REHEARSING THE CORONATION PROGRAMME.

C. P. R.'s Offer to Establish Fast Steamship Line Confirmed.

HIS MAJESTY'S CRUISE. (Special to Daily Herald.)

Cowes, July 25.—The royal yacht, Victoria and Albert, with the King on board, left today for a short cruise to the westward.

St. Petersburg, July 25.—A despatch from Seoul, Korea, says that England and Japan have jointly guaranteed the independence of the kingdom of Korea.

THE FAST LINE.

London, July 25.—The announcement from Montreal that the Canadian Pacific Railway has offered to establish a fast line service between Quebec and Liverpool in summer and between Halifax and Liverpool in winter, is confirmed.

The news is causing considerable stir in England, where it is bailed with de light as being an offset to the Morgan combine.

PREPARING FOR CORONATION. (Special to Daily Herald.)

London, July 25.—The coronation procession was rehearsed again this morning.

It has been decided to lower the throne dais so that the King will not be obliged to mount steps, and every possible measure will be taken to save His Majesty from fatigue.

The admiralty today issued a notice that the coronation review will be held at Spithead, August 16.

COLLISION ON THE RAIL.

Dayton, Ohio, July 25.—The Limited express from St. Louis to New York, while running 70 miles an hour, crashed into a coal car running wild near Trebeine, Ohio, last night and was completely wrecked and burned.

Charles McGowen, M. Peters, postal clerks, William Clarke, engineer, and William Dyer, fireman, were killed. Ten others were injured.

CORONATION FETES IN INDIA.

London, July 25.—The India Office has issued a sketch of the programme of the coronation fetes to be held at Delhi, India, between Dec. 20 and Jan. 10.

On the first day the Viceroy, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, and ruling chie's will make a state entry into Delhi mounted on elephants. The procession to the camp will be six miles long. The Viceroy will open the arts exhibition on the next day, and there will be a parade of 40,000 troops on Jan. 2. The other days will be devoted to reviews, religious services, illuminations, receptions and banquets.

JUVENILE SOLDIER.

Montreal, July 25.—A little chap in soldier's uniform on the platform attracted some attention on the arrival of the Canadian Mounted Rifles from Halifax. His name was Carl Jameson, and he hailed from Kingston, Ont. He was scarcely fifteen years of age, but the men said he had gone through the campaign like a brick. In some unaccountable manner he accompanied the Ontario men to Halifax when the Regt. was being mobilized there preparatory to its departure for the front, and was later found on the troopship, a stowaway. He was taken in hand by one of the officers, and accompanied him all through

the campaign as his servant. He was present at the Hart's River fight.

CAPTURED AN OUTLAW.

Frank Sabean, Burglar and Highwayman Run to Earth.

Halifax, July 25.—A desperado who for seven years has been defying the authorities of Nova Scotia, was yesterday captured in the streets of Bridgetown, on the Bay of Fundy. Frank Sabean, burglar and highwayman has been coming and going between Annapolis county and the United States, and all attempts of the police to hold him have failed. He found refuge and security in the mountains of Annapolis.

Seven years ago Detective Power of Halifax, with a posse, went over the mountains in the early evening and watched all night for Sabean, but saw no trace of him until gray daylight, when he was discovered. The detective was stationed in Sabean's father's house, and waited until Frank arrived at the house and opened the door, when he shoved a shotgun in the desperado's face and ordered him hand up or he would shoot. Sabean submitted. He was brought to town and jailed at Annapolis, but he soon escaped from his cell and was not definitely heard from again until about two years ago. An attempt was again made to capture him, but it failed.

Yesterday afternoon Policeman Avar Anderson of St. John, N. B., a 235 pound man and over six feet high, saw Sabean in Bridgetown. He went up to him and laid his hand upon Sabean, and immediately got a stiff blow in the jaw, but the policeman was equal to the occasion and returned the compliment between the eyes so effectively that Sabean was knocked out and handcuffed before he could get away.

Sabean had intended going to Waterville, but got off the train at Bridgetown by mistake.

Botha Says Help the British.

Cape Town, July 25.—Gen. Botha and De La Rey, who started from Pretoria Monday on their way to Europe, arrived here today and were met at the railway station by large crowds.

At a meeting held in the Dutch Reformed Church, Gen Botha said he wished to impress upon his bearers the necessity of working hand in hand with the British, as South Africa was the only country they could call home.

Gen. De La Rey said the Boers had buried their Mausers and their flag, but not their traditions.

A Canadian Agent in London.

An evident necessity begins to be generally felt for a Canadian Financial Agent, resident in London, says 'The Globe' of April 3, 1892. We have railway enterprises and canal enterprises and local improvements of all kinds going forward—money is wanted for them, and safer investments could not be; but though capital to any extent is now seeking employment in England, for the want of knowing how to bring our schemes before the English public, it does not come here. If a Canadian Finance Agency could be established in London with some well known person of standing and undoubted probity at its head—some one who knows the conditions and capabilities of Canada and whose opinion would carry weight with capitalists at home—the case might be very different. How often do we hear of municipal bonds and other securities being sacrificed at ruinous rates, which, if properly placed on the London market, would command a premium. There are at present a number of county and city municipalities and large corporations seeking loans—why could they not combine on some man in Canada, and one in England, who could together undertake to negotiate for them? This might be the commencement of a permanent arrangement—and at any rate, it would be an expedient and economical mode of obtaining their immediate demands.

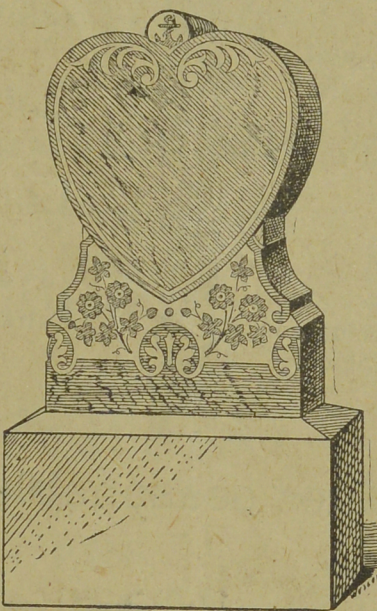

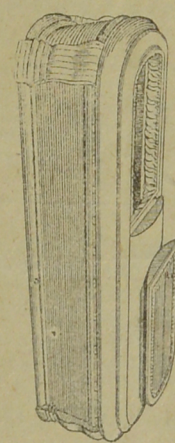
