A GENEROUS GIVER.

Hon. D. J. Hennessy, a Fredericton boy who has made his mark and his fortune in Montana, and is one of the most respected residents of that state where he occupies a prominent position in business and political circles, has on several occasions proved his substantial interest in his old home, Fredericton.

During his lecture last night at St. Dunstan's hall, Prof. Stockley announced that he had just received a cheque of \$100 from Mr. Hennessy to be expended for St. Dunstan's library. Mr. Hennessy a couple of years ago donated books to the value of \$300 to the University library, and he also remembered Victoria hospital to the extent of \$500. To St. Dunstan's church improvements Mr. Hennessy was also a very generous contributor, so that his benefactions to institutions in his native city during the past few years have reached a very substantial figure.

It is very pleasing to the Herald to note Mr. Hennessy's generosity, and to point it out as an example to other Frederictonians upon whom fortune has smiled in other lands.

General Dewet, who was one of the most valiant of the Boer leaders, has evidently decided to throw in his lot with those who accept in good heart and faith British sovereignty in South Africa, and will do his best to reconcile the burghers to their new conditions. In an address to his adjutants General Dewet says: "Let me tell you that you and I and every burgher can win the heart of the new government by our future conduct, and of this conduct I am not in the least doubtful."

The Alumni Association of King's College voted by a majority of one against federating that institution with Dalhousie College, but the governors after a session that lasted nearly all night, decided for federation by a majority of nearly two to one. Further action however, is deferred for a year. Rev Dean Partridge of this city, who is one of the governors, favored federation, while Judge Hanington opposed it.

There is general regret at the departure of Prof. Stockley from Fredericton. All who were brought into contact with him esteemed him very highly, and his work at the University was of the highest character. As a scholar, a gentleman and a good citizen, Prof. Stockley will be very much missed, and the public will very heartily endorse the sentiments expressed in the address presented to him at St. Dunstan's hall.

The St John common council has at last awakened to the prospective failure of the Coronation day celebration in that city and voted \$600 for bands and fireworks. The firemen, societies and polymorphians, however, are to receive nothing, and will take no part in the celebration.

The great St. John fire occurred this day twenty five years ago.

Verdict of Not Guilty.

Barrington, N. S., June 20.—Young Julius Rill, under trial for murder of Nathan Kaplan at Clark's Harbor, Shelburne Co., last fall, was found not guilty last evening by the jury before whom the case was tried during the past three days. Judge Ritchie charged in favor of the prisoner and after deliberating two and a quarter hours the jury brought in their verdict.

DAY OF MOURNING.

London, June 20.—The United Irish
League is preparing to "keep Coronation
day as a day of mourning in Ireland."

The District Council of Clara Morris,
Mayo County, has resolved to hoist a
black flag over the council chamber, June
26-27, and has issued an invitation to other
councils to join in thus celebrating the
"coronation of the English King, to
whose government the people of this
country are so much indebted for the
famines, coercion and castle rule."

MURDERER HANGED.
(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Bradon, Mass., June 20.—Walter Gor-
don, the double murderer was hanged
this morning at 8 o'clock.

Gordon murdered a farm hand named
Sol Law at White Water, July 31, 1900,
and the following day shot and killed
Jake Smith, a partner of Law, throwing
both bodies into a well. After commit-
ting the double crime he escaped to the
western states, where he enlisted in the
United States army. When the 2nd
Canadian Mounted Rifles were being or-
ganized he turned up in British Colum-
bia and under an assumed name enlisted
in that corps, coming to Halifax for em-
barkation. Here he was arrested and
taken to Brandon, where he was tried
and convicted and afterwards confessed
his crimes. Gordon was a native of
Ontario.
