LADY MINTO'S GUESTS.

New York, January 27.—Among the passengers of the steamship Celtic, of the White Star Line which arrived yesterday, was the Countess Grey, chaperoning four young English girls, all of whom were so charmingly pretty and rosy that the American girls who saw them disembark bewailed their own bright skies, so fatal to milk and roses, and longed for the soft, gray mist which produces such complexions. The young women with Countess Grey were Lady Sybil Grey, her daughter; Lady Alix Beauclerk, a cousin, who is the daughter of the Duchesse of St. Albans, and sister of the present Duke of St. Albans; the Honorable Hester Lyttleton, and Miss D. M. Ward, the daughter of Mrs Humphrey Ward, novelist.

Many persons had gathered at the pier in expectation of seeing the famous court beauty, Lady Gladys De Grey, who was expected to arrive by the steamer, and whose experiences in keeping a tea shop in Grafton street, London, have made her name almost as well known on this side the ocean as the other. She did not arrive, however, but the onlookers were equally delighted with the Lady Grey who did appear. She is a beautiful young woman, tall and well proportioned, with the true English coloring—blue eyes, brown hair and vivid pink and white complexion. She wore a long red coat, lined with sable, and a black hat. The Countess, her mother, who had suffered greatly with neuralgia during the voyage, was wrapped in furs and veils when she walked up the pier to her carriage.

Lady Gray, speaking for her mother, said the party would have but a fleeting glimpse of New York, as they were going immediately to Ottawa, where they will be for six weeks the guests of Lady Minto, who is a sister of the Countess Grey. The party passed the time between their arrival and their departure for Ottawa at the house of Mr and Mrs Lewis S. Chanler, No 14 East Seventy-fifth street. They were met at the pier by Mr Chanler.
