ALCHEMY IN 1782.

How It Ended in a Tragedy for James Price, a Distinguished Chemist.

A remarkable series of experiments was commenced on May 6, 1782, by James Price, a distinguished amateur chemist and Fellow of the Royal Society, in his private laboratory at Guildford. During the preceding year he imagined that he had succeeded in compounding a powder capable, under certain circumstances, of converting mercury and other inferior metals into gold and silver. In order to convince his friends of the genuineness of the discovery he conducted these experiments in the presence of a select assemblage of men of rank, science and public character. The trials were seven in number and were spread over a period of nineteen days, and in all of them gold and silver in greater or less quantities were apparently produced from mercury. The Royal Society called upon Price to prove to the satisfaction of his brother fellows the truth of his alleged transmutations by repeating his experiments in their presence. He declined at first, adducing various reasons, but finally consented in January, 1783. He left London for his laboratory at Guildford, faithfully promising to return in 3 months, and confound as well as convince the doubting ones. He was not seen again for nearly six months, but suddenly turned up again in London and invited the members of the Royal Society to meet him at Guildford on August 3. On the appointed day three members only visited him, and they were received with cordiality by Price. He stepped to one side for a moment, and hastily swallowed the contents of a flask of laurel-water, the quickest and deadliest poison then known; in a few moments he was dead. Thus it was that alchemy, among scientific men at least, in England came to an end with the last act of a tragedy.

Impressing the Hotel.

There is a dignified man of more than average intelligence whose method of impressing himself upon the attention and commanding the respect of hotel landlords and unbending clerks in England, Europe and the interior cities of the United States is not wholly unworthy of imitation. Before setting out to take a course of baths at the Grand Hotel Pupp, Carlsbad, he has his secretary to address him in typewriting scores of envelopes gathered here and there among his business acquaintances, all bearing the firm imprint, a hundred or so to be mailed on each steamer. Being a member of seventeen clubs, social and commercial, he laves upon them for stationery also, having enough envelopes addressed to himself to attract attention when they arrive in batches of ten or a dozen at the Pupp. The impertinent curiosity of the average hotel clerk is thus utilized. He soon whispers it around that Mr. So-and-so is some pumpkins, as he is in correspondence with so many great firms and is so prominent in leading clubs. By remaining cold and distant Mr. So-and-so creates much interest.—New York Press.

THE ENGLISH PRIMROSE.

No Other Flower Holds an Equal Place in Britons' Affections.

No flower holds the same place in the affections of the people of the British isles as does the common primrose, *Primula vulgaris*. It is so closely associated with the country life that it would be hard to find a person who does not know what it is. One of the first flowers to open in spring, it is largely used to decorate the churches at Easter.

Rather different from the English sparrow and some other "institutions," it does not make itself entirely at home in North America, but as a garden plant it is well worthy of a little attention.

The greatest drawbacks to its welfare in this climate are the hot summers and severe winters, the former being the worst. But if planted where it can get a little shade and moisture in summer and a slight protection of leaves or other material in winter it will well repay for the extra care. It is hardly necessary to speak of the color, as it has given its name to that shade of pale yellow; but there are many garden hybrids of different colors, ranging through all the shades of blue and purple, that are very pretty and sweetly scented. The cowslip, *Primula veris* and *Primula officinalis*, names it is variously known under, is very much like the primrose in habit and general appearance, but the individual flowers are deeper yellow and smaller, with several borne on one stem, forming an umbel, while the blue primrose has only one flower on a stem.

Royal Presents of Tea.

Tea was highly esteemed in nearly every ancient Asiatic city near the sea and was used as a royal gift from the Chinese monarchs and great merchants to the potentates of the east. To the rajahs of Kandy, the sultans of Ceylon, the shoguns and daimios of Japan carefully selected samples of the leaves, packed in precious boxes, were sent with great regularity. Some must have been presents worthy of a crown. One of them was thus recorded: "It weighed forty catties (about fifty pounds), and each leaf was perfect in color, size and age. The leaves were divided into parcels of five maces each (a little over half an ounce) and each parcel was wrapped in pure silver foil. This was wrapped in turn in thin white paper and put into a little bag of bright colored silk. A hundred bags were placed in a porcelain jar whose lid was securely fastened and sealed, and each jar was protected by a box of camphor wood trimmed with silver hinges and ornaments."

Ancestors of Some Familiar Plants.

Some well established and interesting facts in botanical history relate to the origin of familiar plants. The ancestor of the large and fleshy cabbage was a veritable pigmy, a small plant weighing altogether scarcely half an ounce; a diminutive little vegetable, reddish in color and bitter in taste, has been metamorphosed into the inestimable potato; the sweet, juicy Altringham carrot, weighing from five to six pounds, is in a wild condition a dry, slender root unfit to eat; the delicate well flavored Vienna glass kohlrabi, as large as a man's fist, is when wild a slender, woody, dry stem; the cauliflower in its natural locality is a thin branched flowering stem, with the little green, bitter flower buds.

Florence Nightingale.

Florence Nightingale was born May 15, 1820, and is yet living in honored retirement at Embley Ramsey, Hants, England. She was educated as a nurse by the Protestant Sisters of Mercy at Kaiserwerth-on-the-Rhine, and proceeded to the Crimea in 1854, where she organized the nursing of the sick and wounded soldiers as it had never been attempted before. She received from the nation a testimonial of £50,000, which she devoted to the foundation of the Nightingale Home. She has published several valuable books on nursing.

Confirmed.

In April, 1858, the Prince was confirmed, in the presence of his parents and sisters. Among the other spectators were the three statesmen, Lord Derby, Lord John Russell, and Viscount Palmerston. The Archbishop of Canterbury performed the ceremony, and had examined the Prince on the previous day "for a full hour" says Prince Consort, "and Bertie acquitted himself extremely well."
