Naturally the actions of the unfaithful husband are generally condemned. Marshall was one of our prosperous citizens. He has long been a resident of this city. He is a native of Newfoundland. He invested largely in real estate, and carried one of the best grocery stocks in Halifax. He had a large and commodious store and did a big business.

The woman who met Marshall at Truro was a Mrs. Burns. She is 25 years old, of blonde type, medium height, symmetrical figure, fair complexion and good looking. She came to Halifax from Newfoundland. Possibly the fact that both she and Marshall hailed from the factory of icebergs had the tendency of making the liking existing between them more than that of friendship. However, Mrs. Burns was a tenant of Mr. Marshall. She had dark eyes—flashlights, termed by many—and when they radiated on the grocer he became bewildered and submission followed. It is known that Mrs. Burns boarded the train at Truro. It is also known that Marshall took one section or third of the car, and that section was occupied by Marshall, Mrs. Burns and her two little children. It was stated that the woman in the case was a widow. She is not. Her husband is alive, and is also very much alive to the doings of his wife. Mrs. Burns may have left on a trip to the west to recuperate her health, and accidentally met Mr. Marshall at the depot at Truro, and Mr. Marshall having one section or third of a car to himself, with all the comforts a railway service could afford, may have asked Mrs. Burns to share with him, and the young woman accepted the generous offer. Biggest Liquor Consumer in the U. S.

Chicago Bears this Unenviable Record Among American Cities.

WINDY CITY HAS 31 MILES OF SALOONS AND 8 MILES OF CHURCHES.

Chicago, Sept. 22.—The Illinois Prohibition party issued its campaign book for 1902 Saturday, and all politicians agree that it is a decidedly unique production. It is as full of information as an egg is of meat, and it may be stated, with perfect regard to the truth that much of the information cannot be found in the year books published by any other political party.

For each month there is an apt quotation or maxim to show that the rum traffic should be annihilated.

Part 2 is devoted to total abstinence. Facts and figures are given to show that alcohol is to blame for most of the crime, insanity and disease of the United States.

Under the caption of Chicago's liquor bill," the text book says:

There are more than thirty-one miles of saloons in Chicago, and less than eight miles of churches.

The liquor drunk in Chicago last year would float the biggest ship on the lakes, and if put in a mammoth vat, completely immerse the Masonic Temple, twenty stories in height.

The more than 55,000 arrests for

drunkenness would make a procession in close lock step marching order of more than twenty miles in length, and nearly a quarter of this number women.

If the 6,373 saloons of the city were placed solidly together they would much more than fill the entire central business district, requiring over two square miles, and stretching from Lake to Sixteenth street, and from Michigan avenue to Haisted street.

Leading liquor wholesalers tell that Chicago is the greatest drinking city in the country, and therefore it is the most intemperate. It is hard for even the liquor sellers or the revenue department to compute the amount of intoxicants consumed in a year, but after obtaining all the most reliable data possible it is figured out that Chicago last year consumed 153,477,900 gallons of drink, costing \$125,738,188.

If equally divided this would mean eighty gallons of sadly mixed liquor for every man, woman and child among the 1,750,000 of Chicago's population, and a per capita expense of \$72.

Were all this mighty flood dammed up and then allowed to flow off at the rate of a gallon a minute through a single faucet, eighty-one years would not suffice for what trickled over the Chicago palate in the 365 days of last year.

During the hot weather of last summer over 35,000 barrels of beer alone were daily consumed, and it is expected that this year's consumption of liquors of all kinds will eclipse that of last.

IMMORALITY IN MONCTON.

At the annual meeting of the Y. M. C. A. directors last evening, his honor Police Magistrate Kay, was called upon by Chairman Ayer to address the gathering. Mr. Kay in his opening remarks said that he presided over a different institution than the Y. M. C. A. He has been police magistrate for the past five years and in that time enough money has been paid into the police court to pay off the debt on the Y. M. C. A. In the churches and in the Y. M. C. A. in this city you see the good side of humanity but in the police court the other side. There are dens of iniquity in this city to-day said his honor which are not outclassed in any community for depravity. They are simply traps for young men. It was his object to wipe out these resorts and he wanted assistance to do so. He said, "you would be astonished if you really knew what I do from reliable reports submitted to me, about the existence of evil and houses of ill-fame in this city." He referred to instances of his own knowledge, of women being locked up for intoxication and crowded like beasts into a cell. There are places of ill repute in this town today that are run wide open, and are just as public institutions as the Y. M. C. A. These places are right in the city and are not far from Main street. "Why this is," I do not know. There are men in this town making a better salary than I am, who are making their living by collecting tolls at the trap door of hell."

LITTLE WAR CLOUD.

Alleged that Diplomatic Relations

BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND VENEZUELA

Are About to be Broken.

TROUBLE AROSE OVER THE OWNERSHIP OF ISLAND OF PATOS.

London, Sept. 23.—The Associated Press is in a position to announce that diplomatic relations between Great Britain and Venezuela are on the verge of being severed.

Almost any hour may bring the announcement that the British minister at Caracas has been given his passport, with corresponding action toward the Venezuelan representative in London.

The cause of the crisis consists in various differences which culminated in Venezuela assuming such an angry attitude as to leave Downing street fully impressed with the belief that the Venezuelan government intend to force matters to a crucial issue.

That a diplomatic rupture would result in hostilities is a contingency thus far scarcely contemplated.

The view of the foreign office is that affairs have reached a stage where it is impossible to deal satisfactorily with Venezuela in any matter which may come up.

An exceptionally prominent official said to a representative of the Associated Press last evening:

"Affairs in Venezuela are so hopelessly muddled that we can get nothing done. There is no concealing the fact that the Venezuelan government has made heated protests to our minister."

"The chief grievance appears to be the allegation that the British government is aiding the revolutionary army. It is needless to say this is perfectly baseless."

"We only wish the United States would take over the whole country and then, perhaps, we would get some peace. Of all the disturbances of the last decade, the present seems to be the worst."

"This, combined with the attitude of the nominal government, makes us somewhat indifferent to any action which may take place. The Venezuelans appear inclined to be rather reckless, thanks chiefly to what I presume is the mistaken notion that Washington will protect them from the results of their own folly, however foolish that might be to the lives and property of British subjects and those of other Europeans."

"As we understand Monroeism, Venezuela is quite mistaken in this matter, though apparently the impression has much to do with her present action."

Washington, Sept. 23.—No notice of a strain in the diplomatic relations between Great Britain and Venezuela has reached the department of state. If such is the case, however, the department officials would have no hesitation in ascribing the cause of the threatened rupture to the dispute which has been revived between the two countries over the ownership of Patos, or Goose Island, lying in the Dragon's Mouth between Trinidad and the Venezuelan coast.
