The maid announces the serving of breakfast after the coffee-pot and the cereal, covered to keep hot, have been set in place, the coffee-pot at the right of the cover for the mistress and the dish of cereal directly before that of the master or some other adult. Before setting these upon the table the waitress ascertains if the family are in readiness for the meal.

Balls or pats of butter, cold bread and hot muffins are upon the side table, and the waitress is careful to note when a fresh supply is needed in order to forestall the need of asking for them.

The main dish of the meal, if this be prepared in individual portions, may be set before each individual, or in all cases the platter should be placed before the head of the house, who, carving when necessary, disposes the portions upon the plates set before him, one after another, by the waitress.

Potatoes, stewed tomatoes or any vegetable served with this course is passed upon a tray, a spoon or fork being first placed in the dish to the left of each individual, who helps himself. Small dishes, as a rule, are avoided.

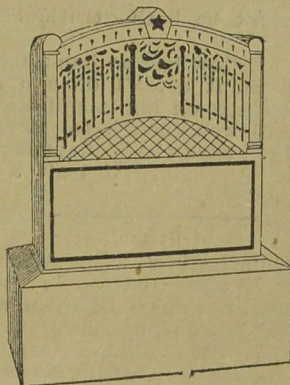
