IN YACHTING CIRCLES.

Schedule of Races Arranged—The Officers Selected.

A large and enthusiastic meeting of those interested in yachting was held last evening at the Bicycle and Boating Club House. A schedule of races for the silver cup, won last year by the Asthore, was arranged. Among those present were: Duff King, Charles Fleet and George McCorquindale, sailors of the Asthore, Frank Hersey, of the Summer Girl, Otto Brewer, owner of the Lark, Joe McPeake, owner of the Waptec, Chauncey Coleman, owner of the Doreen, and Bayard Simmons, Norman Tennant and Geo. Aiken, owners of the Cygnet. The Shark, owned by Louis Bliss, was also entered, and the Marguerite, owned by W. B. Ganong, in case anything should happen to the Asthore, will also be raced.

The first race will come off on July 16, the course being the same as last year and a race will be sailed every Wednesday afternoon throughout the season, the first gun being fired at 3.55 o'clock and the starting gun at 4 o'clock, allowing the yachts 5 minutes to manoeuvre for a start. The races will be sailed under the rules of the Royal Kennebecensis Yacht Club. One rule observed last year to the effect that not more than three and not less than two, should sail in each boat, was changed to read, not more than three and so allow one man to sail his yacht in a light wind if necessary.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT

By Which Henry McAloon, of Stanley, Lost His Life.

Further particulars are now at hand concerning the drowning accident at Stanley yesterday, by which Harry McAloon eldest son of E. McAloon and a well known and popular young man of Stanley lost his life. Instead of going around by the bridge he wished to make a short cut to the village from his home and tried to cross the mill pond on a log. The pond is formed by a dam across the river at that place and there is probably about 14 feet of water at present. While at about the middle of the pond the young man lost his balance and fell into the water, and being unable to swim, immediately sank. His father and brother were standing on the bank when he disappeared. A number of the mill men who saw the accident hastened to his assistance but were too late. The body was wrangled for and found half an hour after the accident. The sorrowing family and friends have the sincere sympathy of the community in the heavy loss which they have sustained.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning with services at the R.C. church by Rev. Father Ryan.
