Broke a Record.

At the annual sports of McGill College, Montreal yesterday, Edward J. Ryan, of St. John, freshman, late of the University of New Brunswick, won the 120 yards hurdles and hop, step and jump. In the broad jump he broke the varsity record by leaping 20 feet 11 1-2 inches.

The Silsby Engine.

The fire committee of the City Council had a meeting last evening to deal with the question of disposing of the Silsby fire engine. John E. McCarthy of Tusket, N. S., was in attendance, and on behalf of Tusket parties offered to pay \$350 for the engine as it stands delivered on board of the care. Chairman Stockford was in favor of accepting the offer on the spot, but Ald. Moore did not want to be too hasty and thought the engine should be given another test before action was taken. After quibbling over the matter for a time, the committee adjourned without having accomplished anything. Ald. Stockford's views are in accord with those of a majority of the committee and Mr. McCarthy's offer will probably be accepted. The proceeds of the sale will just about purchase a good pair of horses for the fire department.

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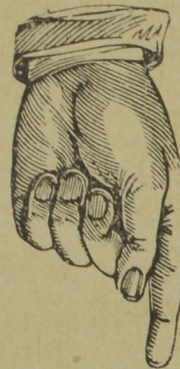
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
