

MURDER MOST FOUL.

Body of William Doherty
Found Near Rockwood
Park St. John.

MET DEATH BY THE HAND OF AN ASSASSIN.

Body Badly Mutilated and Hid-
den by Bushes.

ONE OF THE MOST ATROCIOUS CRIMES IN THE ANNALS OF THE PROVINCE.

The body of William Doherty, aged 17 years, and son of Joseph Doherty, of No 79 Brussels street, was found Monday afternoon a little beyond Rockwood park boundary and there is every evidence that the young man was murdered in the most foul manner.

The body, when discovered was a ghastly sight, the face being badly bruised, cut and blood-stained; so badly in fact that persons who knew the young man well could not recognize him.

The case is one of mystery and Coroner Berryman and the police are working on it, but without a clue to just how the death was caused or by whom. There is little doubt in the minds of those who have examined the body that it is a clear case of murder, but how or when the young man lost his life is so far a mystery.

The body was found in a hollow about 50 yards from a foot path, which is a continuation of a drive way known as "Lovers Lane," and runs about north-east from the park restaurant and along the northwestern side of the park where the moose and golden pheasants are kept.

At the end of the driveway is a clearing and farther on a footpath in a secluded spot is where the body was found by young Harry Beckwith.

Harry Beckwith the young man who discovered the body, lives on the Marsh Road just across the bridge. He says he was picking berries in a close proximity what is called an old military road. This road long ago fell into disuse and is now nothing more than a path for the convenience of berry-pickers. Partially hidden from the road by the trees, long grass, weeds and berry bushes, in a cradle-like hollow lined deeply with grass and weed, the body was found.

In conversation with Telegraph reporters Beckwith said he was out picking berries and during the rambling attendant upon such an occupation he came in the vicinity of this clump of spruce. He was busily picking away at half-past 2 or 3 o'clock when he noticed a swarm of flies buzzing around a heap of charred spruce brush and stones. He paid indifferent attention to the place for a time but at became curious and went toward it.

He took hold of the tapering end of the largest piece of wood, which was a small tree broken off at the stump. Moving this and one or two more of a number of systematically piled sticks he was horrified to see the back of a man's body, lying with the head pointing northeast, and scarcely visible in the grass lining of the hollow.

He didn't wait to investigate, but rushed down the path toward the park.

The body was found between 2.30 and 3 o'clock, according to Beckwith. It was 4.30 when the news reached Chief Clark at his office in central police station. He immediately send Deputy Chief Jenkins and Officer Earle to look into the matter. Coroner D. E. Berryman was also notified and, taking a carriage was soon on the scene. He ordered the body of the then unidentified young man to be removed to the city morgue and made other arrangements for a thorough investigation of the place where the body was found, and the surroundings.

An inquest is to be held over the remains.

Rubies Rare.

In trade three classes of rubies are distinguished—rubies of the orient, rubies of Siam and spinel rubies. The ruby of the orient is the first of all colored stones in beauty, as in price. Its marvelous hue is that of the human blood as it jets from an open artery, that of the red ray of the solar spectrum at its maximum intensity.

The ruby is one of the most exquisite products of nature, but it is becoming more and more rare to find it perfect. It even causes astonishment to find an oriental ruby as large in size as the topazes and sapphires of the same countries. If it reaches a certain size, it is almost always filled with defects. Rubies of all sizes are put to use. The smallest, down to twenty or thirty to the carat, are employed specially for delicate jewels, for numbers, figures, etc. Many of the smallest are cabochons. When a ruby exceeds the weight of a carat, it commands a high price. A ruby may fetch ten or twenty times the price of a diamond of the same weight if it is really of a superior quality.

How Lincoln Refused.

Judge Glenni W. Scofield was a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln. A Warren county private, having knocked down his captain, was tried, convicted and sentenced to the Dry Tortugas. His friends urged Scofield to have him released, so he went to see the president and told his story. 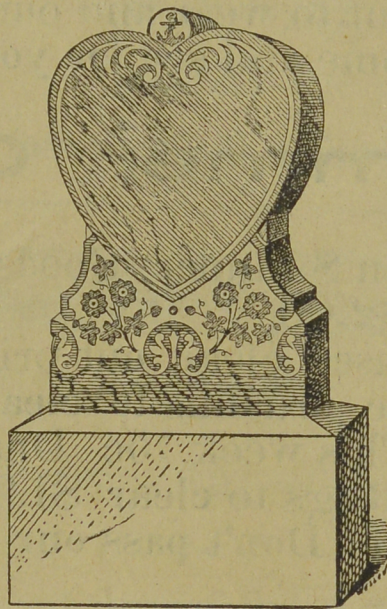
