BIG GAME PLENTIFUL.

Deer and Moose Are Frequently Seen on the North Shore.

A correspondent at Dalhousie Junction writes as follows to the Herald, under date of July 23rd:

A few minutes after the express left Dalhousie this morning and had just nicely got into the wooded part of the country, one of the brakemen came running back through the train yelling out, "Say boys, there is a big moose on the track just a few rods in front of the engine." The engineer worked away at the whistle and slowed up a bit and the moose, after running a piece, sloped off to the left of the road bed and attempted to jump the wire fence. It was so frightened however that it did not get all the way over, and had to come back again, and it really seemed puzzled to see that the train could not do it on the run. There were a number of passengers on the train and all ran and crowded to the doorway of the cars to get a look at the noble denizen of the forest. When the animal found it was overtaken it looked like thirty cents. Moose are frequently seen by train men, while passing through Restigouche county, and lately on this branch line, several herd of deer have been chased down. The other day when the train came on a herd of deer, all hands for a joke ran after one of the animals and caught it in the act of jumping a ditch. Some of the men stayed on one side of the ditch and the rest chased the deer up to the ditch, and when it went to leap over one of the men grabbed it around the neck, but let it go immediately after it was captured.

FARM LABORERS' EXCURSION

To Points in Manitoba and the North West.

A cheap Farm Laborers' Excursion will be run by the Canadian Pacific Railway during August to points in Manitoba and the Canadian Northwest, on a date to be named later. It is intended this year to make Winnipeg the preliminary destination of all laborers' tickets. The laborers on arrival there will be looked

after by a committee and distributed throughout Manitoba and the Northwest without additional cost. Farm laborers' certificates will be issued to each when going tickets are purchased and on presentation of this certificate, properly executed, at final destination the purchaser will, on payment of required amount, be returned to his original starting point. Going and return rates, dates, final time limit, etc., will be announced in a very few days.

His Second Visit.

Trooper James Tennant, of the C.M.R., who was invalided to England from South Africa, is visiting the motherland for the second time since the South African war broke out. It will be remembered that he was a member of the detachment of the first contingent which returned from the front by way of England and had the honor of being reviewed by the late Queen Victoria at Windsor Castle. During his present visit Trooper Tennant will have the good fortune to witness the King's coronation celebration in London and will probably see His Majesty.

The Hustlers Trimmed.

One of the best games of ball played here this season by junior teams, was witnessed last evening by upwards of one hundred spectators, when the Roses defeated the Hustlers by a score of 3 to 2. The game, which was a six inning one, was very closely contested throughout. At the end of the fifth inning the score was 1 to 1, but in the sixth inning the Roses run in 2 and the Hustlers 1, making the score 3 to 2 in favor of the Roses. The battery for the Roses was Butler and Corterman, and for the Hustlers, Walker and Clark. Allan Delong umpired the game very satisfactorily.

Visitors from Camp.

The Y. M. C. A. boys, who are living under canvass at Robinson's Point, Grand Lake, arrived in the city last evening in John Bridges' barge in tow of the tug Martello. This craft, which is a rather odd looking affair, is lying at the Normal School wharf, and the boys are living on board of her. This afternoon, two teams selected from the visitors, are playing base ball in Scully's grove. The party will leave on the return trip to camp at five o'clock this evening and expect to make the run in five hours.

FAST ATLANTIC LINE

C. P. P. Has Tendered for the Proposed Service.

Montreal, July 25.—Sir Thomas Shanghnessy announces that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has tendered for a fast Atlantic steamship service between Great Britain and Canada, and the company's tender is engaging the consideration of the imperial and Canadian government, and forms part of business conferences between the secretary of state for the colonies and the colonial statesmen, now in progress in London.

The president of the company, in making the announcement, said that if successful, the company would establish a satisfactory passenger and freight service. The line which the Canadian Pacific Company have in view, it is said, consists of new steamers, which, as regards equipment and speed, would be in advance of any now afloat. It is realized that in this would lie the hope of successful competition for the Atlantic passenger service, which would be a very important element in the production of revenue.

London, July 25.—The correspondent of the Times in Montreal says it is understood that, at the request of the Canadian ministers now in London, the Canadian Pacific Railway has offered to establish and work a weekly fast service between Quebec and Liverpool in the summer and between Halifax and Liverpool in the winter, with a good freight service. The company undertakes, according to the Times correspondent, to place four 20-knot passenger steamers and 10 moderate speed freighters with the best modern equipment on the route.

Re-mount Purchases.

Montreal, July 25.—Col. Dent states that the work of the British re-mount commission in Canada is now wound up. From April 1st, 1901, to July, 1902, the British government spent \$1,618,066 in Canada for the purchase, keep and railway freight of horses. Horses were purchased as follows: Ontario, 7,715; Quebec, 2,225; Maritime Provinces, 115; Northwest Territories, 886; a total of 10,941.

Bangor Hotel Fire.

Bangor, Me., July 24.—Fire in the Queen City Hotel in this city last night entailed a loss of \$14,000. All the guests of the house reached the street in safety. The building is owned by Wm. J. Cassidy, loss \$5,000. Loss on furniture owned by Pope E McKinnon, \$2,500. Loss to Central Cigar Company, which occupied the top floor, \$6,500. The insurance is \$7,000.

Struck a Church Steeple.

London, Ont., July 25.—During a fierce electric storm which broke over the city early yesterday morning the tower of the First Methodist church, which was 150 feet high, was struck and began to blaze quite freely. The firemen had great difficulty in getting the hose up into the tower, but succeeded in confining the fire within its limit. The interior of the church suffered no damage. The loss is about \$2,500, fully insured.
