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EVOLUTION AND JUDGMENT.

Prof. Clark on the Day of Judgment.

NO SUCH THING AS CONSCIENCE

And Free Will if Evolution is True.

A JUDGMENT DAY ALWAYS PRESENT WITH US.

Continuing the course of sermons which is being preached at St. George's Church, Montreal, upon the four last things, Rev. Professor Clark, Sunday night, addressed a large congregation on the judgment day. The preacher took as his text Acts x., 22: "And he commanded us to preach unto the people, and to testify that it is He which was ordained of God to be the judge of quick and dead." "Is man's life," asked the preacher, "moral or physical? Is it a series of causes and effects, or is it moral, presided over by an infinite mind?" The idea of evolution, as generally given, was the springing from the germ of all kinds of life and form. If this were true there was no such thing as conscience, and no such thing as free will, and it is only a matter of opinion whether or not their existed a God. If it was said there was no judgment day, many difficulties would be met with. The case of human legislation was instanced. Law was made for men, and men were responsible to it. The forgers and counterfeiters, who had lately been working in the city had felt secure enough. The hand of law had reached them, and when they had been locked up as a punishment for their offences it was a declaration that they were responsible for their actions. If it be that men's actions are the result of evolution, these men are objects of compassion and not of resentment. Then crime is a disease, and should be treated in a hospital, in order to restore a better condition of body and mind. The effect of judgment appeared in every man's personal life. There was not a man who did not bear in his own body the consequences and tokens of the acts of himself and his forbears. The drunkard's punishment was evident to all; gluttony, which a great physician had declared more degrading, morally and physically, than even drunkenness, showed itself upon the faces and figures and life of all its victims. Anger and all other vices had the same effect on men's bodies and souls. There was not a day which was not a judgment day. "There will," said the preacher, "be a great judgment day. And wrongs undressed here will sweep on to the ocean of eternity, there to be dealt with."

Professor Clark then said that while there was judgment there was also mercy. There was punishment, and there was pardon, for, despite our sins, God would restore us as his children. "And," concluded the preacher, "united we shall have that perfect fellowship with God which we have forfeited by our sins against His love and grace."

A TOOTH CAUSES A SUIT.

Toronto, Dec. 11.—In the County Court yesterday Judge Morgan commenced the hearing of the case of John and Beatrice Hendren against Dr. Malcolm W. Sparrow, a dentist. The action is for \$200 damages for alleged negligent and careless work done by the doctor upon Mrs. Hendren's teeth. On June 4 of this year Mr. Hendren went to Dr. Sparrow and had twelve teeth and two stomps extracted, having been told this might aid her digestion. She took chloroform, and while under its influence she says a tooth which the dentist had extracted was allowed to fall down her throat. When the chloroform

effect had worn off Mrs. Hendren was taken with a bad cough, which continued at intervals for a month, at the conclusion of which time a tooth was coughed up. The tooth was in court, and was pronounced by experts to be a wisdom tooth. Dr. Sparrow replies that he did not extract a wisdom tooth on the occasion mentioned.

Aiken's Camp, Dec. 8.—As we were reading items from other camps we thought we would write you a little to let you know how we are getting along on the Aroostook.

We are forty miles back in the giant forest. Our crew consists of about forty good natured fellows. About thirty are province boys, while the rest are from Houlton and suburbs. Our boss is Alfred White of Marysville. He is a good fellow and about the best foreman on the Aroostook waters. We have four teams, the Leaders, being the big blacks. Eben Adams holds the reins and Jimmie Tabor and Miles Sanders cuts the logs, with David Sanders and Larry Burns as their jolly swampers. Alfred Poor is their team tender and Fred Lowney the landing tender. Charles Hallet drives the little blacks; William Cameron and John McDannah lay the logs low and Sandy Lyons and William Poor are the swampers. They say they can get as many logs as any team on the waters, but the Leaders know better than that. Reuben Crawford is driving the dapple bays; the choppers are the Nash brothers, their head swamper is Melbourne Ward, accompanied by Alex. McSheffrey. Last, but not least, are the bays, which Isaac Hunter tends, with Walter Shanks as swamper for him.

We are building a beaver house and Lewis Leel has a busy time gathering moss to stop the cracks.

Our cook is Herbert Brewer, of Mangerville, who can dish up with any of them, Wilser Ward being his cookee.

Moose, deer and smaller game are very thick.

We have some very comical games every night and some good singers, the Mitchell boom choir being here. Joseph Foster is our leading singer. He gives us a solo about every night. The practical joker of the camp is Charles Hallett, who gives a song and dance every night.

Three of our men have had the bad luck to cut themselves, John McDannah, Walter Shanks and Henry Gibson, who are slowly recovering under the care of Dr. Hallett.

There is about ten inches of snow here and prospects of more, as it is snowing now.

S. S. CONVENTION.

Very Successful and Interesting Gathering at Stanley.

Stanley, Dec. 9.—The Parish Sabbath School Convention which met in St. Peter's Church of Scotland, Stanley, on Monday afternoon and evening, was not largely attended, owing to the extreme coldness of the day and the long drives necessary to many of those deeply interested in the work, who would otherwise have been present.

The first session opened at 2:30 o'clock with the singing of the hymn, "I Need Thee Every Hour," Miss Mullan presiding at the organ. The Parish President of the association, Mr. Eric Clarkson of Williamsburgh, occupied the chair, and called upon the Field Secretary, Rev. Mr. Lucas, to lead in the opening devotional exercises. The minutes of the last meeting were read by Mr. Frederick Pincock, parish secretary, and approved. Some interesting discussions took place during the afternoon, which should tend towards advancement in the line of Sabbath School work, both in the home and school, the Methodist and Presbyterian pastors promising to co-operate more fully with the superintendent of the school in Williamsburgh in working up an interest in a proposed normal class. The session closed by the singing of "Blest be the Tie That Binds," and the benediction.

At the evening session, which was opened with the singing of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," Rev. Mr. Lucas gave a normal lesson which was particularly interesting and instructive, and was followed by the president giving his experience of what he considered had been a benefit to him in his work of superintendent of the union Sabbath School in his locality. The Secretary, after a discussion on the temperance work of the Sabbath School, told of the increase of interest evinced in some of the schools in the parish, and was given words of encouragement to push on the work so nobly begun.

The names presented by the nominating committee were received and heartily approved by the convention as an executive for the ensuing year, namely, Mr. Eric Clarkson, Mrs. E. A. Bell, Mr. Frederick Pincock and the Misses Lavinia McNutt and H. Josie Mullan.

The Field Secretary conveyed to Rev. Mr. Mullan and his trustees the sincere thanks of the convention for the use of the Kirk for this meeting.
