Shelburne, N. S., Liberals have nominated Andrew C. Robertson for the seat in the legislature vacated by the much lamented death of Speaker Robertson.

The petition against Archie Campbell, M. P. for West York, the gentleman who wrested that constituency from the Conservatives in the last election, has been dismissed.

A friend of President Roosevelt presented him with a thirty-two pound turkey for Thanksgiving dinner. The bird must have been a fine specimen and pretty nearly as old as the President himself.

The navigation season of the St. John river just closed has been the longest in the memory of the present generation. The ice ran out the last of March so that there have been eight months of open water.

The Toronto city council during the strike scare, ordered a large quantity of Welsh coal. The goods have arrived, but are not satisfactory. The coal contains 25 per cent slack, and the city is demanding a refund.

St. John will benefit largely by the misfortune of the New England States with respect to the cattle disease. Shipments usually made from Boston and Portland will be despatched principally from St. John this winter.

Mr. F. S. Spence, head of the prohibition campaign in Ontario, says the referendum election will cost his party \$40,000. The prohibitionists, he says, expect to poll a heavy vote, but he makes no prophecies of success.

Kill the fatted calf, the prodigal has returned. Hon. Geo. E. Foster made a speech at Toronto last night in favor of prohibition. His last appearance as a speaker on moral reform was in the same city, and he advocated the Gothenburg system as a means of restricting the liquor traffic.

The Toronto Globe suffers a serious loss by the resignation of its editor-in-chief, Mr. J. S. Willison, one of the most polished and effective writers on the Canadian press. Mr. Willison leaves his old position to edit an independent news paper to be established in Toronto by Mr. J. W. Flavelle.

Mr. Robert, Orr whose death is announced, was in his day prominent in the business life of Fredericton. He managed both the Queen hotel and Barker house at different times, and was well known all over the province. He was a genial companion with a wide circle of friends, a man with a large heart and generous impulses.

Mr. John Cameron of the post office staff, who, it is announced, has been superannuated, has served thirty-five years continuously in the position, having received his appointment at confederation. Mr. Cameron's numerous friends will wish him happiness in his retirement, and many more years of life. He has been a faithful and efficient public servant.

Liberal fabric was tottering, and now that it is announced that Editor Willison, of the Toronto Globe, has resigned his position, the word goes out and is crystallized in Tory newspaper headlines that there is "serious trouble in the Grit ranks," and something awful is going to happen. If it were not for sweet hope the Tory heart would break.

Our good friends and prominent fellow citizens, the Scotchmen of Fredericton, are to celebrate the memory of St. Andrew in a double manner. Tomorrow with that religious devotion that has always characterized their nationality, they will worship together at the Kirk, and on Monday evening they will meet with their friends around the festive board at the Barker House. The Fredericton society of St. Andrew is a charitable as well as a social organization, and have proved their former characteristic by establishing a scholarship in the University of New Brunswick.

N. S. SCHOONER SEIZED.

May be Cause of International Dispute.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 29.—Word was received here yesterday that the Nova Scotia three-masted schooner Harry Troop is held by the Venezuela government. The schooner was chartered by a New York firm and loaded there in April. She cleared for Bolivia and her cargo is said to have included fire arms and ammunition.

On July 5th she was reported at the mouth of the Orinoco River awaiting orders and since then word of her seizure has been received at New York. It has also been learned that part of the ship's cargo is being used by Venezuelans against the insurgents under General Matos, and she is not even allowed to unload and depart. Owners of both vessel and cargo think they will have an action against somebody.

The British first class yacht Columbine is en route for Orinoco, and H. M. S. Fastome is already there. It is understood the whole British North American squadron will shortly assemble in the Gulf of Para and that vigorous measures will be taken to protect British interests.

Van Hoose Sings in Boston Monday Night

F. G. Spencer, under whose management Van Hoose, the wonderful tenor, will appear in the City Hall on the 17th of December, leaves for Boston tonight to be present at the concerts in Symphony Hall Monday and Tuesday nights, in which Mr. Van Hoose is the central figure. These concerts are given under the auspices of the Cecilia Club of Boston, and in engaging Van Hoose they have procured the best tenor that money could buy, as with them money is no object, the idea is to get the best the world affords. This gives some idea as to the standing of the great artist who will appear before a Fredericton audience for the first and probably the last time. While in Boston Mr. Spencer will arrange as to the programme which Mr. Van Hoose will sing in Fredericton, and also engage an artist to appear in conjunction with the tenor. Remember the plan of seats will open in McMurray's bookstore Thursday morning, Dec. 11, at nine o'clock.

THREATENING LETTERS.

Former Miramichi Man, Now of New York, Worried by Various Communications.

John J. Adams, of the law firm of Cantor, Adams & McIntyre, New York, brother of the late Senator Michael Adams of Newcastle, has recently been in receipt of letters and postal cards which have caused him so much concern for his personal safety that he has engaged the services of a private detective agency, and also laid the matter before the police.

It was in Mr. Adams' office on October 17 last that William C. Turner shot and killed W. J. Mallard, Jr., and Albert Hamilton and then put a bullet through his own brain. Mr. Adams narrowly escaped, and naturally the receipt of letters during the last few days from a man who was a former client and who has been in a sanitarium for mental trouble, caused him some apprehension.

Mr. Adams is said to have been so wrought up over the matter that he has hardly been able to attend to business. So far as could be learned the communications to which Mr. Adams took exception were three or four postal cards and several letters, the tenor of which indicated ill will, although nothing that might be considered a direct threat was made.

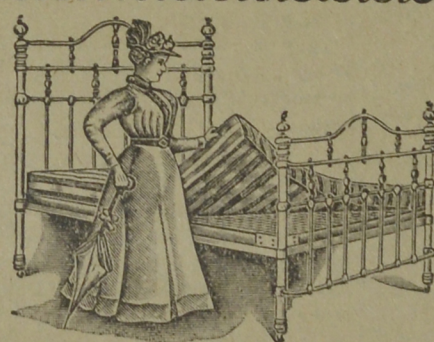
