Charlotte M. P., Reminded of
the Moncton Convention

AND HIS FAILURE TO DELIVER
THE GOODS.

Ottawa, Mar. 1.—The marine and fisheries department estimates were considered in the house yesterday. Before they were reached, however, a number of bills were read first time.

In reply to Dr. Sproule, Mr. Sutherland said no progress had apparently been made with determining the exact position of the dominion and the provinces in respect to the fisheries. This would probably be the subject of a reference to the court whose decision should be accepted by all parties or by an agreement between the provinces and the dominion. At present matters were in a very unsatisfactory position.

Under the decision of the Privy Council the duty of regulating and protecting the fisheries remained within the jurisdiction of the dominion, and everyone was agreed as to the importance of its fisheries. With regard to apparent cost of service, the minister, anticipating a decreased expenditure when the decision was given, made a reduction of \$25,000 in the vote, but experience had not justified this action and it was necessary to increase the vote to the former amount.

R. L. Borden pressed upon the minister the desirability of having the differences between the provinces and the dominion settled at once, especially in view of the statement by the attorney general of New Brunswick that he proposed making or had made demand upon the government for a portion of the fisheries award due the province. If the government of

the dominion was to be subjected to that claim it was possibly not pursuing a very wise course. He suggested that the department co-operate in the effort to obtain a settlement.

On the vote of \$120,000 for fishery inspection R. L. Borden asked the minister of justice if he thought it desirable to further submit the question of the respective jurisdictions of the dominion and provincial governments in the control of the fisheries.

Mr. Fitzpatrick replied that the judgement of the Privy Council was extremely confused and indefinite. Were he not speaking of the highest court in the empire he would be tempted to say it was self-contradictory in its terms. Two points seemed to be established, first that the provinces have the territorial rights in the fisheries; second, that the enactment of fishery regulations and restrictions is within the exclusive jurisdiction of the dominion. He thought the provincial and dominion authorities might come together and agree how the judgment was to be interpreted or else submit some further questions to the court asking them to interpret their judgment. He was of opinion that the provinces had not as wide jurisdiction as they supposed.

In answer to Dr. Sproule, Mr. Sutherland intimated that the supplementary estimates would probably contain a vote for the establishment of a fish hatchery on the Georgian Bay.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson discussing the arrangements between the dominion and provincial governments regarding the fisheries, said that New Brunswick had made provision by an act of the legislature for such an arrangement.

Mr. Ganong—"When was that?"

Mr. Emmerson—"I think in 1899 or 1900."

Mr. Ganong speaking somewhat warmly said that it was very strange that Mr. Emmerson should make such a statement now because he had heard him make an entirely different statement during the local election of 1899.

Mr. Emmerson said that Mr. Ganong was evidently not well informed on fishery matters even if he did represent a fishing constituency. He would inform him that what he (Emmerson) now stated was entirely in accord with the statements made in 1899. His only excuse for Mr. Ganong was that he felt somewhat sore about not being able to keep his promise made at the Moncton convention to return four Conservatives for the county of Charlotte.

Mr. Ganong—"Speeches for fishermen were sometimes made to farmers and vice versa."

Mr. Emmerson—"Evidently my speeches in the county were effective, anyhow, as Charlotte county returned me four supporters." (Cheers.)

Mr. Sutherland's main estimates were all passed and Mr. Tarte's taken up. He explained that the plans for the branch of the royal mint have been sent to England for approval of the royal mint authorities.

Mr. Tarte talked on the French River on his estimates and explained at great length the advantages of that route of the grain of the west. He wants parliament to authorize to deepening the French river from Georgian Bay to North Bay, from which point the grain would be carried to Montreal by the C. P. R. He is an enthusiastic believer in the future of Canada and desires that transportation routes be put into order for the enormous traffic, which he foresees will pass over them on the way to the sea.

Votes were passed for a new observatory and the branch of the royal mint which are to be built here.

Killed on the Track.

Halifax, March 1.—James H. Harris, manager of the Nova Scotia nursery and one of the best known men in the city, was killed by an I. C. R. engine yesterday afternoon. Mr. Harris was crossing the track to take the north end ferry for Dartmouth when he saw a shunting engine approaching. He stepped back to avoid it, but only to meet the engine that had brought in the maritime express and which was proceeding backwards to the round house. It passed over him, completely severing and otherwise mangling the body. Mr. Harris was a prominent Methodist. His widow is a sister of City Collector Theakston.
