

## CARNIVAL OF CRIME

**Mennonite School Master  
at Altona, Manitoba**

**EMPTIED HIS SEVEN SHOOTER  
INTO TRUSTEES AND  
PUPILS.**

**One Dead and two Others Fatal**

**MURDERER IS SINKING RAPIDLY  
FROM SELF-INFLICTED WOUND.**

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—Henry I. Toews, a Mennonite school teacher in the old village of Altona, 62 miles from Winnipeg, Thursday afternoon shot John Hiebert, Abraham Rempet and Peter Kehler, school trustees, also three children, girls, 8, 10 and 11 years of age, and then shot himself after running a mile towards the railway station.

The cause of the tragedy was some complaints about the teacher's management of the school. Toews, the teacher, was present in school when the trustees said they were not satisfied with his conduct and he was apparently prepared for them with a seven chambered revolver.

The desperate man shot Hiebert, then Rempet and Kehler last. Kehler recoiled with him and Toews discharged the revolver and the bullet passed across Kehler's fingers, breaking them. He then rushed into the school room among the children and selected Kehler's two little girls, aged 8 and 10 years, shooting them through the body and Rempet's little girl, about 11 years of age, through her arm and breaking the bone.

Anna Kehler, aged 8, died this morning after terrible agony.

Winnipeg, Man. Oct. 11.—Henry Toews the Altona murderer, now lies at the general hospital here as a result of self-inflicted injuries, after shooting five people one of whom is dead. He is sinking rapidly.

When conscious he will speak to no one and though an attempt was made to get from him his reasons for committing his awful crimes, it was unsuccessful.

A report from Altona says that John Hiebert, trustee, and Helen Kehler, a ten year old school girl, cannot last through the day.

Abraham Rempet and his ten year old daughter will recover.

## MITCHELL'S DEMAND.

**Will Call Off Strike if  
Miners' Receive Ten  
Per Cent Raise.**

**OPERATORS WILL MAKE DESPERATE EFFORTS NEXT WEEK**

**To Increase Their Output,**

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

New York, Oct. 11.—It is understood that the coal operators will make desperate efforts next week to increase the coal output.

Serious times are expected in the anthracite districts. The Times learns on high authority that Mr. Mitchell has offered to recommend to the miners the immediate resumption of work, if the operators will grant an increase of ten per cent in wages, all other questions in dispute to be referred to arbitration.

Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 11.—Twenty-five hundred tons of anthracite coal, mined and broken this week at the colliery of the Lykens Valley Coal Co., were shipped from Lykens this morning. There was no demonstration as the cars were started from Harrisburg on their way to Philadelphia. Breakers at Lykens and Williamstown are being operated without interference.

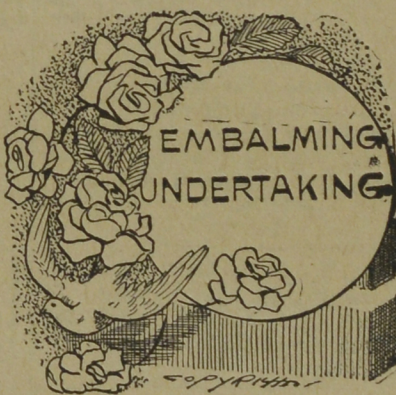
