London, July 3.—Everything points to a satisfactory if somewhat prolonged coronation of the King. It is expected the bulletins regarding the condition of the King will be reduced to one a day. (Small)

now haunt the bulletin boards at Buckingham Palace throughout the night. His Majesty's doctors are now attending to the more pressing portions of their private practices. Sir Frederick Treves absented himself from the coronation to attend the wedding of his daughter to Major Radcliff.

A number of coronation guests left London today, including the Crown Prince of Norway and Prince Komatsu, of Japan. Both were seen off by gatherings of distinguished persons at the station.

The coronation scene was witnessed today; a large number of Fijian soldiers were taken up in front of the palace. The men were barelegged and bareheaded; their hair was long and dyed, and with white cotton skirts and quaint tunics they presented a strange spectacle. In the afternoon the Fijians in their traditional dress solemnly intoned a hymn of intercession composed for the occasion. The following bulletin was posted at Buckingham Palace at 7 p. m.: "His Majesty had a comfortable day. His general condition is still further improved. The wound now causes him comparatively little pain."

London, July 4.—With the satisfactory progress of the King, a large number of official coronation functions are being carried out with the greatest brilliancy. The Indian and colonial guests of the coronation are being feted and entertained on all sides. Henry Irving gave an elaborate reception in their honor on the stage of the Lyceum Theatre last night, for the performance of Faust. The theatre was beautifully adorned and illuminated, and the eight hundred guests present included all official, literary and artistic London. Ambassador Choate and Mary White, secretary of the embassy, represented the United States.

In addition to the performance at the Opera last night, when a very brilliant audience assembled for the London debut of Miss Mary Garden, from Paris, who made a most successful appearance in Massinet's Manon, private concerts were given by Mrs John W MacKay and Mrs Adair. The guests at the latter function included the Dukes and Duchesses of Connaught, and Madame Nordica sang.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier was invited to the Baroness Burdett Coutts' garden party yesterday. The leading theatres are arranging special performances in honor of the premiers. Geo. Andrews, an actor-manager is entertaining them on Saturday with Paolo Francesca. It is generally believed that Mr. Fielding has been offered and declined a knighthood in recognition of his share in the Canadian preferential tariff.

Ottawa, Ont., July 4.—A message was received by Hon Mr Scott last night, from Mr Chamberlain, stating that His Majesty was gaining strength daily and on the road to recovery. It denies that His Majesty is being allowed to transact business. He is kept perfectly quiet and only physicians and members of the royal family are allowed to see him.

A DESPERATE CONVICT.

Committed Several Murders After Escaping from State Prison.

Seattle, July 4.—Harry Tracey, who recently escaped from the State prison, and who has been hotly pursued, killed Policeman Breeze in the city limits, and

fatally wounded Neil Rawley, after having murdered Deputy Sheriff Charles Raymond and probably fatally wounding Deputy Sheriff John Williams.

The convict is still at large and a reward of \$2,500 is offered for his capture.

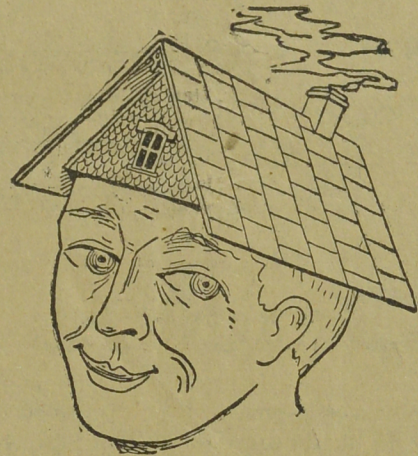
