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STRANGE ELOPEMENT

Reported to The Police of Manchester, N. Y.

ARCHIE DUCLOS SAYS THAT HIS WIFE WENT AWAY WITH MAN IN SLEIGH.

He Asserts That They Never Had Any Unpleasantness Since Marriage.

Manchester, N. Y., Feb. 27.—One of the strangest elopements that has ever come to the attention of the Manchester police was reported today by the husband who has apparently been abandoned and whose wife eloped under his nose.

The complaining husband is Archie Duclos, a well-dressed, bright appearing young man, who is a shoemaker employed in a west side shop and whose home is at 164 Hancock st.

His wife Alice comes from an old and respected French family. The husband reports that they have never had the slightest unpleasantness in their years of married life, during which time one child was born to them but did not long survive. The husband's story is as follows:

"Sunday I went to lake Massabesic, accompanied by my wife, and we proceeded to Levasseur's on the back pond. We each had a glass of beer. While seated watching the crowd come and go a man and woman drove up in a sleigh. They were a somewhat dashing looking couple and attracted some attention. I asked my wife if she knew them and she replied that she did not. They appeared socially inclined and asked us to have a drink with them, which we did, and several drinks followed.

"Afterward my wife and the woman accompanying the man who drove up, went to the lavatory and they were gone so long that I asked my wife the cause of it. She told me that the woman had a bottle with her and insisted on her drinking and that they stopped and talked.

"Later the strange woman asked me to step up to the bar and drink with her. This invitation my wife urged me to accept. I stepped up to the bar and we drank together. On returning to where my wife had been seated, she was not there and I soon learned that she had gone away in the sleigh with the man who had accompanied the woman with whom I had just had a glass of beer.

"I questioned the woman, but she could tell me nothing, and said that she did not even know the name of the man with whom she had come. She added that she made her home in one of the road houses in the outlying towns. Whether the elopement had been planned beforehand I don't know, and I surely do not think that my wife had enough to drink to in any way make her irresponsible.

We never quarreled. She has always, so far as I know, conducted herself with the greatest propriety up to Sunday. She was well dressed, and wore a gold watch and chain which I gave her not long ago."

CAPTURE OF BUDD BULLOCK.

Good Piece of Detective Work by North-West Mounted Police.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—The condemnation of Budd Bullock, for the murder of a man named Stainton, at a place named Otacox, in the North-West Territories, closes an episode equally hard to unravel as the O'Brien murders in the Yukon, and reflects great credit on the N. W. Mounted Police. In the month of June last the body of an unknown man was found in the bush. All papers had been removed but the buttons on his clothes showed that they had been made in Chicago, whilst a pass on a street railway showed that he had been in Kalamazoo, Minnesota. Upon this the police worked and found that their man had been in Buffalo. Here they nearly lost the trail as enquiries made by them in that city of the chief of police were reported in the Montreal Star. The publication, however, never seems to have been seen by their man, and a constable named Heatherington was sent after him tracing him from place to place through Montana and the Western States. At last it appeared that he had returned to Canada and he was finally run to earth near Edmonton where he was tried. A peculiar feature of the case is that the police obtained their trail from the condemned man's sister. They having learned that Budd Bullock had started out for the north with a companion, who intended to settle there, went to his home. Here they were told by his sister that he had been at home but had come alone. Shortly before he arrived she said they had heard two shots fired, and when he came they asked him about them. He replied he had fired them to let his people know that he was coming. She also said he had plenty of money, whereas when he started he had none, Stainton having the cash. Near home the body was found. Taking up the trail the police worked till they found the dead man's father-in-law who helped them find the tailor who made the clothes, and the railway people where he got the pass. From that the trail led him to Great Falls where he will be hanged on March 26.
