

D. AND D. ENQUIRY.

Mr. Chestnut Concludes His Evidence.

IMMORALITY CHARGES TAKEN UP WITH CLOSED DOORS.

Mrs. J. Harvey Brown Objected to as an Escort for Witnesses.

At Thursday afternoon's session of the enquiry into the affairs of the commission to the Deaf and Dumb institution Mr. Henry Chestnut continued his evidence.

In reply to Mr. Phinney, Mr. Chestnut stated he did not handle any of the subscriptions or any monies except the government grants and the bequests he had mentioned in the morning.

A considerable time was taken up examining in to the affairs in connection with the building fund.

Mr. Chestnut explained that he honored all orders from Mr. Woodbridge as he claimed they were all right. At meetings of the board the property owned by the institution was discussed in a general way.

Witness said the members of the board including himself, gave their services free. Cross examined by Mr. Gregory witness stated that as far as he was aware no responsibility for the debts of the Institution was attached to any one but Prof. Woodbridge. He only kept account of monies which had come into his hands, and recognized Mr. Woodbridge as the only person authorized to draw orders on the treasury, and he held Mr. Woodbridge only responsible for money which he paid on over drafts.

The members of the committee were, Rev. Dr. Roberts, Rev. F. C. Hartley, Rev. Willard McDonald, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, Rev. J. J. Teasdale, J. W. Spurden, Havelock Coy, C. H. B. Fisher, A. R. Slipp, Dr. Crockett and himself. This committee accepted no responsibility, and only lent their moral support and gave advice. Mr. Woodbridge was the only responsible person for debts contracted.

The affairs of the building committee were here discussed at some length.

Mr. Chestnut said that the annual reports issued by Principal Woodbridge were passed and approved of by the committee.

In reply to Mr. Slipp, witness said he had attended the regular meetings as member of the committee, but as he was busy he never visited the Institution, although invited to do so. The committee had arranged to have regular visits to the Institution. The witness here made explanation regarding government and county grants.

In reply to Mr. Phinney, Mr. Chestnut said vacancies on the committees were filled by committee. Some times a large number were present at the meeting.

Witness had never heard of inaccuracy in the accounts. The annual report was always presented by Mr. Woodbridge to the committee and approved by them. He had reason to believe all orders presented by Mr. Woodbridge were for the Institution.

Adjourned until 10 a. m. today.

The Press Excluded.

The Deaf and Dumb enquiry was resumed this morning. The fourth charge, that of immorality, was taken up and it was decided to have the evidence taken with closed doors and to exclude the press.

Mr. Phinney, K. C., counsel for the complainants, wished to have Mrs. J. Harvey Brown admitted as an escort to the female witnesses, but to this Messrs. Gregory and Slipp objected. They were willing to have any person except Mrs. Brown, who they claimed had used undue influence with the witnesses and had been posing them for some weeks. The reporters at this point were compelled to retire.

Montreal, July 3.—A London cable to the Star says: "Much to the disappointment of many troopers and the general British public, who have seen far too little of them, Lieutenant-Colonel Pellatt and most of the Canadian contingent left Alexandra Palace this morning to embark on the Tunisian for Quebec. The return of the troops is explained by the business engagements of many members of the contingent."

TERRIBLY INJURED.

C. P. R. Sectionman Fell From Moving Train Near Harvey.

FOUND UNCONSCIOUS BESIDE THE TRACK

With Leg Broken in Two Places.

UNFORTUNATE MAN BELONGED TO PRINCE WILLIAM STATION.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Harvey Station, July 4.—When Section Foreman R. P. Grieve was going to work this morning with his men, they found Allan Glover of Prince William, who is also one of their gang, lying terribly injured and unconscious by the side of the track, about half a mile east of this station. One of his legs appeared to be broken in two places, and his head and face were badly cut. They brought him to the station.

Dr. Keith attended to him at once, he recovered partial consciousness but suffered severely. The doctor and Mr. Grieve had him taken to his home near Prince William station, but the full extent of his injuries is not yet known. Nor is it known how he was injured, but it is thought that he fell from the train last evening while returning from Fredericton Junction.

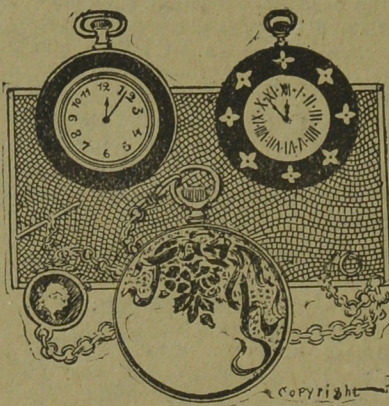
