QUESTION OF RECIPROCITY

Will be Discussed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier Before Boston Merchants.

Boston, Nov. 3.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian premier, has consented to speak at the coming dinner of the Boston Merchants' Association in Boston. The association secretary, E. H. Walcott, has returned from Ottawa, where he went to propose the matter to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Mr. Walcott not only secured the consent of the head of the Canadian government to be present at the dinner, but also to speak directly on the subject "Reciprocity with Canada," which is to be the topic for discussion.

The dinner will be held about the middle of December.

At the last directors' meeting the association decided to take up Canadian reciprocity as the subject for discussion at its annual dinner. In view of the present live interest in Canadian reciprocity among Boston business men—an interest brought to a head by the congressional campaigns and the action of the Republican state convention in regard to a reciprocity movement—it was felt that a discussion would be timely.

It was decided to send Secretary Walcott to Ottawa, to present an invitation to Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Who the other speakers will be is not known, but it is assumed that other Canadian government leaders would consent to accompany Sir Wilfrid to be the association's guests. Sir Richard Cartwright, or Hon. W. S. Fielding, or perhaps both, are mentioned as likely to come.

Canadians of Boston.

Boston, Nov. 3.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Canadian club, Saturday night, it was decided to hold the annual banquet Nov. 21. The invited guests who have signified their intention to be present are: Hon. Clifford Sifton, Canadian Minister of the Interior, and Hon. H. A. McKeown, member of the Executive Council of N. B., Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick, Canadian Minister of Justice, and Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R., are also expected. The general topic for the evening will be the progress and development of Canada, special reference to the policy of reciprocity with this country being kept in mind. 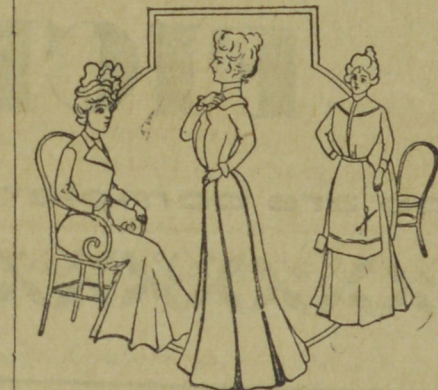
