BIG GAME NOTES.

Another Monster Moose Head Brought Out From the Miramichi.

The officials of the Crown Land department and others who take an interest in big game, are unable to recall a season when so great a number of moose heads have been brought to Fredericton by visiting sportsmen as has been the case this year. Neither are they able to remember a season when so many heads of exceptionally large size have been brought out of the woods. The game season has been on now little more than a month, but already more than thirty moose heads from the hunting grounds of the north have been landed in Fredericton, and it is no exaggeration to say that half of them had antlers in excess of fifty inches. What better argument is needed in support of the contention put forward by the game officials and guides, that moose are on the increase in New Brunswick, and that there are at least double the number now than there were ten years ago.

The arrival of N. T. Depauw, of New Albany, Indiana, from the Southwest Miramichi with a monster moose head was noted in these columns Wednesday. Mr. Depauw had his trophy on exhibition at the Barker House, where it was viewed by scores of people, who pronounced it the largest ever brought to Fredericton. Deputy Surveyor General Flewelling put a tape line on the antlers and gave their spread as 61½ inches. Mr. Depauw has forwarded the head to New York, where it will be mounted and placed on exhibition. Mr. Depauw, who is a gentleman as well as a sportsman, has promised to see to it that the head will not be exhibited as the product of the Maine woods—a game that has been worked in the past to the disadvantage of New Brunswick.

Another mammoth head, in some respects surpassing Mr. Depauw's was brought out of the woods yesterday by F. W. Tolles of Nantucket, Conn., who with his friend C. D. Butler of Pittsfield, Mass., has been hunting at Rocky Brook with Daniel Munn of Boiestown as guide. It has antlers measuring sixty and three-quarter inches and containing 34 points, 20 on the right antler and 14 in the left. The largest blade has a width

of 17½ inches in the web. The antlers were matched better than those on Mr. Depauw's head, and were lighter in color with the veins less prominent. Mr. Tolles has placed the head in the hands of the Emack Bros., to be mounted.

Mr. Butler, who accompanied Mr. Tolles, shot a moose with an antler spread of 57 points.

D. H. Mast, of Milton, Ohio, who returned from a successful hunt on the Miramichi, shot his moose at a distance of 350 yards. He used a 35 calibre Winchester, and one shot did the business.

Noisy Fish.

Many fish can produce musical sounds. The red gurnard has earned the name of seacock from the crowing noise which it makes, while another species is called the piper. Others, notably two species of opidium, have sound producing apparatus, consisting of small movable bones, which can be made to produce a sharp rattle. The curious "drumming" made by the Mediterranean fish known as the mairre can be heard from a depth of thirty fathoms.

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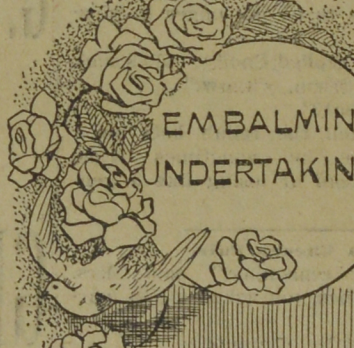


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
