Accorded to Governor
Snowball on His Ar-
rival Home.

MIRAMICHI TOWNS PEOPLE
TURNED OUT IN FORCE

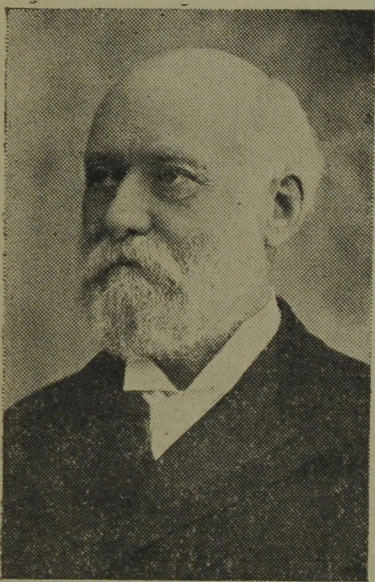
To Welcome the New Chief
Magistrate.

ADDRESSES, BANDS, SALUTES AND A
GENERAL JUBILATION.

Newcastle, Feb. 1.—Hon. J. B. Snowball, the new governor of New Brunswick was most enthusiastically received on his arrival here from Ottawa this morning. A delegation of the county people headed by the sheriff met His Honor at the train, and forming an escort conducted him to the town hall, a lengthy procession accompanying the party.

The Governor who was heartily cheered was presented with a complimentary address by the sheriff and made a very happy reply, Premier Tweedie also speak-



ing. During the proceedings a salute was fired by the Newcastle Field battery in command of Major Maltby.

At the conclusion of the formal proceedings the Governor held an informal reception and received the hearty congratulations of the people.

The procession was then reformed headed by the Newcastle band, and proceeded to Chatham on the river. Just above the latter town another and larger procession of the Governor's Chatham friends headed by Premier Tweedie and the Mayor, met the governor and his Newcastle escort, and a scene of great enthusiasm was witnessed, the crowd cheering themselves hoarse.

The two big processions then formed into one, and escorted the Governor to Chatham, where in the town hall His Honor was presented with an address by the Corporation and spoke felicitously in reply. The cheering for His Honor was hearty and almost continuous, both at the hall and along the streets which were completely filled with enthusiastic people, proud that their fellow citizen had been selected for the high and responsible position of governor.

His Honor was escorted to his residence, Wellington Villa, by the procession which included three bands, and a detachment from the 73rd regiment, the mill whistles and bells added to the paean of welcome.

Governor Snowball will remain here until probably the last of next week, when he will proceed to Fredericton to be sworn in and formally take up the duties of his new office.

Another Account.

Chatham, Feb. 1.—Our new Governor had a splendid reception on his return from Ottawa today. It was almost impromptu, the arrangements having been started only at four o'clock yesterday afternoon.

A citizens' committee, representing the county, was organized at Chatham, and included Newcastle and other representa-

tives. They induced Mr. Snowball by a telegram to him on the incoming Maritime Express, to get off at Newcastle where he was entertained at breakfast at Colonel Call's residence.

At half past ten he was accompanied by the committee and citizens headed by the Newcastle Band to the town hall where an address was presented to him. The hall was crowded and the reading of the address by Sheriff Call on behalf of the county and his reply and a speech by Premier Tweedie evoked great enthusiasm.

After the celebration at flag-bedecked Newcastle, hundreds of teams and skaters started on the Miramichi River on the ice for Chatham, where the streets buildings and flag staffs were profuse with bunting and other decorations.

Here the Citizens and St. Michael's bands met the crowd and played through the streets and a guard of honor, under Major MacKenzie, received the new Governor at the Town Hall where Sheriff Call, by request, again read the address, and a fitting response was made by Governor Snowball.

Premier Tweedie also responded to calls for a speech.

It was one of the most spontaneous popular demonstrations the Miramichi has ever seen. Thousands in sleighs and on foot led by the bands, escorted the new Governor to his residence.

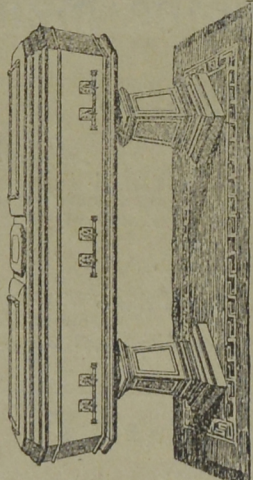

STUPENDOUS EFFORT

Destroy His Force.

TWENTY-THREE BRITISH COL-
UMNS ENGAGED IN THE
CHASE.

London, Feb. 1.—The Lady Smith cor-
respondent of the Daily News reports
that twenty-three British columns
are hunting for Gen. DeWet and says
that the assertion that his capture or
annihilation of the force is only a ques-
tion of time is more justified than ever
before.

to crush the Boers everywhere in March
and April.

The Boers in the field, however, are
surprisingly numerous and well equipped.
It is suspected that they have been re-
inforced by rebels from Cape Colony.

GREAT BRITAIN REFUSES.

To Accept Offer of Dutch Government to
Intervene in South Africa.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, Feb. 1.—A despatch to the
Daily Mail from The Hague says that the
reply of Great Britain to the Dutch peace
overtures was received Friday and will
be published Monday.

It is a polite refusal to
accept the good offices of the
Netherlands. It also refuses to
sanction a Dutch commission visiting
South Africa, to obtain the consent
of Boer leaders in the field to peace pro-
posals.

Although the reply does not close the
door wholly it actually dismisses hope.

The fact that the recent offer of Dr.
Kuyper, the Netherlands Prime Minis-
ter to Great Britain in the interests of
peace lacked authorization, proved fatal.

The Dutch government is greatly dis-
appointed at the outcome.

Fredericton and Oromocto. He sailed
for England on the steamer Garth Castle
this morning, and on his arrival there will
assume his position as surgeon on one of
the steamers plying between Great
Britain and the West Coast of Africa.

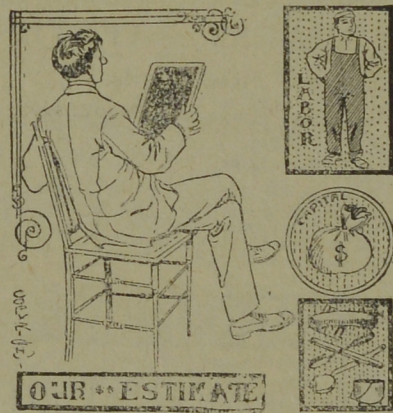
