LETTER FROM MR. PURVIS.

Relating to a Now Celebrated Case.

Millville, Jan 28th.

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir—I notice in yesterday's Herald, the questions submitted to Alfred J. Gregory Esqr. by F. St. John Bliss, in the Purvis case so called. I notice that every statement regarding myself and the house in question, has been put in the worst light possible, and not in a fair impartial manner as all questions submitted ought to be. I also found that the most important matter of all has not been submitted at all. That is the calling of the jury according to the highway act by Peter Johnston and Leon Staire, two of the highway commissioners for Southampton. I will give you a short history of that proceeding: About the 15th of September, 1891, while I was preparing to build within my own boundaries, Peter Johnston and Gideon Staire, two of the highway commissioners of the Parish of Southampton, called on me and requested me to let them widen the street by taking my property. I had my sills laid at the time and refused. They went immediately to T. L. Earle, a J. P., and got a warrant and summoned a jury over in the parish of Bright according to the Highway Act of 1886. Well on the 19th of Sept. the jury came and viewed the matter and decided that I was well within my own boundaries, and ordered me to go on and build, that the road remain within its surveyed boundaries as surveyed when the lands were run out and the road limit reserved by the N. B. and N. S. Land Company Ltd.

I also hear that it has been claimed by some that there was no jury. Now sir I am in a position to give you their names

here. They were Rev. John S. Prosser, William T. Boyd, Alex. Allen, William Mead, jr., and Alex. Howland. Why didn't Mr. Bliss ask Mr. Gregory what right the commissioner had to proceed against me when the end of the law had been reached by the decision of that jury. Every push against me after the jury decided. I claim was a private push, and Southampton has nothing to do with it. I beat them and who is going to pay my cost for defending myself within my own legal boundaries? I throw out these suggestions for some one to answer.
