## A SUGGESTED ALLIANCE.

and will join him in an effort to form a  
party whose platform will be high pro-  
tection.

The party of which Meers. Tarte and  
Maclean would be the leaders would be  
according to the rumors in circulation  
materially assisted by individual manu-  
facturers and the Manufacturers' As-  
sociation.

It is also stated that Hon. Mr. Tarte  
will very shortly become a resident of  
Toronto. He has decided, it appears, to  
live for five or six months in the Queen  
City.

## YUKON INDIAN SUMMER.

of the Dawson newspapers of Oct. 1st last,  
on "Yukon Indian Summer" as fol-  
lows: The weather yesterday could  
not have been equalled in any  
port of North America. A warm  
breeze during the day suggested  
the first kiss of spring and old  
Sol threw more warmth into his rays  
than usual. It was an ideal summer day.  
During the afternoon the thermometer  
at the postoffice smilingly sported  
around the 75 mark, and at 6 o'clock  
last evening it was at 72. Out

## THE BABY GREBE.

A Beautiful Bird That Suffers to  
Help the Fashions.

When you see a woman with a band  
of white plumage almost invisibly  
tinted with blue and green and more  
strongly with golden brown ornament-  
ing her hat, know that from one to six  
of these harmless, lovable, sweet  
voiced little grebes were stripped from  
chin to vent to supply it. And when  
you see that other woman wearing a  
cape the collar of which reaches above  
her ears and the skirt to her shoulders  
and it seems to be made up of almost  
indiscernible sections the size of your  
hand know that each section stands  
for the life of one of these charming  
little chattering. The breast of the  
grebe is its curse. Its feathers are so  
tiny and fine as to be almost spineless,  
so thickly set they stand on end and  
so delicately colored as to render ade-  
quate description impossible. Crested  
grebes are killed without mercy for  
this little patch of rare feathering,  
and the little marsh ones do not es-  
cape. There is no bird slaughter for  
plumage more wanton unless it be  
that of the egret, which takes the life  
of the brooding bird for a few beauti-  
ful feathers found on the shoulders  
only at nesting time and leaves the  
young to die as they may.

## Catching Book Titles.

Most readers would be at a loss to  
discover the source of some book titles  
and would forget if they ever knew  
that "The World Well Lost" is bor-  
rowed from Dryden, that "A Dream  
and a Forgetting" is Wordsworth's  
phrase and that it was Othello who  
loved "Not Wisely, but Too Well." We  
might add that in spite of the fami-  
liarity of the famous "Elegy" not one  
reader in ten will trace Mr. Hardy's  
"Far From the Madding Crowd" to  
Gray or will connect "One of Three"  
with the mariner who held the wed-  
ding guest with his glittering eye. Mr.  
Hardy's titles, like Howells', are al-  
most invariably attractive. "A Pair of  
Blue Eyes," "Two on a Tower" and  
"The Return of the Native" stimulate  
curiosity.

Often a proverb or any other fami-  
liar phrase is as good as a recognized  
quotation. "Put Yourself In His Place"  
and "It Is Never Too Late to Mend"  
were strokes of genius on the part of  
Charles Reade, and "Second Thoughts,"  
"Dead Men's Shoes" and "The Root of  
All Evil" are hardly less inviting.

## TARTE'S THE TALK.

Ottawa Tory Organ Makes  
a Bid for the ex-  
Minister.

TORONTO LIBERAL ORGAN SAYS  
TARTE'S TARIFF SPEECHES

Were not the Only Causes of  
Government Embarrassment.

HE PROMISED UNAUTHORIZED EX-  
PENDITURES, ETC.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier  
will leave for Montreal in the morning.  
It is very likely that he will talk over  
with some of the local leaders as to  
Tarte's successor. There is just a proba-  
bility that Speaker Brodeur will become  
minister of public works and Mr. Prefon-  
taine take the place of Brodeur as  
speaker.

Should this arrangement be made it  
would give general satisfaction and would  
increase the strength of the government  
in Quebec and the country.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—The Conservative  
press are making a bid for Mr Tarte,  
who acknowledges in a specially pre-  
pared interview for Conservative papers  
that he is independent in politics.

For instance the Ottawa Citizen said  
this morning that "he is undoubtedly the  
strongest man in Quebec today and the  
strongest French-Canadian statesman in  
the esteem of the country at large. This  
is a little rough on Mr Monk, the Con-  
servative leader in Quebec. The Citizen  
adds that Mr. Tarte will smash the ad-  
ministration and "whether he resorts to  
the slower and less satisfactory method  
of instituting a third party for the more  
effective and decisive action of allying  
himself with the Conservatives with  
whose views he is practically in accord,  
the result will be the same."

Similar invitations appear in other Con-  
servative papers.

Mr Tarte took farewell of employees  
of the public works department today and  
afterwards called on the governor-general.  
He left for Montreal at four o'clock and  
his Ottawa house is now vacant.

Montreal, Oct. 22.—La Patrie, Mr.  
Tarte's paper, made no reference editori-  
ally to its owner's retirement from the  
cabinet.

As a plain M. P., Mr. Tarte arrived to-  
night from Ottawa in the car he had at  
his disposal as minister. When seen on  
this arrival the ex-minister declined to  
supplement the interview he gave out in  
Ottawa yesterday. "I am in private life  
now and have nothing more to say," he  
said.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—The Globe com-  
menting on Tarte's retirement says: "The  
tariff is not the only question in which  
the minister's utterances have embar-  
rased his colleagues. He has been in  
the habit of making promises and ex-  
pounding policies not sanctioned by the  
ministry and involving heavy expendi-  
tures. His Paris speeches, while their  
dangerous tendencies were grossly exag-  
gerated, were injudicious, created ill-  
feeling in this country, and added to the  
embarrassment of the government at a  
critical time."

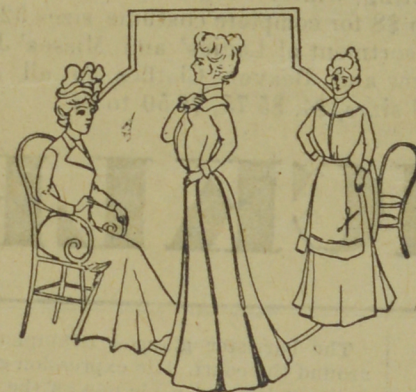

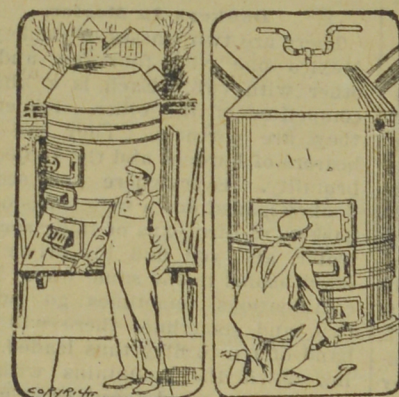
