

BLAIR'S GENTLE HINT

Minister Does Not Believe in Airing His Personal Opinions

ON A PUBLIC QUESTION THROUGH THE PRESS.

It Would be Discourteous and Unconstitutional.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Winnipeg, Oct. 6.—Before leaving for the Pacific coast Hon. A. G. Blair's attention was called to the fact that there was some feeling among western grain men and shippers in general, that to assist all concerned a suspension of the coasting regulations regarding the carriage of Canadian cargoes to Canadian ports might be beneficial this fall should it be found that the Canadian vessels could not handle all the western output. Mr. Blair was asked for an expression of his personal opinion on this point. "I do not wish to be discourteous," said the Minister of Railways, "but I could not discuss a matter of so much importance for publication. As a Minister of the Crown I have no right to take upon myself the liberty of giving out my private opinions for publication. I have always held that ground, and consider that it would not be constitutional to do otherwise. I might have very strong views on the subject, but my colleagues might not be in accord with me. If on this or any other subject, where I considered the matter of vital importance, I held views that I could not bring my colleagues to agree with, then I would withdraw from them. I would consider meanwhile that it would be discourteous to them to give out my views through the public press before I had, as a Minister of the Crown, given my colleagues the benefit of these views, and either convinced them of their wisdom or was myself convinced of my error. So you will pardon me if I decline to discuss with you matters of public import, as I could not conscientiously do so."

MR. FREEMAN WELCOMED.

Former Fredericton Pastor Given the Glad Hand by His New Toronto Charge.

The formal reception of the Rev. J. D. Freeman, the new pastor of Bloor Street Baptist Church, took place last night, and was such as to cheer the heart of the pastor and assure him of the hearty support of the congregation. The proceedings began by an informal reception, followed by tea in the large school-room. After tea an adjournment was made to the church, which was filled by the congregation and friends. Mr. John Stark, senior deacon, presided, Rev. W. King of Parliament Street Baptist Church read the Scriptures, and Rev. Mr. Schutt of the Century Church, North Toronto, offered prayer.

The chairman then delivered an address of welcome, in the course of which he referred to the fact that four previous pastors had been called to professorships in the college, and if any further attempts were made by the colleges, Bloor Street would have to bar the faculty and lock the doors.

Rev. Mr. Wallace of Bloor Street Presbyterian Church and Rev. John Neil of Westminster Presbyterian Church extended a very cordial welcome to Mr. Freeman. The Rev. Dr. Thomas followed, with the message of welcome from the Baptist ministers and churches of the city.

Rev. Chancellor Wallace spoke for the educational interests of the Baptist Church, and greeted Mr. Freeman as a fellow worker.

Rev. Dr. Harris, on behalf of former pastors of the church, assured Mr. Freeman that he was coming to a united congregation, the members of which would hold up his hands in the work.

Rev. E. R. Roberts on behalf of the six thousand readers of The Canadian Baptist joined in the welcome, and assured the new pastor that he would be a welcome addition to the roll of Toronto clergymen. Rev. W. E. Norton, the Superintendent of Home Missions, also spoke briefly.

Rev. J. D. Freeman, whose reception was most cordial, expressed his deep gratitude for the cordiality of the welcome, and hoped he would justify one half the kind prophecies that had been made for him.

The Rev. P. C. Parker of the First Avenue Baptist Church, closed the proceedings with prayer.

During the evening the choir of the church, under the leadership of Mr. Fletcher, rendered some fine selections.

VERY SUDDEN DEATH

Of Mrs. Frances J. Morehouse at the Home of Rainsford Balloch at Kingsclear.

Mrs. Frances J. Morehouse, widow of the late Charles Morehouse of Queensbury, passed away very suddenly Sunday afternoon at the home of her son-in-law, Rainsford Balloch, on the back road just above the city. She attended service at St. Ann's church in the forenoon and was then in the enjoyment of her usual good health. Upon returning home she ate a hearty dinner, and a short time afterwards while conversing with members of the household, was seized with a fit of coughing and in a few minutes was dead. Dr. Atherton was summoned from the city, but arrived too late to be of any assistance. He expressed the opinion that death had resulted from an attack of hemorrhage of the lungs.

The deceased lady was in her 51st year, and is survived by a family of three daughters, Mrs. Balloch, with whom she resided, Mrs. (Dr.) Cousins of Ottawa and Mrs. Hodgson of Edmundston. Frederick Morehouse of Marysville, is a nephew. She was a native of the Parish of Queensbury, but for a number of years, subsequent to the death of her husband, the late Charles Morehouse, made her home with her daughter at Ottawa. She has been living with Mrs. Balloch since the month of July last.

The late Mrs. Morehouse was a lady

possessed of a most kindly and loveable disposition and was highly esteemed by her acquaintances. She was very active for one of her years, and had always enjoyed the best of health.

Mr. Balloch, whose business requires his presence in Edmundston and Quebec a good part of the year, is absent from home at present, but has been notified of the sad occurrence by wire. He is expected home this evening or tomorrow at noon.

The funeral will take place at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon at St. Peter's church, Springhill, with services by Rev. H. Montgomery and John G. Adams, undertaker in charge.

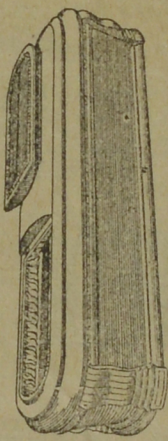

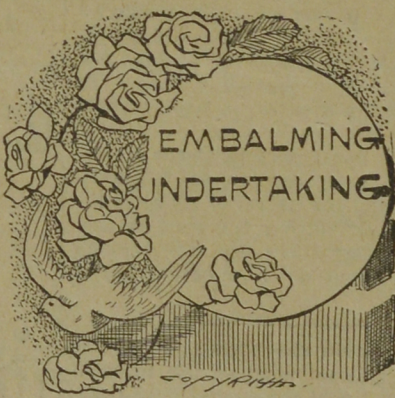
