MAKING THEIR WAY.

The editor of the Chatham World, who has been enjoying a holiday trip to the upper provinces, found that these lower provinces are well represented on the staffs of at least three of the leading daily newspapers of Canada published at Montreal.

The managing editor of the Montreal Star, is Mr. B. A. McNabb, a native of Wallace, N. S., who has worked his way up from the bottom rung of the ladder. Mr. McNabb evidently has full swing in the management of the Star. As Mr. Stewart puts it: "He overlooks everything, decides everything, employs everybody he wants, dismisses everybody he has no more use for, raises salaries, and cuts down or increases expenses at his own will."

The chief editorial writer on the Star is also a Nova Scotian, Mr. Percy St. Clair Hamilton a native of Truro, and son of the late Peter S. Hamilton, who in his day was one of the brightest journalists in the sister province.

There are also two Maritime men among the Star's reporters—Mr. J. M. McConnell son of Robt. McConnell late editor of the Halifax Chronicle, and Mr. Yorston. On the Gazette the visitor finds Mr. Scott, late of the St. John Telegraph, and Messrs. Mosher and O'Keefe, while one of the Herald's best men is young Mr. Arthur Hannay, a graduate of the St. John Telegraph.

The World editor says that men from these lower provinces show a broader culture, a wider range of ability, and greater adaptability, than their brethren of the upper provinces. The latter may be better as specialists, but the former take the lead as all-round workers. And what is true in journalism is equally true in mercantile life. There are dozens of Maritime men holding fine positions in Montreal business houses.

But it is not only in Montreal press circles that maritime province men are making their way to prominence. On the various New York papers, New Brunswick has such worthy representatives as John Boden, jr., Ernest McCready, Thomas Dieude, James Dever, and Mr. Van Thorne, all with the exception of the first named, graduates of the University of New Brunswick.

WANTS EXECUTIVE INTERVENTION.

The Toronto Globe has taken up the case of Editor McAdams, of Sandon, B. C., who was sentenced to nine months imprisonment for contempt of court. The Globe takes the same line as the Herald in condemning the method of the editor's trial, and suggests that it is a case in which the government should exercise executive clemency. The Globe observes:

"Had the court possessed the saving grace of a sense of humour, the affair would have ended with the apology which MacAdams made, and it is to be regretted that it did not end there. Courts are not expected to be vindictive on their own account, and an apology and retraction are almost invariably regarded as sufficient to absolve those charged with contempt. MacAdams is a young man of good parts, one of many from Ontario, who have gone to seek their fortunes in the freer atmosphere of the mining camps in the Rockies. We have criminals enough in the Dominion without imprisoning a young man who has criticized a court and apologized, even though he did the former in a truly mining-camp style. It seems a case for executive intervention. No good purpose can be served by inflict-

ing such punishment, but much harm will result to the victim. There is a strong feeling that citizens should have the right of trial by jury for contempt when such contempt does not interfere with the actual proceedings of a court, and that feeling will certainly be strengthened if there is even an appearance of vindictiveness on the part of the judiciary."

These views already expressed by the Herald, should be pressed on the government until a change is made in the mode of trying newspaper editors accused of contempt of court.

AN UNPOPULAR ORDER.

There is considerable excitement in Bank of Montreal circles over the recent order of the directors that officials of the bank must not marry unless they have an income of at least \$1,500.

Rev. Dr. Langtry, a prominent Anglican clergyman of Toronto has taken up the case for the clerks and uses very strong language in a letter published in the Toronto Mail and Empire. It is said that quite a number of the employees of the bank, drawing salaries less than \$1,500 have pledged their troth, and that several prospective weddings will have to be indefinitely postponed unless the obnoxious order is withdrawn.

Editor Smith, of the Chatham Advance, lectures certain New Brunswick newspapers on their lack of dignity and churlishness towards each other. The newspaper atmosphere is so clear and pleasant in Chatham that the Advance editor is quite entitled to mount the pedestal of propriety and read his contemporaries a lesson.

Fifteen Ontario newspapers are threatened with libel suits because they published a despatch in which it was stated that a young lady had eloped with a married man, taking some of her father's money.

The men of the fourth Canadian contingent which did not reach South Africa until peace had been proclaimed are not to receive medals, so it is declared by a recent army order received at Ottawa.

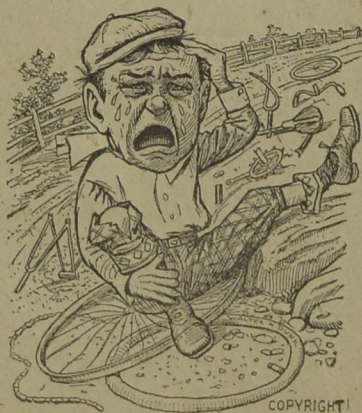
