THE POPE'S HEALTH

London, Jan. 6.—The report from Rome that the Pope is in a precarious condition, it has not yet as been confirmed and is not generally credited.

A BOER DEFEAT.

Bloemfontein, Jan. 6.—Boers' force of constabulary encountered Boers on the Central Orange River Colony on Saturday, and killed Field Cornet Pretorius and ten men. They captured 35 Boers including Field Cornets Lerou and Erasmus.

AN OCEAN HORROR.

London, Jan. 6.—The British steamer Alphonse, collided with a Spanish steamer off the Coast of Portugal on Saturday night, and both vessels sank. Eighteen men of the British crew and one Spaniard were drowned. The rest were picked up.

MANITOBA AND PROHIBITION.

Premier Roblin Says Public Sentiment is not Behind the Act.

Winnipeg, January 6.—In the course of an interview James Roblin, premier of Manitoba stated that the government will not ask the legislature to either repeal or alter the liquor act as he is not certain that there is a preponderance of sentiment in the province in favor of the act. He will await and see what the Ontario government proposes to do.

If Ontario does not fulfil pledges Manitoba will pursue its own course. If both provinces were to force prohibition the moral effect would be great. He thinks it would do the temperance cause harm to enforce law if the preponderance of public sentiment was not favorable to it.

KIPLING'S LATEST.

"The Islander" is the Title of His Vigorous Rebuke to His Own Countrymen.

London, Jan. 4.—In a vigorous poem, contributed to lay to the Times, and addressed to "The Islander," Rudyard Kipling rebukes his countrymen for their apathetic dependence on their imaginary safety of their insular position, which ended disastrously in South Africa. Kipling seems to advocate some kind of compulsory military service. "The Islander" concludes with these lines:

"No doubt ye are the people, absolute strong and wise,
Whatever your heart has desired, ye
Have been fulfilled from your eyes.
On your own heads, in your own hands,
The sin and the saving lies."

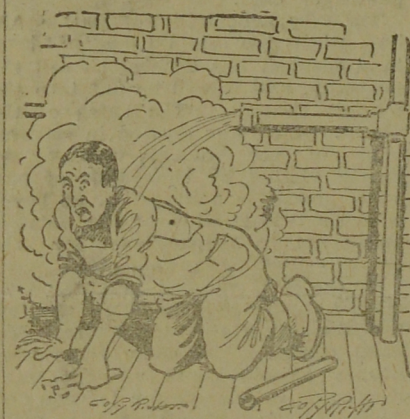
