A Brilliant Matrimonial Event

AT THE METHODIST CHURCH.

Harry G. Chestnut and Miss A. I. Tibbits the Principals.

WELL KNOWN YOUNG COUPLE
PLEDGE THEIR TROTH AT
HYMEN'S ALTAR.

A wedding which has been looked forward to with more than usual interest took place at the Methodist church at 3.45 o'clock this afternoon, in the presence of a large crowd of spectators the edifice being crowded to the doors. The principals in the happy event were Miss Annie Isabel Tibbits, eldest daughter of R. W. L. Tibbits, deputy provincial secretary of New Brunswick, and Harry Grenville Chestnut, son of Henry Chestnut, of R. Chestnut & Sons.

The church was very attractively decorated for the occasion with potted plants, palms, ferns and white wax berries, etc., and the wedding was one of the prettiest ever seen within its walls.

L. A. Wilnot Lemont presided at the organ and the full choir of the church was in attendance. Punctually at the appointed hour, the bride entered the church leaning upon the arm of her father and moved up the aisle to the beautiful strains of Lohengrin's wedding march. The bridegroom and his best man arrived a short time before and had taken up their places in front of the altar.

The bride looked very charming in a costume of ivory white satin with escurial lace and pearl trimmings and carrying a shower bouquet of white roses. She was attended by her sister, Miss Millie Tibbits, who looked very winsome and pretty in white point d'esprit over white taffeta and carrying a bouquet of pink roses. Harold R. Babbitt, a cousin of the bridegroom, ably discharged the duties of best man.

The ushers were James Tibbits, Kenneth Chestnut, Charles F. Randolph and F. Wayland Porter. Upwards of seventy invited guests were in attendance.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. A. Rogers, pastor of the church, the choir rendering with splendid effect the beautiful hymns, "The Voice that Breathed o'er Eden," and "How Welcome was the Call." At the conclusion of the ceremony the bridal party proceeded down the aisle and left the church to the strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march from the organ.

The newly wedded couple and guests afterwards repaired to the home of the bride's parents, York street, where a sumptuous wedding dejeuner was served and a reception held by the bride and bridegroom.

The bride, who is a graduate of the U. N. B. and was for several years a valued member of the teaching staff of the York street school, is one of the city's most talented young ladies and is held in universal esteem by her acquaintances. She was the recipient of a host of magnificent wedding presents from friends in the city and outside points.

From the employees of R. Chestnut & Sons, she received a beautiful tea set, and her former pupils presented her with a pretty silver meat fork.

The bridegroom is one of the city's rising young business men, and has hosts of warm friends here and elsewhere.

Mr. and Mrs. Chestnut will leave by the 6.10 train this evening on a bridal trip to the upper Canadian cities and Niagara Falls. They will return to Fredericton at the expiration of three weeks and take up their abode with Mr. Chestnut's parents, until such time as their own residence, now in course of construction, is ready for occupancy.

THE QUARANTINE CASE.

Town Marshal Barker Testifies for the Prosecution.

At the police court Tuesday afternoon the cross examination of Dr. Fisher in the Penniac quarantine case was concluded by Mr. Crockett.

Alfred Barker being sworn said he resided at Marysville and was a policeman. Was on guard at the lower end of the quarantine district on the Collins house. His orders were not to allow the occupants to come in contact with people passing along the road, but they were allowed out of doors. Had put a rope

across the road at the request of Dr. Fisher. This rope had to be broken or taken down before a team could pass through. Witness was well acquainted with Dr. H. McNally. Saw him on Saturday Aug. 9th. He came up to where witness was on guard, and accompanied by a gentleman whom he said was Dr. Burnett of Sussex. Told Dr. McNally that he did not think he could allow him to go any further. His reply was "I have seen Dr. Fisher and it is all right." I do not think he told me how he got past the rope. Dr. McNally drove as far up as the Collins house and stopped, I following on foot. Dr. Burnett went to the doorstep and Dr. McNally remained outside the gate eight or ten feet away. Ernest Collins and Harvey came out on the doorstep. Dr. Burnett put on his glasses and looked down Ernest Collins' throat. He also appeared to put his hands on Collins' face and pinch the place where the spots had broken out. They talked together but witness could not hear what was said. Afterwards the doctors got into the carriage and drove up the road towards the Mauzer house.

To Mr. Crockett he said the rope was taken down on the following Tuesday and a lock and chain put up in its place. The rope got broken but he did not know who did it. Dr. Fisher told witness to allow no person to pass through without his permission. He said to allow no doctors through except Dr. Mellin. Witness acted as guard about twenty-four days in all. Had no orders to allow teams to pass through and from the mill and allowed none to pass. James Arnold passed through to his work several times by direction of Dr. Fisher. Frank Collins did not go to his work daily or pass outside of the line to witness' knowledge. Did not see Frank Robinson or Harry Gibson pass through. Witness did not take the rope down for Dr. McNally to pass through. Dr. McNally did not hinder or obstruct witness in anything he was doing.

At the conclusion of Mr. Barker's testimony the case was adjourned till Thursday morning, with the understanding that there would be a further adjournment, if requested by Dr. McNally, who has been called to Boston by the illness of his brother.

Told a Montreal Inter-viewer that the Government

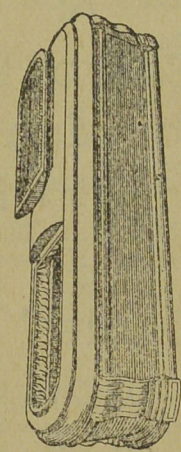
WOULD BE RETURNED TO POWER WITH MAJORITY LARGE AS AT PRESENT.

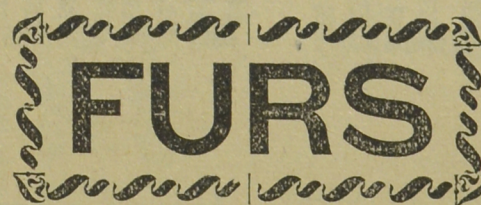

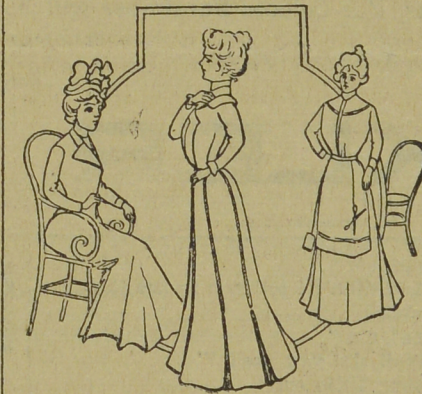
