

GOOD FOR CANADA

Closing of the United Kingdom Ports to Cattle.

FROM NEW ENGLAND STATES.

Will Largely Increase Trade Of Canadian Ports.

ST. JOHN ESPECIALLY BENEFITTING

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Nov. 29.—The closing of the ports of the United Kingdom against cattle from the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island, owing to a prevalent foot and mouth disease, is going to affect Canada very largely, and, according to Montreal cattle exporters, not adversely.

Canadian cattlemen take it that United States Atlantic ports will be practically closed against the exportation of cattle to points in England, at least until the present order is rescinded, and that as a consequence Canadian ports are going to benefit very largely through it.

At present there are 6,000 cattle and 5,000 sheep booked out at St. John for the month of December. This number will of course be materially increased if railways and shipping accommodation is increased to meet the demands.

Asked as to the effect of the order upon the price in England, Mr. Gordon, of Gordon, Ironsides & Fares, stated that of course the tendency would be an increase of price; in fact, he would not wonder if cattle were now selling at higher prices.

MAINE SMALLPOX SCARE.

Members of the Higgins Crew Have Come Over to Canada.

Flagstaff, Me., Nov. 29.—Trapper Frank Clement arrived here this noon from an extended trip through the section where it was feared an epidemic of smallpox was imminent. Clement says that the members of the Higgins crew who broke quarantine at Holeb last week have been accounted for, and that every man has gone into Canada. There are new cases in the vicinity of Holeb or Lowelltown. The guards have been removed from all the camps, except one guard at each camp as a precaution against a stray Canadian. The trails north of the Canadian Pacific railway are still guarded, and Canadians without a clean bill of health are stopped, and there are now no entrances from Canada except by rail, and the regular Canada road above Moose River plantation. These avenues are carefully attended to by representatives of the State Board of Health. Workmen now in camp have

become pacified and there are no breaks for the settlements of home. The camps on Dead River are still guarded to a certain extent, but work is uninterrupted. The Higgins crew leaving the country makes everything safe and all danger of an epidemic is considered past. At Jackman business is moving in the usual routine manner. The two cafes are in the pest house and there are no fears of any further outbreak.

HUNTER'S REMARKABLE FEAT

Killed Two Deer With One Shot.

Bangor, Nov. 29.—C. S. Johnson, his brother, Wilbur Johnson, and C. H. Lurvey, of Portland, have just returned from a two weeks' hunting trip to West Sebois, where Mr. Johnson had one of the most remarkable experiences which has ever fallen to a deer hunter in the Maine woods.

Johnson soon after entering the woods suddenly found himself face to face with a handsome doe, and without taking in any of the animal's surroundings, took quick aim and fired. The deer fell in its tracks, and Johnson hurried up to see if the shot had been immediately fatal. What was his surprise when upon coming up to the doe he found a large buck lying behind her also quite dead, having been killed by the same bullet that had brought down the doe.

An investigation was made, and it was found that the bullet had gone through the breast of the doe, and out behind one of its shoulders, and without its speed having been greatly retarded had continued on, striking the buck, which had been standing a short distance back of the doe and out of sight of Johnson, between the eyes, causing instant death.

GERMANY AND VENEZUELA

Berlin, Nov. 29.—Three additional cruisers, the Niobe, Ariadne, and Amazona, have been ordered to leave Kiel and proceed to Venezuela.

The warships will sail as soon as they can be made ready for use. Telegraphic instructions were sent to the Navy Department last evening, ordering their immediate fitting out on a war footing, and orders for the necessary supplies of ammunition and other equipment have been issued.

It is expected that the three cruisers will be ready to sail about the middle of next week.
