FOUND WATERY GRAVES.

Emperor William Will Visit the King.

BALFOUR DECLARES ENGLAND WILL NOT INAUGURATE POLICY OF PROTECTION.

THE KING'S CONDITION.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Cowes, Isle of Wight, July 21.—King Edward today attended divine services conducted by Commodore Lambton, commander of the Victoria & Albert. Queen Alexandra and the others of the royal family on the yacht were also present. A cold northwest wind necessitated the enclosing of the sides and the stern of the deck where the king usually stays. His majesty now rises at 9 o'clock in the morning and takes his breakfast a half hour later after which he is visited by his physicians. The king's progress continues to surprise his doctors.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, July 21.—A bulletin issued on the condition of King Edward says: "King Edward is in excellent health and is gaining in strength, and the wound continues satisfactory. His Majesty was unable to spend any time on deck yesterday, owing to the unfavorable weather. The next bulletin will be issued July 24.

MEN CLAIM A VICTORY.

PREMIER TWEEDIE HEARD FROM

About the Rhodes' Scholarships—He Sails for Home Thursday.

Dr. Inch, chief superintendent of education is in receipt of a letter from Hon. L. J. Tweedie, dated at London, in which the premier writes that the trustees of Cecil Rhodes' will have decided that the provision for the Rhodes' scholarship at Oxford, apply to Canada equally with the United States, and that New Brunswick will have at least one scholarship. Premier Tweedie added that he and Mrs. Tweedie expected to sail for home July 24, not remaining for the coronation.

BIG LAWSUIT ENDED.

Title to 4,000 Acres of Land was in Question at Dorchester.

Dorchester, N. B., July 20.—The long continued land case of Senator Wood vs. LeBlanc, the trial of which commenced July 3rd before Justice McLeod of the supreme court, was concluded on Saturday night a few minutes before 12 o'clock. Six of the jury answered all the questions in favor of defendant for whom a verdict was recorded on such findings. The dispute involved the question of

title to 4,000 acres of wilderness land, a portion of the so called Sackville rights which the French settlers of Bon Homme, Gould Settlement, Memramcook, have claimed and occupied for nearly a century.

A little more than a year ago Mr Wood, through his agents, Messrs Calhoun of Calhoun's Mills, set up a claim to the tract in dispute with the result as stated. The case has attracted much interest in the parishes of Dorchester and Sackville and a small army of witnesses were examined. The oldest inhabitant were much in evidence. The French-Adadian settlers who were represented by Messrs. Pugsley, Emerson and Friel, are jubilant over their victory. Messrs. Powell and Teed represented the plaintiff.

SUCCESSFUL SEARCH FOR HEIRS.

Family Named Charles at Brimfield, Mass., Will Get Eccentric Man's Fortune.

Los Angeles, Calif., July 21.—The mystery surrounding the identity of the man known as "Charles Hill," who died at the Good Samaritan Hospital here on May 17, leaving \$142,000 in cash, has been solved. His real name was Salem Charles, and his home was at Brimfield, Mass.

The story of the search for heirs by the public administrator and his attorney, Leon Moss, is interesting. After following up innumerable alleged "clues", all of which came to naught, Administrator Kellogg found among the old man's effects an old family Bible, on the fly leaf of which was written sentences almost faded and rendered illegible by age. The writing was magnified and the name of "Charles" and "Brim—" Mass., were deciphered. Attorney Moss went to Brimfield, Mass., and not disclosing his identity, found a family named Charles, which had been prominent in that locality for 200 years. After a thorough investigation, Moss became convinced that he had found the family of the deceased.

There are eight direct heirs to the estate, the most prominent of whom is Salem Darius Charles, chairman of the Board of Street Commissioners of Boston.

The old man, Salem Charles, always had been an eccentric character and no reason has been found for his change of name. He is said to have made his money by importing cloth while residing in Texas, before and during the Civil War.

A Burglar's Invention.

Trenton, N. J., July 21.—Charles Filer, a burglar in State Prison, who was sentenced to serve ten years from May, 1896, and was pardoned yesterday, becomes superintendent of the Perfection Blind and Lockitch Sewing Machine Company, which was chartered here today with \$1,000,000 capital.

Filer, who is a machinist, invented a dropstitch for a sewing machine which sews seams in cloth without showing on the other side. The invention is a decided success, and has been in use in the prison workshops for three years.

The company which he enters on his release gives him \$5,000 cash and \$10,000 stock in the concern in addition to his position as superintendent.

PETERSVILLE.

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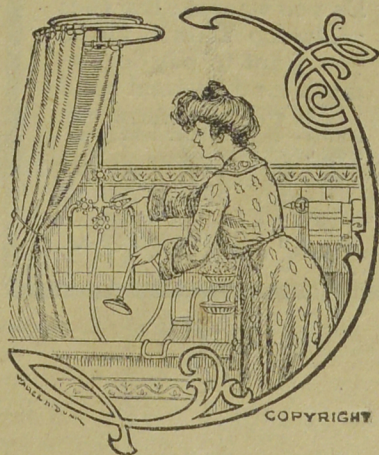

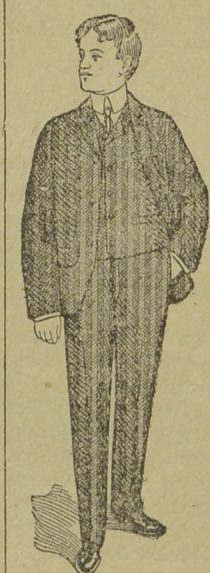
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
