AMONG THE CURLERS.

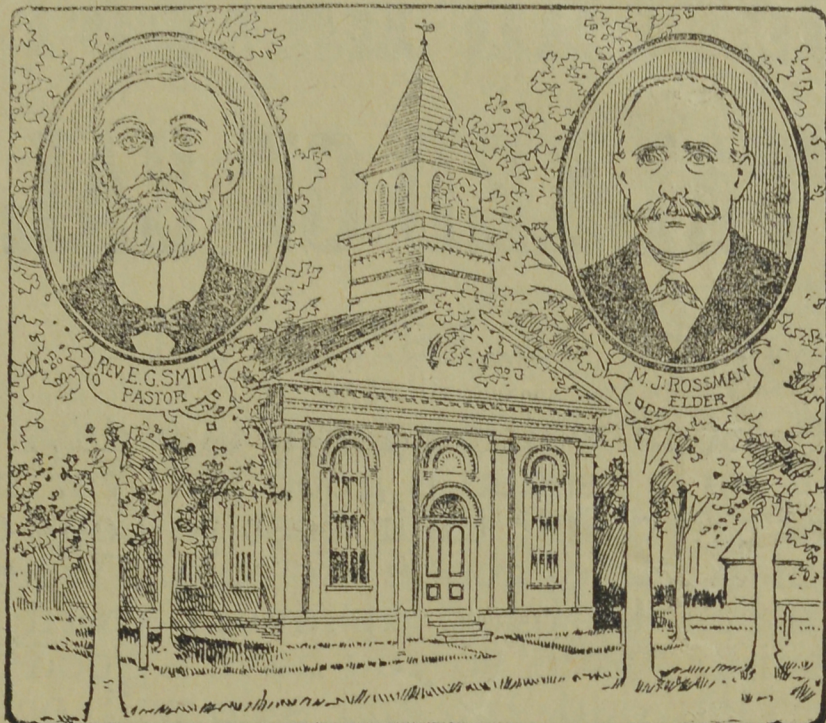
Hampton Club to Play Here Tuesday—Special Meeting—Merchants vs Alcomers.

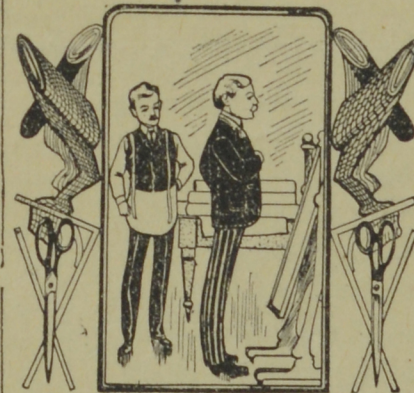
