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BANISHED THEIR BOY.

Parents Did It to Avoid a Worse Punishment.

HE MUST STAY THREE YEARS IN A LONELY HUT NEAR SHINNECOCK BAY.

Governor Will be Appealed to, in Order to Prevent Carrying This Out.

New York, April 15.—As a sequel of the confession of Leonard Robinson, the 14-year-old boy, that he had plotted to murder his playmate, Jessie Danes, an appeal probably will be made to the governor to prevent the carrying out of the agreement.

The lad was banished to a lonely hut overlooking Shinnecock bay, L. I., 35 miles from his home, and must remain there three years. The boy spends his time clamming and duck shooting.

There is no law, it is admitted by those who were at interest in the case, for such a punishment. It was simply a "concession" made by the father of the girl he plotted to assassinate, when the boy's father and mother begged that he would not push the case and send their son to a reformatory or a lunatic asylum.

The "compromise" was reached out of court, and Judge Conlin consented to the remarkable arrangement. The boy has become tired of his part in the agreement and violated it by visiting his mother.

He was severely reprimanded by the authorities, and was hurried back to his hut. Now there is talk of an appeal to the governor.

Marriage in Kankakee, Ill., That Was Long Delayed on Account of a Mother's Death Bed Request.

Kankakee, Ill., April 15.—In the marriage of Miss Cordelia Boilard of this city to Isadore Mercier of San Antonio, Tex., is a story of a romance begun 22 years ago. The marriage took place last Wednesday afternoon at the home of the bride's father, Charles Boilard.

In 1880 Miss Boilard and Mr. Mercier were engaged to be married. All preparations had been made for their wedding when Miss Boilard's mother was stricken with a fatal illness. She devotedly loved her husband and was pained by the thought that he would be left alone. Cordelia was the only one of three daughters who remained at home, the others having married and removed from Kankakee. Just before she died Mrs. Boilard exacted a promise from Cordelia that she would remain with and care for her father and her orphan niece, Matilda Cyrier.

Cordelia would not leave her father, and, after vainly urging her to fulfil her engagement with him, her lover left for the west to seek his fortune. He prospered beyond his expectations, finally locating in San Antonio, Tex., where he is proprietor of a jewelry store. During all these years he never revisited Kankakee and wrote no letters to his former sweetheart.

Last summer Mr. Mercier gratified an inclination to return to Kankakee. He met the sweetheart of his youth, and they renewed their attachment for each other. He returned to Texas, but with the understanding that he would come back to Kankakee this month to claim his bride.

The wedding was a quiet affair, and immediately afterward Mr. and Mrs. Mercier left for Chicago, where they will spend a few days before starting for their home in Texas.

RENOUNCED HIS BIRTHRIGHT.

Prince Eugene, of Sweden, Will, it is Stated, Marry an American Heiress.

New York, April 15.—The Journal prints the following story:

Captivated by the dash and beauty of an American girl, Prince Eugene, of Sweden, will renounce a kingdom in order to marry her.

The prospective bride is Miss Helen Gorman Wild, of Baltimore, who is a large heiress in her own right and one of the best known of the younger set in the exclusive circles of that city, and equally well known in New York society.

Prince Eugene is the fourth son of Prince Oscar, of Sweden and Norway. There are two reasons why he must renounce his rights of succession to the throne. First, his bride is not of royal blood, and second, because she is of the Catholic faith.

The Prince, however, turned a deaf ear to all objections raised by the King and announced his intention of relinquishing all rights to the succession. He was willing to renounce all claim forever on the throne of his father. In this he had a staunch ally in his royal mother. She persuaded the King that it was for the happiness of their son, to permit the marriage.

The Queen, his mother, has a private fortune of more than \$25,000,000. This, it is said, she has determined to divide equally between her sons Bernadotte and Eugene.

Prince Eugene is a handsome young man, highly educated and blessed with a highly artistic temperament.

It is expected that the wedding will be celebrated soon in a little Catholic chapel in Paris, where the couple have attended service with their friends.

NORTHWEST AUTONOMY.

Premier Haultain Introduces His Resolution.

Regina, N.W.T., April 15.—In the Legislature today Premier Haultain introduced his autonomy resolution, which is as follows:—"That the House regrets that the Federal Government has decided not to introduce legislation at the present session of Parliament with a view to granting Provincial institutions to the Territories."

The Premier spoke at some length in support of the resolution. Dr. Patrick moved a lengthy amendment, repudiating the action of the Territorial Government in treating for provincial status without first getting the sanction of the electors, and also for favoring two provinces. Dr. Patrick spoke at considerable length on his amendment, contending that the Territorial Government had no mandate on the question. He was followed by Dr. Elliott, who said the Government had a mandate to treat on this question with the Dominion Government. Thomas McKay spoke in favor of the amendment, and of having two Provinces. He urged the adjournment of the question for twelve months to consult the electorate. Mr. Gillies followed in favor of the motion. Mr. Villeneuve advocated two Provinces. Mr. Smith spoke in favor of the motion. Mr. R. B. Bennett spoke at length in favor of political autonomy. He thought the Territorial Executive had gone before the resolution in negotiating terms before consulting the Assembly. Hon. A. L. Sifton, followed in favor of the motion and a single Province. Mr. McDonald spoke next in favor of the amendment. The debate is proceeding.

"HELEN'S BABY" MARRIED.

"Budge" Habberton, Now a Young Giant, Weds a New York Girl, and Will Live Near Old Home.

Montclair, N. J., April 15.—Word has just reached here that John Lawrence Habberton, of New York, and Miss Bessie Greer Ackerman have been married. Mr. Habberton was formerly a resident of Montclair, this being his native town.

His father, John Habberton, is the author of the famous "Helen's Babies," and while young Mr. Habberton is now a powerful young giant, he remains, in the minds of Montclair people, a five-year-baby, the original of "Budge" in his father's books.
