A CAMPAIGN OF DECEIT.

Mr. Hazen's alarm at his prospects in Sunbury is accentuated by the fact that he has practically covered the whole western side of the constituency by holding public meetings and personal canvases of the electors. At his Hoyt meeting the other night, the opposition leader's chief appeal was to Liberals to help him secure re-election. Fancy Mr. Hazen going to the Liberals of Sunbury and asking a favor of them. Is it not humiliating, after all the attacks Mr. Hazen has made on the Liberal party in the last fifteen years? Why should Liberals help to put Mr. Hazen in power. What has he ever done for them. A few weeks ago he and his friends in St. John city had an opportunity to show their regard for Liberals in a practical way, but did they do it? Did they? The ticket of four candidates nominated in Mr. Hazen's interest in St. John city is composed entirely of Tories, rabid, unreasoning Tories at that. Not a single Liberal was suggested at Mr. Hazen's convention, and yet Mr. Hazen is imploring the Liberals of Sunbury to send him back to the Legislature.

It was only the other day at Montreal that Mr. Borden, Mr. Hazen's leader at Ottawa, announced at a public meeting that Mr. Hazen was leading a Conservative party in New Brunswick that was going to overturn the Liberal government of this province, and Mr. Hazen has never taken the trouble to contradict Mr. Borden's statement. Mr. Hazen is playing double. While really, as Mr. Borden says, the head of a Tory opposition, he is seeking to get into office through the support of Liberals. Mr. Hazen knows there are not sufficient Conservatives in this province to ensure the success of his party at the polls, so while he and his friends behind the scenes plan for what they would call, if successful, a Tory victory, they are beseeching Liberals to aid them in their underhand campaign.

We do not know to what extent Mr. Hazen expects his plan to succeed elsewhere, but we think we can assure him that the Liberals of Sunbury will not be drawn into the Tory net by even so expert a fisherman as the opposition leader. The Sunbury Liberals have an accurate knowledge of Mr. Hazen's love for their party; they are quite aware that he is only cultivating them for his present political needs, and that he is willing to swallow all his past abuse of the party, if they will only take him to their bosom and reseal him in the legislature.

The Liberals of Sunbury will not do it, Mr. Hazen.

THE GROWING WEST.

Hon. A. G. Blair is convinced from his recent visit to Western Canada that there is room for at least four more railways right through to the Pacific coast, so great is the development of the country, and so rich is it in possibilities. Mr. Blair believes the government should build a road to give the people the benefit of lower rates.

Mr. Blair says he was specially interested in the big immigration from the United States. While in England last summer the objection was often made that so many Americans coming into the country would be sure to favor the cause of annexation. On this point the minister says: "I wanted to go among them and see if there was any desire for anything of the kind. I found that there was not. They are all anxious to make Canada their home, and I am quite sure that in a generation it will be impossible to tell the American

from the real Canadian. In order to see what the chances were of the movement from the western states extending itself, I visited the chief centres and now I am going to prophecy. From what I have seen and learned I will prophecy that next year, at least 100,000 Americans will find their way into Canada to settle down. The movement has only started, and the coming of so many Americans into the country will tend to offset the disaster that now threatens the west, for they will, by example, show the Canadian farmers the benefit to be derived from holding on to their grain."

Mr. J. Lorn McDougall, auditor general of Canada, formerly a Liberal member of parliament, in an address on Public Audits before the Canada Club at Toronto, told of an amusing experience he had when Sir John A. Macdonald was premier. Mr. McDougall in his capacity of auditor general went to Sir John to get his aid in preventing some expenditure. "Sir John, that will not do the Government any good," he remarked, and Sir John immediately replied, "No, no, you are quite right. It would only give rascally Grits like you a ground to run up and down the concessions abusing us. You can always count upon me helping you. Be sure to call upon me when anything like that occurs."

Woodstock Sentinel: Now that the Conservative party have virtually accepted Mr. Tarte as their leader, we presume that the Carleton county Tories will institute a cheap sale of some of their mottoes used in the last general election such as "Tarte the Traitor," etc, with which their committee rooms were decorated.

It looks as if our distinguished friend Titus Carter will have to go it alone as an opposition ticket in Victoria. The names of four candidates are announced but they are all government supporters.

If Mr. Tarte does not say something pretty soon, people will forget there is such a unique political figure in Canada.

If the Donkhobors want to march clear out of Canada, better let them go.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

St Pierre, Miquelon Swept by the Flames

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 3.—The town of St. Pierre (Miq.) has been devastated by fire. A destructive conflagration started Saturday night and swept the main portion of the town.

The governor's house, the government buildings, the court house, the building occupied by the ministry of marine, the Roman Catholic cathedral, the presbytery, the schools and a number of other buildings were destroyed.

It has not yet been learned how the fire originated. There was no wind last night, else the entire town would probably have been completely obliterated. Even as it is the extent of the disaster is very far reaching and the financial loss will probably reach half a million dollars.

There was no loss of life or serious accident. The rapid spread of the conflagration was due to the trifling water supply and to the fact that St. Pierre has no adequate fire fighting appliances.

The town of St. Pierre has been partly burned down three times before—in 1865, 1897, and 1879.

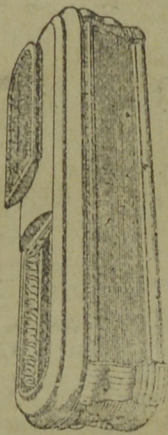
