Ropes of Human Hair.

No Cheek Kissing for the King.

It is understood that there will be no change in the manner of holding drawing rooms, the arrangements at Buckingham Palace being precisely similar to those that have obtained for so many years past, the time only being changed from afternoon to evening. The King does not intend to revive the practice of saluting ladies presented at court on the cheek, a practice which still survives in the drawing rooms held by the lord lieutenant of Ireland, says The London World. Trains and court plumes will be worn, but it is expected that elderly ladies and those who are delicate will be given the choice of appearing in high dresses to the throat. This indulgence was granted by the late Queen some years ago, as the necessity of appearing décolleté often prevented ladies from going to court.

WINNIPEG HOLDS RECORD.

Coldest in the Empire—Some Extreme Temperatures in British Possessions.

Facts about the weather and temperatures of various parts of the British Empire are very interesting. A recent article in Pearson's Weekly set Mr. R. F. Stupart, superintendent of the Dominion Meteorological Service, at work making a few researches. It was found that Winnipeg, Manitoba, was the coldest city of any importance in British territory. There were colder places in Siberia, and even in Canada. White River, on the north shore of Lake Superior, frequently reports temperatures ten degrees below the capital of the Prairie Province. Winnipeggers, when they come east, have a great habit of laughing when the Ontario man declares that the Winnipeg weather is too much for him. He at once tries to make out that the western city is no colder than Montreal or Ottawa, but he can't prove it by the statistics which are so carefully kept at the Observatory in Queen's Park, Toronto.

Winnipeg's average mean temperature for the year is 32.6, while the average for the winter months is 1.5 below zero. The highest temperature on record at Winnipeg is 103, and 53 below zero is the coldest ever registered there officially. Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, is colder than Winnipeg, having a yearly average temperature of 30.5, and a winter average temperature of 3 degrees below zero. The lowest on record at Prince Albert is 70 below the zero mark.

Chatham and Windsor run one another a pretty close race for the warmest place of any size in Ontario. At Chatham, the annual mean temperature is 48 degrees, while the highest point ever touched was 102, and the lowest 21 below zero. Windsor's high temperature record is 101 degrees, and the coldest period sent the mercury down to 27 below zero.

According to Pearson's Weekly, the temperature in Brisbane has reached 133 degrees in the shade, but no records at the local Observatory show anything like that heat. India undoubtedly holds the high temperature record, for the average in the city of Agra is given at 95 degrees. Outside of India the warmest spots in British possessions are in Australia and South Africa. In the great diamond city of Kimberley 112 has been recorded, and it is about as warm a place as there is in that part of the globe, except on some kopie where the Boers and British clash.

One of the hottest places in Australia is Perth, on the west side of the big island. At this place 117 has occurred and been recorded.

LAKE GRAIN THROUGH CANADA.

This Country's Percentage of the Chicago Trade of Past Season.

The movement of grain eastward from Chicago by lake during the past season of navigation reached the enormous total of 81,122,032 bushels. Of this great business Canadian ports received less than one-fifth. Buffalo taking just about two-thirds of the total. At the latter port there was received from Chicago by lake 54,746,849 bushels of all grains, through Canadian ports there were received 17,108,421 bushels.

From the figures available it will be seen that Depot Harbor, or Parry Sound, as it is more familiarly known, is obtaining the great proportion of the Canadian business from Chicago, the grain there going over the Canada Atlantic to the seaboard. Depot Harbor's share of the little over seventeen million bushels was 9,744,701 bushels, of which wheat and corn formed the principal part.

The exact shipments from Chicago to Canadian lake ports are as follows:

Kingston—349,250 bushels wheat, 149,750 bushels corn.
Depot Harbor—8,887 barrels flour, 4,295,943 bushels oats, 161,862 bushels rye.
Sarnia—3,519,702 bushels oats.
Prescott—87,300 bushels wheat.
Midland—499,615 bushels wheat, 1,485,000 bushels corn.
Meaford—222,500 bushels wheat, 182,398 bushels oats.
Goderich—71,500 bushels wheat, 574,850 bushels corn.
Other Canadian ports—199,770 bushels corn, 22,000 bushels rye.

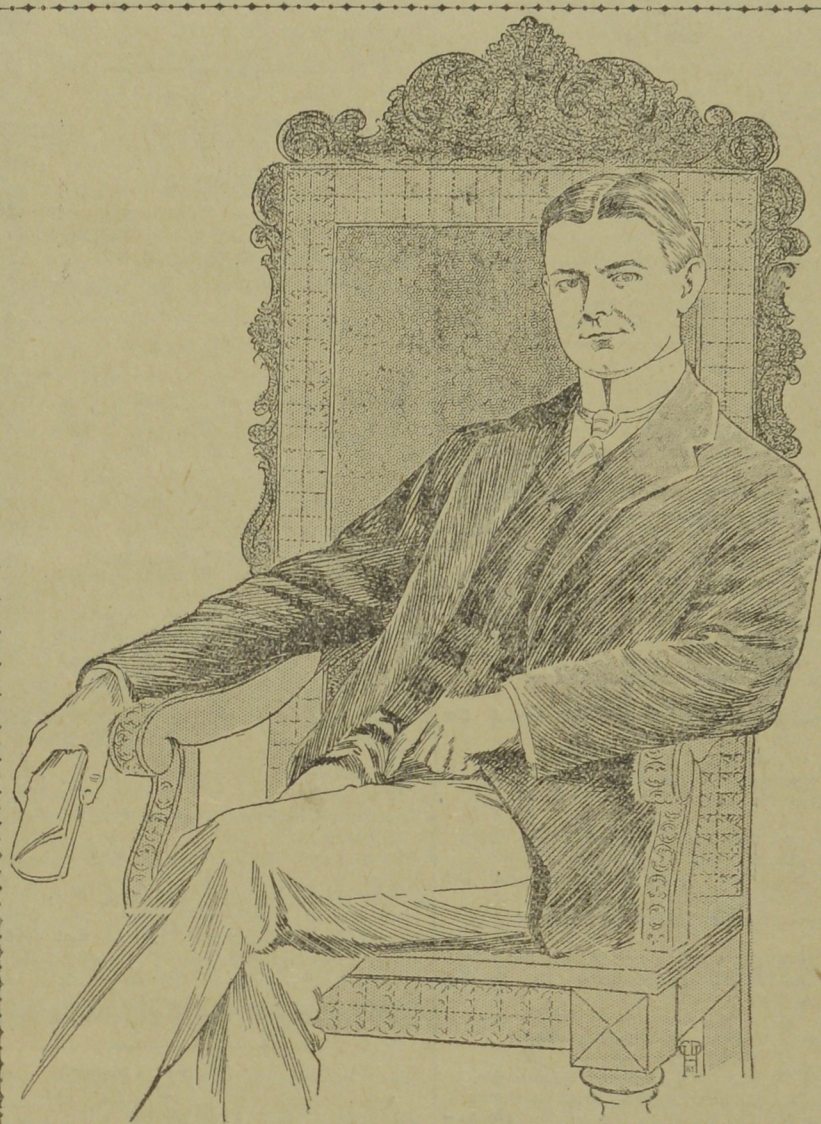

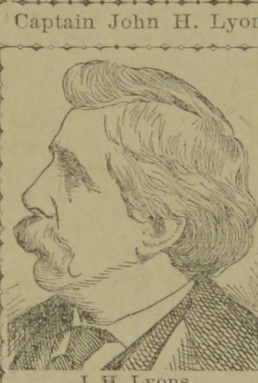
