It is said that a bill will be intro-

The Nova Scotia legislature which was
prorogued Thursday after a session of six
weeks, passed 215 bills, and rejected be-
tween sixty and seventy.

The new city council is expected to
reduce the assessment two or three
thousand dollars. The matter comes
up in committee Monday evening.

Mr. Hazen has not shown much origi-
nality in forming the opposition platform.

Petitions bearing 35,000 names, signed
in Liverpool, Cardiff, have been present-
ed in the Imperial House of Commons,

making excellent progress. Already sub-
scriptions amounting to nearly \$1800 are
assured, the legislature is expected to vote
\$500, and from other sources \$800 more
are in sight. The ladies of the town have
organized and are making a house to
house canvas.

It is stated that Cecil Rhodes left the
bulk of his great fortune to the pro-
motion of his vast imperial plan of
education. This project embraces every
land where the Union Jack flies. The
purpose is the intellectual betterment of
the British race throughout the world
and the fostering of the imperial senti-
ment.

The foxy Boers are still able to fool the
British. A Pretoria despatch says: An
instance of the resourcefulness of the
Boers was given by Liebenberg. With
several hundred men, taking advantage
of the confusion of the drive, Liebenberg
and his followers formed a commando,
similar in arrangement to that of a British
column, and moving close to one of the
numerous gaps in the British lines, suc-
ceeded in reaching the opening before
their ruse was detected and got safely
away.

La Patrie quotes the following remark
of Mr. Descaisses, Mayor of Lachine, a
prominent Conservative, in an appeal to
Beauharnois to elect Bergeron to parlia-
ment:—"Citizens of Beauharnois, a

country almost exclusively French, how
can you elect a man like Mr. Loy, a man
who is not of our blood, our religion, our
language or our nationality?" La Patrie
says Mr. Monk made a similar appeal,
and that he asked whether there was in
Ontario and the west a single English
country represented by a French-
Canadian.

Where Canada Can Beat Persia.

Prof. Ward, of the Natural History
Museum, of New York, lately
returned from a trip through parts
of Europe and Asia. While in Per-
sia Mr. Ward was shown a meteorite
weighing 113 pounds, which fell in
1880, and which, it was claimed, was
the largest ever found. As a token
of good will the professor was pre-
sented with a piece of it, weighing
2 1-5 pounds, which now safely re-
poses in the New York Museum, and
which, he says, is worth its weight
in gold. There are only four me-
teorites known he says.

If the professor would make a
trip to Oakville he could be shown
a fifth meteorite, weighing 120
pounds, and which, curiously enough,
fell in the same year as the Persian
one—1880. The owner of the farm
near Oakville, and his family, were
sitting on the verandah one evening,
when they saw something bright
strike the earth 500 yards away, and
with a hissing sound, sunk out of
sight. The heavy mass had buried
itself over seven feet. It was al-
lowed to cool, and afterwards was
raised, and now is an object of
curiosity to the neighbors. It is as
well as the farm is now owned by
Mr. Harry Giddings, of the Cedar
Grove Stock Farm, who says that
Prof. Ward can have it at a slight-
ly less price than its weight in gold.

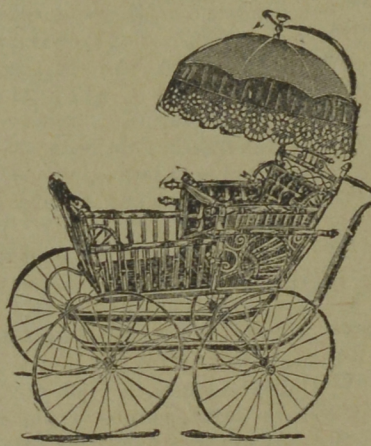
