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WANT NEW ONTARIO LAND.

New Chicago Syndicate Have Large Plans.

PRELIMINARY INTERVIEWS WITH PREMIER ROSS.

Will Do Big Things in New Ontario if They Get a Chance.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—A couple of interviews took place yesterday between Premier Ross and Mr. John F. Langan and Mr. E. F. Getchell of Chicago, who are here in connection with the proposed investment of large sums of American capital in northern Ontario. "Our interviews so far have been satisfactory," said Mr. Langan to a Globe representative, "but it must be understood that our visit is only preliminary, and that no definite plan has yet been formed. I may say, however, that we have plenty of capital behind us, conservative though it is, and no action will be taken until we see we have a good opportunity."

"What direction will your investment take?"

"Oh, we will invest in power, timber and colonization if we get an opportunity, and if necessary we are prepared to build a railway. If the land, timber and power are to be had, our establishments will rival the Clergue industries."

"In what direction do you look for suitable land?"

"In Nipissing, north of the height of land. We expect the Government railway will reach that land, and if not there will be feeders built to connect it with the main line of the new Grand Trunk Pacific."

"What machinery will you use to get settlers?"

"We will use the machinery of two or three of the great railways in the western States, which run through a farming country from which there is at present a big movement to western Canada. We would be prepared to go on and assist the movement by surveying land ourselves. We could settle two or three million acres if they were available. If we cannot get land in Ontario under good conditions we will look to the valley of the Saskatchewan."

Mr. Langan was asked if the western American settlers would be suitable for a timbered country like new Ontario. He replied that many of the immigrants would be Scandinavian-Americans, whose very nature was suited to a forested country. Mr. Langan and Mr. Getchell will interview Mr. F. H. Clergue to ascertain the opportunities for settlement in northern Algoma in the territory to be traversed by the Algoma Central & Hudson's Bay Railway.

A proposition will be prepared by Mr. Langan for submission to the Government, but it may be that for the present no further claim will be entertained than the one recently submitted by an Illinois syndicate.

A DIVORCE SUIT IN HIGH SOCIETY

London, Nov. 28.—A divorce suit involving persons in high society was begun in the courts yesterday. It was the case of Sir Charles Hartopp against his wife, who is a famous beauty. The Earl of Cowsley is named as correspondent. Counsel for the plaintiff, asserted that Lady Hartopp had suggested that her husband permit her to procure a divorce in consideration of the payment by her of £20,000, but that her husband had refused. Lady Hartopp met the Earl of Cowsley in the hunting field in Leicester. He helped her to take a cottage and to furnish it. A relative, Lord Gerard, drafted a proposal that the Hartopps should live together for six months, and that if they still disagreed the husband should then allow himself to be divorced. Sir Charles refused this also. Lady Hartopp accuses her husband of striking her.

Sir Charles Hartopp, who is a short clean shaved, bald man, fifteen years older than his wife, was called to the witness stand. He denied that he had struck or kicked his wife. On the day of the marriage of her sister, he said, she kicked him upon both sides when he remonstrated with her about her friendships. He admitted that his wife's father gave him £10,000 to pay his racing and card playing debts at the time of his marriage.

The court was crowded with fashionable people. Lady Hartopp and her sisters, including the Countess of Chesterfield, were present.

PHYSICIAN TO MARRY NURSE.

New York, Nov. 28.—Cupid, not afraid of contagion, invaded some time ago the hospital at North Brother Island, where the most malignant of diseases are isolated. As a result of his visit there now comes the announcement of the marriage of Dr. C. T. Graham Rogers of 154 West Eighty-fifth street, formerly house physician at the City Isolation Hospital, North Brother Island and Miss Mary C. Church of Albany, who was head nurse under Dr. Rogers.

It came about this way. Dr. Rogers fell ill with pneumonia last winter while at the hospital and Miss Church nursed him back to health. Then one cold night last winter the lighthouse keeper in the house off Randall's Island and his son went out in a boat while the ice was floating. They went out in search of what they thought was a call for assistance. The ice capsize the boat and the son was drowned. Both the father and mother, who was left behind in the lighthouse, were overcome with grief, and they, too, fell ill.

All that night the father looked for the body of the boy with the hope that he might be clinging to a piece of ice. The mother lay ill abed, and there was no one to relieve her husband. Miss Church heard of it and in haste getting in the light-house took charge, kept the lights burning by night, and without sleep nursed the parents for several days till relief was sent them.

The bride to be is a member of a well-known Albany family, while the doctor is from a town in the suburbs of Boston. Miss Church was active during the Spanish-American war, having established many emergency hospitals for yellow fever in Cuba. The marriage was to take place today, but for certain reasons was postponed. Dr. Rogers now has a clinic at Roosevelt Hospital. The marriage will take place in a short time.

THE FUTURE OF RHODESIA.

THE GIFT OF THE KING

London, Nov. 28.—The Osborne estate bill providing for the transfer of the Osborne House estate, Isle of Wight, from King Edward, whose property it became under the will of the late Queen Victoria, to the nation, passed its second reading in the House of Commons recently. There are some criticism, reflecting the feeling on the subject in royal circles, in which there has been much agitation ever since the King first proposed to present the Osborne House estate to the nation.

Queen Victoria's will has never been published, but there is very high authority for saying that the bequest was not her idea. As a matter of fact, she left the property to the king for life, with the reversion to the Prince of Wales failing the latter, the property was to go to her daughters or to the Prince of Wales' heirs. The King however insisted on giving it to the nation as a memorial. During the course of the discussion in Parliament, Mr. Ritchie, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, admitted that the bill was at variance when the will and the wishes of the late Queen Victoria, and said that "but for that the bill would not have been necessary." All the pictures, statuary and other articles of value and of historical interest have been removed to Windsor Castle. This includes the contents of the Prince Consort's room, which Queen Victoria left untouched as it existed during his life.

The Movement of Population.

The civilization of Europe is no longer threatened by the eastern hordes which swept over the Roman empire in the earlier centuries of the Christian era. But that prodigious migration laid the foundation of the states of modern Europe.—Edinburgh Review.
