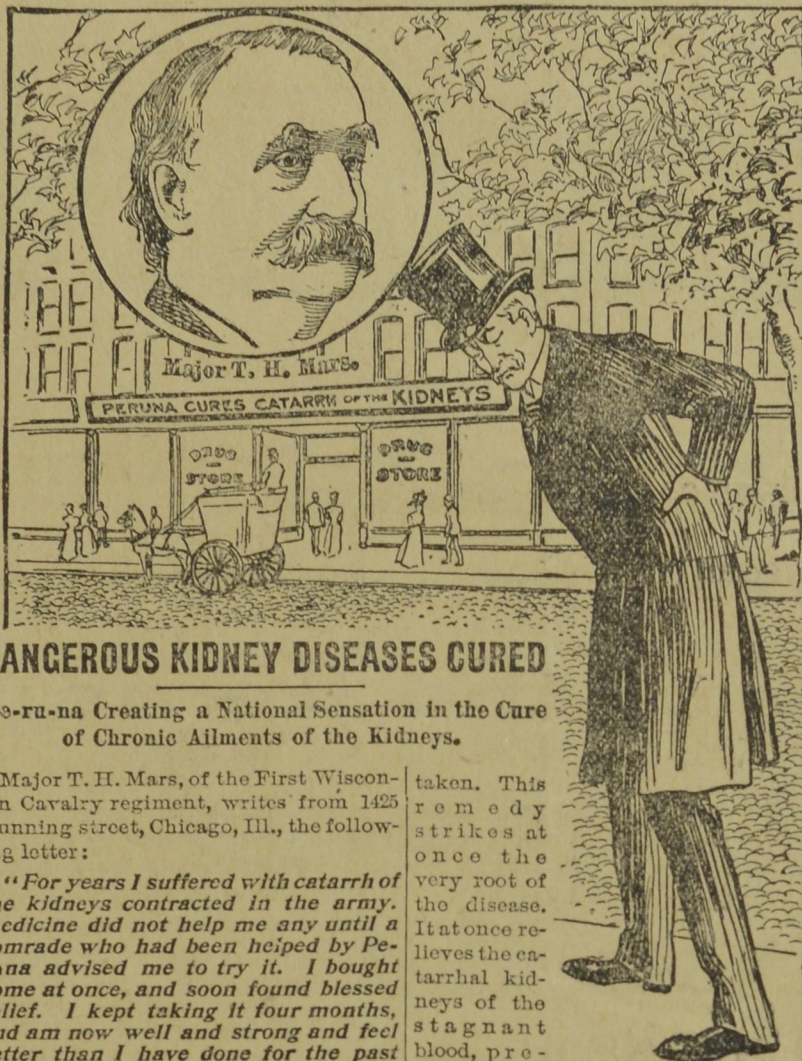
The visitors were much stronger than their opponents as the score indicates. Their forward line was by far the stronger, and at times showed an inclination to play together and handle the ball with their feet, while the Fredericton half line, while not brilliant, played a steady game and showed a good appreciation of the value of opportune kicking. C. Allen's dodging runs gained his team lots of ground.

The St. John quarters were outplayed all around. K. Allen for the visitors was always on the ball, fed his halves fairly well and gained considerable ground individually.

Through the first half the play was almost entirely within St. John's 25 yard line. Fredericton's efforts to score were held at bay for about 15 minutes, when DeLong drove over from a scrim on the 5 yard line for the first try. No goal was kicked. Score 3-0.

The next score was due to St. John's weakness rather than to any clever work

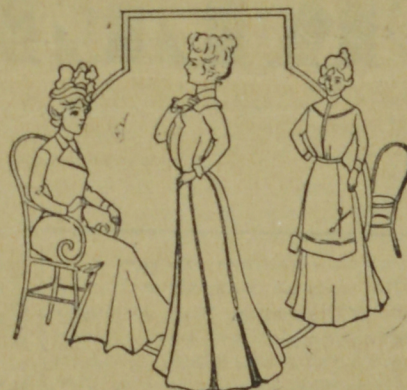
