

LAURIER HOME

A Magnificent Reception
Will be Tendered
To-night.QUEBEC DECORATING IN HIS
HONOR.

Welcome Will be Non-Political.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Fame Point, Oct. 17.—The Lake Erie with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. S. Fielding on board arrived here at 3 o'clock. They proceed to Quebec where they will arrive at 8 o'clock this evening.

Father Point, Que., Oct. 16.—S. S. Lake Erie is reported in sight at Fame Point and will reach Father Point about 10 a. m. tomorrow.

Quebec, Oct. 16.—It was hoped that Quebec's great welcome to the returning political chieftain, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, would have taken place this evening, but owing to the non-arrival of the S. S. Lake Erie, with the premier aboard, it has been found necessary to postpone the demonstration until tomorrow evening.

However, the delay gives more time to decorate and the ancient capital will be in full holiday attire and brilliantly illuminated when Sir Wilfrid reaches here.

A special train, which will convey the distinguished party from Rimouski to Levis, will leave River du Loup some time to-morrow and will be in waiting at Rimouski by the time Sir Wilfrid reaches that point.

A special message received this afternoon regarding the whereabouts of the Lake Erie was to the effect that the steamer had passed the east point of Anticosti at 12.20 o'clock to-day which, barring unforeseen delay, would permit of her reaching Rimouski about midday to-morrow.

Hon. Mr. Parent, accompanied by Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, Hon. Mr. Sutherland, Hon. Mr. Scott, Sir C. A. P. Pelletier, W. Power, M. P., as well as several members of the organization committee and members of the provincial cabinet, left this afternoon on the I. C. R. train and proceeded to Rimouski.

Sir Wilfrid wired his worship the mayor from Belle Isle late yesterday to the effect that he, together with Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, would disembark from the S. S. Lake Erie at Rimouski and would therefore cover the remainder of the distance by rail.

On reaching St. Joseph De Levis the party will disembark and board the government steamer Druid, which will be in waiting, and proceed to the Queen's wharf, whence the procession will start early in the evening.

The welcome to be tendered the Liberal leader to-morrow will eclipse anything of a like kind ever attempted in this city. In fact it will be second only to the display made on the occasion of the royal visit last year.

All the streets through which the procession is to pass are being decorated.

Father Point, Que. Oct. 16.—Father Point is on deck to welcome Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the welcome he will get here will be the first he will receive from his countrymen.

The parish is decorated from end to end with flags and bunting. Mayor McWilliams' invitation to the inhabitants to give the premier a warm welcome has been heartily responded to.

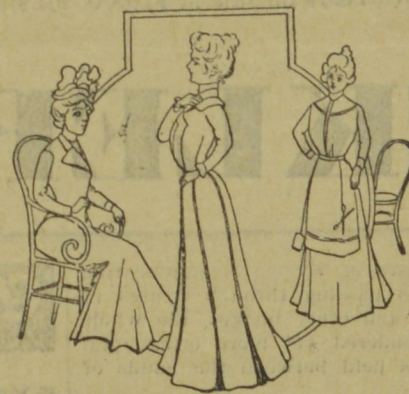

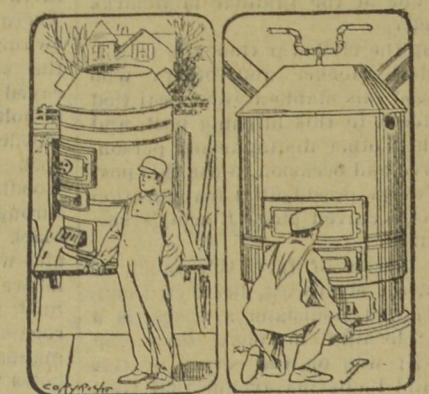
