

THE MURDER TRAIL.

Grand Jury Found True Bill of Murder

AGAINST BOTH HIGGINS AND GOODSPEED.

Mr. Mullin Will Set up Insanity as Defence for Higgins.

TRIAL LIKELY TO BE POSTPONED FOR A FORTNIGHT.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

St. John, Sept. 2.—At the opening of the September sitting of the circuit court for St. John this morning, the court house was crowded to the doors by spectators to witness the trial of Frank Higgins, who is charged with the murder of Willie Doherty, and of Frederick Goodspeed, charged with being an accessory after the fact.

His Honor Mr. Justice Landry presided. After the grand jury had been empanelled and sworn they retired and in an hour and ten minutes brought in a true bill against both of the prisoners.

Daniel Mullin, counsel for Higgins, applied for a postponement of one month, in order to allow time for an expert medical witness of Boston to attend, and for the popular feeling against the prisoner to subside.

Hon. H. A. McKeown for the crown, was willing for a fortnight's postponement.

His Honor will decide the time for the trial this afternoon.

TRADE CONGRESS RESOLUTIONS.

London, Sept. 2.—The trades union congress today passed a resolution declaring that the South African war was unjust, by a vote of 176 to 134, and defeated another resolution which declared in favor of omitting mention of the coronation from the reports, on the ground that it would not be proper to mention monarchical institutions in a labor congress.

The vote against the last resolution was 162 to 64.

KILLED ON THE TRACK.

Mr. Winslow's Funeral.

The funeral of the late Wertworth Winslow took place from the residence of his brother, T. B. Winslow, at three p. m. on Sunday, and had a very large attendance. The remains were taken to the Cathedral, where an impressive service was conducted by Rev. Dean Partridge. Interment was made at Forest Hill cemetery. Messrs. Geo. Y. Dibblee, Col. Loggie, George N. Babbitt, J. DeL.

Robinson, A. F. Street and T. Carleton Allen officiated as pall bearers, and the chief mourners were: Messrs. T. B. Winslow, E. B. Winslow, W. C. Winslow, (Chatham), J. N. W. Winslow, (Woodstock), W. E. Smith, Don Winslow, J. Fraser Winslow and J. A. Winslow. Undertaker John G. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

Death of Thomas Segee.

The remains of the late Thomas W. Segee, who died at McAdam on Saturday, arrived here by the noon train yesterday, and were taken to New Maryland and interred. Robert B. Adams was the officiating undertaker, and Rev. Mr. Ross of McAdam, conducted the services. The deceased was a nephew of the late William Segee of this city and was 68 years of age. A widow and three daughters survive. He was a member of the Orange order, and the funeral was held under the auspices of that organization.

Oldest Resident of Harvey.

James Craiz, the oldest resident of Harvey, died at his home in Rear Settlement on Thursday night, after a long illness. He was about 90 years of age and was a native of Wooler, Northumberland Co., England. He came here with his wife in the year 1837, among the first settlers of Harvey. He settled on a new farm and made for himself a comfortable home which he lived so long to enjoy. He had a large family, among whom are Mr. Samuel Craig of Zionville, and Mr. James Craig of St. Marys. His youngest son Harry occupies the homestead. His wife died only a short time ago. Deceased was a man of sterling character and was highly respected.

A Child's Death.

A correspondent at Millville writes as follows under date of Aug. 31st:

The funeral of the one year and nine months' old little girl of Manzer and Helen Love is being held at the church here this afternoon. The services are being conducted by the Rev. Mr. Bastin, the lately inducted Episcopal rector, of Temperance Vale and vicinity. The little child met death in rather a sad and sudden way. It was in the up stairs part of the house and fell from the chamber floor to the ground floor, a distance of nine feet, striking on her head. A doctor was hastily summoned but could render no help, as the child died some two or three hours after falling. Much sympathy is being expressed by friends as the large attendance at the funeral showed.

Judge Meagher's Death.

News has been received here of the death of Judge Daniel A. Meagher, at Lewiston, Montana. Deceased was a brother of the late Jeremiah Meagher, and left this his native country about 30 years ago. He was one of the prominent men of Lewiston, filling many important, responsible offices of both city and county.

Freeland C. Wilson

Freeland C. Wilson, manager of the Grand Hotel, Yarmouth, N. S., died Saturday after a few days illness from typhoid fever. He was 37 years old and leaves a wife and three children.

Chas. W. Woods.

The interment took place at Welsford, Queens Co., Monday afternoon of Charles W. Woods, son of the late Hon. Francis Woods, and brother of Mr. H. W. Woods. The deceased is one of those who went West with the farm laborers, and was drowned at North Bay, Ontario, on Aug. 29. He was forty-one years of age, unmarried, and an active member of the Masonic and Foresters orders.

Percy Vanwart.

On the 15th ult. there occurred at Presque Isle the death of Percy, son of Havelock Vanwart, of that place, in his 14th year. Thirteen years ago the death angel had visited Mr. Vanwart's home in the far west and carried away his partner in life, the mother of this boy, who was then scarcely a year old. With his child and it's mother's remains he returned to his native home, bereaved and heart-broken. And now after a few days' illness from appendicitis the sorrowing father is bereft of his only son. The remains were brought to Bear Island, where in the home of Wm. Hagerman the boy was tenderly and lovingly reared. On the 17th of Aug. after divine service by Rev. Wm. Ross, B. A., of Prince William, interment was made in the churchyard there in the presence of a large circle of deeply sorrowing friends. The lad was exceedingly bright and cheerful, and was a favorite with all who knew him. The bereaved father, as well as the family of Mr. Hagerman, have the full sympathy of the entire community in their affliction.

Mrs. Chas. McGinn.

The family and friends of Charles McGinn in this city were distressed to learn by telegraph, Monday, of the death of his wife at Moncton from typhoid fever. The deceased visited Fredericton last autumn with her husband and made many friends. Mrs. McGinn was formerly Miss Tory of Moncton. She leaves no issue. Mr. and Mrs. Patrick McGinn,

parents of the bereaved husband, left last night for Moncton to attend the funeral.

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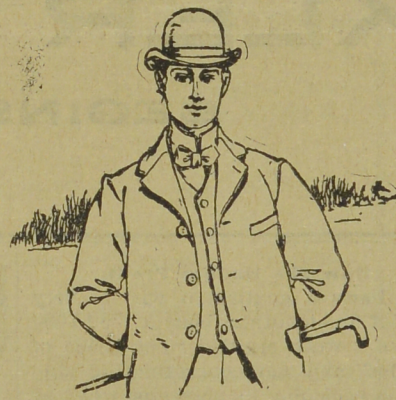
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
