Our genial friend, Mr. John D. Chipman, of Saint Stephen, has been visiting the Pacific coast, and talking with the newspaper men of Vancouver. The World of the Pacific says: "Mr. John D. Chipman, of St. Stephen, N. B., arrived in Vancouver yesterday. He is on a pleasure trip through the west and he has been very enthusiastic over what he has seen. Mr. Chipman is an ex-member of the New Brunswick legislature, a speaker of politics in that province, and says there is a determined effort on foot to oust the present administration which under Premier Tweedie has been far from satisfactory, and party lines in provincial politics is the pass word."

Mr. Chipman has evidently not been keeping in touch with his political friends in the east during his journeyings in the western country. If he had kept himself posted he would have known that "party lines in provincial politics" is not the pass word with his leaders. If Mr. Chipman had read Mr. Hazen's speeches in the various places the opposition leader has visited, he would have discovered that Mr. Hazen is making piteous appeals to the Liberals of New Brunswick to come to his assistance.

When he talked to the Vancouver World interviewer he must have imagined that he had just returned from the Moncton Tory convention of 1898, when the Tory machine tried to drive all Conservatives out of the local government ranks, and succeeded in alienating Mr. Chipman from his former party allegiance.

Mr. Hazen should wire his friend Chipman that the whole programme has been changed and that the opposition leader is beseeching, begging, imploring the Liberals to give him a lift. Mr. Hazen might add a postscript to his telegram to the effect that he is not meeting with the success that he anticipated.

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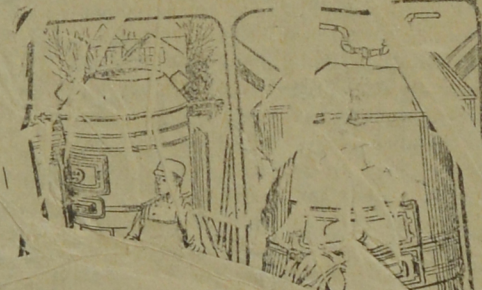
