SIR WILFRID IN LONDON.

Mr Ford, who sends the London cables to the New York Tribune, speaking of the Dominion day banquet in London, says that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was received with vociferous cheers, made the speech of the evening. In response to the toast of the Dominion, he referred to Canada's devotion to the motherland, and claimed for Canada the distinction of having led the way in the direction of self-government for the colonies, which was at the root of their prosperity and the permanence of the empire. Though still a colony, Canada was a nation with a history. He spoke in humorous terms of the ignorance which still prevails in England concerning the Dominion.

The Canadian Premier is easily, as he was in the Diamond Jubilee celebration, the most prominent figure from the colonies, and is feted and admired as few public men have been. Sir Wilfrid, however, is not the kind of man to have his head turned by flattery, and he may be fully trusted to uphold the dignity and interests of Canada, whether in the Colonial Conference, the drawing rooms of London society or, in the after dinner speeches, which are such a feature of public life in England.

THE PRESS.

The Religious Intelligencer, which is now printed from the presses of Barnes & Co., St. John, comes to us this week changed from eight to sixteen pages, and presents a greatly improved appearance. The arrangement of matter is much more convenient and striking, and Dr. McLeod is to be congratulated on the changes.

The Newcastle Advocate has issued a splendid illustrated souvenir supplement, filled with excellent original and selected matter and highly creditable to the Messrs. Anslow. The press work is exceptionally fine.

One of the brightest and newsiest of our exchanges is the Moncton Transcript, which under Mr. Hawke's vigorous management has made great strides in the past few years. The Transcript can boast of possessing one of the best equipped offices in the maritime provinces, and the Herald congratulates its enterprising contemporary on the position it now occupies, and the influence it exerts.

It is certainly questionable taste for the newspapers to comment on an enquiry during its progress in favor of either one party or the other, and Commissioner Barry who is holding an investigation into the management of the Deaf and Dumb Institution would not be exceeding his duty if he exercised his authority to put a stop to the opinions that are being freely circulated in portions of the press. The public will weigh the evidence and render their own verdict after they are familiar with the testimony, and in the meantime no attempt should be made to create prejudices either one way or the other.

Toronto Globe: In view of the fact that so many of the colonial representatives who went to London to attend the coronation are lawyers, it is perhaps just as well that the ceremony has been materially changed since the coronation of George IV. On that occasion there was a royal feast during the afternoon, and the letter of a lady written at the time thus describes the later scene as she left the House of Lords at midnight:—"The Stair-Case was strewn with Lawyers and Aldermen, who, having partaken too plentifully of Turtle, were laying down, unable to move, and Groans of the Snoring were heard."

Some Alaskan Indians profess to have discovered the petrified remains of an enormous ship some 1200 feet long, which they declare is Noah's Ark. The alleged craft is on the Porcupine river near the Arctic circle in Alaska and is some thousands of feet above the sea level. The yarn comes via Tacoma, and coupled with the fact that its originators are Indians its authenticity may well be doubted. However as the sea serpent gag is about exhausted the Noah's Ark fancy will probably do duty instead.

St. John is giving itself up this week to the delegates attending the National Council of Women, and if one is to judge from the length of the programme, and the pretentious subjects it embraces, the council proposes effecting a general reformation of this apparently wicked country. There are some fluent talkers amongst the delegates, and a number of them have achieved distinction as moral reformers.

Our neighbors across the line are celebrating today the glorious fourth of July, and no doubt there has been the usual explosion of fire crackers and fervid oratory. It is to be hoped the spouters have not seriously twisted the British lion's tail. That kind of thing happily is not so fashionable as it used to be.

President Roosevelt, by proclamation, declares the war in the Philippines closed, has placed the islands under civil government, and extended amnesty to the rebels. Whitewinged peace seems to be flapping her wings all over the earth.

A variety of inferences may be made from the Sackville Tribune's observation that "Now that the students and ministers have left us, the town will settle down to its accustomed summer quiet."

The United States government on July 1, dropped war taxes amounting to \$73,000,000 per year. Uncle Sam has enormous recuperative powers.

The Montreal Star urges a grand public reception for the heroes of Hart's River, who are to arrive at Halifax, July 22.

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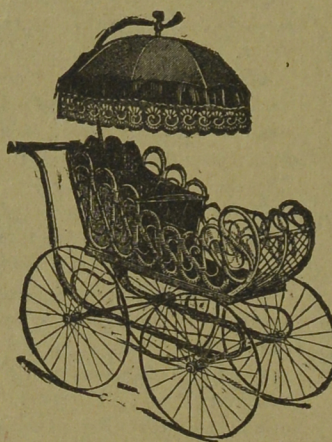
