### Pretty Wedding at Racine Wisconsin.

An autumnal wedding, charming in all its features, and performed with all the solemnity of the beautiful Episcopalian service, occurred last evening, when Miss Jennie Young Pugh and Ernest H. Smieding exchanged marriage vows at the residence of the bride's father, 840 Park avenue, Rev. Dr. Arthur Piper, of the St. Luke's church, officiating. Over 100 guests were present.

When six o'clock, the appointed hour for the nuptials, had arrived, Miss Luella Lockwood at the piano began the playing of Mendelssohn's wedding march. A moment later the bridal procession appeared and the service was read under a bower of asparagus ferns and green trailing vines, the ring ceremony being used. The bride was given away by her father. Her gown, a charming creation of white silk, was hand embroidered, trimmed with turquoise and real lace. She carried a shower bouquet of lilies of the valley. The Misses Amelia Smieding, a sister of the groom, and Minnie Rickeman, as bridesmaids, were prettily costumed. Miss Smieding was attired in a lace robe over pink silk, while Miss Rickeman wore pink silk with Arabian lace. Both carried clusters of yellow roses.

Mrs. Van Wart, matron of honor, was gowned in a Nile green crepe de chene and carried pink roses.

Mr. James Craig acted as best man.

At the conclusion of the ceremony numerous congratulations and expressions for future happiness were showered upon the bride and groom.

A reception and wedding supper followed with Mrs. Susan Thompson as caterer.

An inspection of the wedding presents revealed numerous testimonials from friends and relations, many of them costly tokens of esteem and well wishes.

Albert R. Bauman, as master of ceremonies, looked after the comfort of the guests. The decorations were in keeping with the autumnal season and were tastefully displayed. Orange-hued bitter sweet and hydrangeas were banded on the mantel, while clusters of salvia with their deep red blossoms added their beauty to the effect. The floral ornamentations were arranged by Mrs. Charles Washburn.

The dining room including the candelabra, was decorated in pink and white.

Out of town guests were Mrs. Dr. E. Lachner and daughter Josephine of Chicago; Mrs. Van Wart, of Fredericton, N. B. Canada; Mrs. Daniel Jones of Milwaukee; and Miss E. Zahn, of Vienna, Wis.

#### BREACH OF PROMISE CASE.

Notice of a suit for breach of promise of marriage has been filed upon Rev. Dr. Dodds, of Crookston, presiding elder of the Crookston district of the Methodist church, and damages alleged in the sum of \$1,000, the plaintiff being Mrs. Luella Smith of Minneapolis. Dr. Dodds is well known in religious circles generally over the Northwest.

The facts in the case are that Dr. Dodds was at one time engaged to Mrs. Smith, a resident of Minneapolis. After the death of the mother of his children some years ago, a family of boys were left alone during his necessary frequent and long continued absences, and Rev. Mr. Crozier, former pastor of one of the Minneapolis churches, a mutual friend of both parties, brought the two together. This was early in 1901. The acquaintance thus casually commenced resulted, after a few meetings, in an agreement to marry at some future time, and the lady went to Iowa for an extended visit. During the interim, correspondence was maintained and it was agreed that the ceremony should be performed at the convenience of Dr. Dodds. His duties were such that he could arrange best for the ceremony in the month of October, and twice during the month Mrs. Smith excused herself from carrying out her part of the obligation on the pretext that she had not yet completed her visit to Iowa.

Later on the acquaintance having ripened more fully, it became apparent to Dr. Dodds and to the lady also that there were certain incompatibilities of disposition and religious belief that would make a marriage contract between them irksome and unsatisfactory. They met and discussed these matters fully, and the outcome was that the lady was frankly informed that from his viewpoint Dr. Dodds considered the consummation of their marriage an impossibility and desired it nullified. This view was shared by Mrs. Smith, and as a matter of justice, Dr. Dodds consented to pay the expense that she alleged she had incurred in preparing a trousseau. The incident was regarded as closed long ago, and Dr. Dodds was surprised last week to receive notice that the suit for breach of promise had been commenced. The case was brought in McLeod county, and in his answer Dr. Dodds asks a change of venue to Polk county.

## NAMED AFTER A SQUAW.

### How Fort Garry Was Changed to Winnipeg.

#### INTERESTING REMINISCENCES OF THE OLD HUDSON'S BAY POST

#### As Related by One Who Lived There Before the Outbreak of the First Reil Rebellion.

An interesting story of how the name of Fort Garry came to be changed to Winnipeg is told by Mrs. Charles Garratt of Toronto. Shortly after the first Reil rebellion in 1871 Mr. Garratt, Chief Trader McDermott and a number of others who were prominent in the affairs of the fort at that time met one night at Mr. McDermott's house, it having been previously intimated that the name should be changed so as to be in keeping with the dignity of a postoffice. At the meeting several names were suggested, but the weight of opinion was in favor of calling the place McDermottville. Before the matter was decided, however, Mr. McDermott rose and said that, as so much honor had been shown towards him in the matter, he would ask that the privilege of naming the fort be left to him. The request was granted. Mr. McDermott therewith, in honor of his wife, a Winnipegosis squaw, gave to what was destined to become the metropolis of the Canadian west the name of Winnipeg.

Mrs. Garratt is an aged woman, and her recollections of Fort Garry in the sixties and early seventies is not food for pleasant retrospect. She first went there in 1860, and it took a month to complete the journey from Toronto. At Georgetown, a Hudson Bay post on the Red River, she waited two weeks for the completion of the boat that was to carry her on to Fort Garry, and which was the first steamer to ply those waters. She and her husband at first entered in farming at Sturgeon Creek, but two years before the rebellion broke out they moved to the fort and started a hotel under the sign, "Garratt House."

It was while thus engaged that they met their most serious reverse. Mrs. Garratt had returned to Toronto to endeavor to repair her health, and during her absence Reil and his men took possession of the fort and imprisoned a number of men, including Mr. Garratt and Thomas Scott, who was afterwards shot. The Garratt house contained enough supplies to last in ordinary circumstances for six months, but Reil, when he had possession of the fort, billeted his men at the Garratt house, lodged the proprietor in prison, and to use Mrs. Garratt's own words, ate them out of house and home. When Mrs. Garratt returned some months later she found nothing but the walls of what had been previously her home.

Mr. Garratt's imprisonment ended in a pass from Reil, entitling him to leave that part of the country. But with the roll call of the prisoners that night those of lesser authority discovered that Garratt had been allowed to go. They told Reil that he had given liberty to one of his worst enemies, and the result was that a reward of \$100 was offered for his recapture, and to judge from the shots that were fired after him as he crossed on horseback over to United States territory it meant "dead or alive." The hardship and exposure consequent upon that flight for liberty ended in his death two years later.

Mrs. Garratt attributes to the shooting of Thomas Scott, which caused the stationing of a garrison at the fort, the gradual opening up of the west. That began when incomers felt assured of protection. She knew Reil personally, as he had often stayed at the Garratt House. She remembers him as not a bad sort of a fellow, as one, at least, who could sympathize with anyone suffering hardships.

#### KILLED HIS SON.

And Severely Wounded His Wife—A Bad Englishman.

Sault Ste Marie, Oct. 3.—Noah Hale of Korah township, six miles from here, shot and killed his son Frank, 25 years of age, and shot his wife in the arm. Hale is an Englishman and the possessor of a violent temper. Two weeks ago, as a result of trouble in the family, his wife had him before a justice of the peace, and he was bound over to keep the peace. The wife went to live with her son on a nearby farm. This morning Hale arose early, went to the son's house, shot him dead and shot his wife through the arm, apparently leaving her for dead. Then he returned home. His daughter had not missed him, but noticed he looked somewhat excited and had a gun with him. He ate his breakfast and left to bring in the cows. He took a gun with him, and his daughter thinks he had also a bottle of carbolic acid. The opinion is that the search parties now out after him will never take him alive.

Our house cleaning is about all done. It's a pleasure to visit our dining-room at twelve o'clock (noon.) Our beds are filled with the new kind of feathers, they call them the Fir Bongh feathers. Harry Nason and John H. McGuire haul the grub from St. Leonard's.

Our main boss James Hallett has his fine studs attached to a very nice buckboard, who looks after the business. Alexander Lee and Gabriel Brewer lay the spruce.

James Wolverton draws the reins over a fine pair of bays. He says he can haul as much as the best of them.

Thomas Graham is the boss of this camp. He is a good fellow and understands his business.
