GRAND DUKE IN NEW YORK

Anxious to Meet President
Roosevelt at His Home.

THE COUSIN OF THE CZAR HAS IMPRESSIONS THAT WILL LAST THROUGH HIS TRIP.

Says American Women Are Beautiful

Grand Duke Boris, cousin of the Czar
of Russia, came to New York Friday
evening and took in some of the sights.
In Chicago he had spent several days,
and had liked the city, except that there
had been more freedom of the press than
he had known at home. He believed
that the freedom had been overdone to
the extent that men wrote of events that
he was sure had never happened. He
referred to the drinking of wine out of a
woman's slipper, and said that it was
made the event of his visit in Chicago.
The Grand Duke is certain that he did
not drink from the slipper.

The Grand Duke arrived on the Lake
Shore Limited and went to the Waldorf-
Astoria. He occupied a closed carriage,
and he expressed a positive dislike for
such conveyances, saying that he liked
the smell of the New York air. "It's
like champagne," he remarked.

The Grand Duke and the Russians
who are with him are very large men,
the average chest measurement being not
less than 43 inches.

The cousin of the Czar is not quite so
tall as the average men in his party, but
he has broad shoulders. He wears a
close-cut black mustache, turned up at the
ends in the style affected by Emperor
William of Germany. He speaks English
with only a slight accent. Like all Rus-
sians, he speaks many languages, and
speaks well. It is a treat to hear him
speak occasionally in his own language.
He is a democratic sort of man, and he
reminds one of President Roosevelt in
that it is evident that he does not like
the attentions of the Secret Service men.

"What a wonderful country, this is,"
said the cousin of the Czar. "It's noth-
ing but electricity here, there and every-
where. Your street cars move because of
electricity, and you even illuminate your
stores and places of amusement with
letters made of many electric globes.
What strikes me as of greatest interest,
however, is the beauty of the American
women. They are a distinct type, and
whenever I see a lovely woman anywhere
in my tour around the globe, I will be
sure that she was born in America."

"I particularly like your President, and
hope to see him and mean to see him as
soon as I can. I shall be here until Sept.
9. I understand that the President re-
turns to his home, at Oyster Bay, on
Sept. 3, and I have asked through the
embassy to meet him at his home. Is his
home State property or does it belong to
him? Is it his country estate?"

"What interests me more than any
social entertainment," he said, "is the
wonderful, aggressive, active people here.
We are getting to know you better than
we did. Americans are coming to us
with their many electrical appliances for
transportation and manufacture. They
are welcome."

"I was more charmed with the scenery
of this country than the meeting with the
Chicago reporter. The Yosemite Valley
and Niagara Falls are marvellous and
magnificent. The Chicago reporter does
not tell the truth."
