COMPROMISE EFFECTED.

San Francisco, Aug. 28.—There will be no contest over the estates of either Charles L. Fair or his wife by Mrs. Fair's relatives.

Mrs. Harriet E. Nelson, mother of Mrs. Fair, on behalf of herself and her children, has relinquished for a sum in cash, all claim against the estates of Fair or his wife. The attorney interested would not disclose the amount paid, but it is said to be \$500,000.

THE HIBERNIAN CONVENTION.

Session Closed With a Drive and Banquet.

Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 27.—The A. O. H. convention held a late session last night, but it was chiefly taken up with private business and the regular routine work.

The committees reported this morning and discussion on the reports occupied this session and part of the afternoon session.

The audit committee on the secretary and treasurer's report stated that the former officer had received in assessments for the support of the provincial board \$475.50, expended \$391.07 and paid the treasurer \$84.43.

The treasurer at last report had \$64.50; he since received \$84.43, a total of \$148.99; expended \$65; balance on hand \$83.99. The number of members is 1,074.

The committee on provincial laws reported that taking into consideration the late date at which the new constitution was received and the limited time at the disposal of the members of the convention they recommended it be referred to the provincial officers to revise, that they place copies of the same in the hands of

the county presidents within two months, that in future any changes to be desired in the provincial laws be submitted in writing to the secretary 15 days before convention; that the convention in session can make any changes to provincial laws by a two-thirds vote.

The committee on the standing of the order recommended that the new ritual be adopted when possible; that one or all of the provincial officers visit each branch every half year; that each division should organize a ladies' auxiliary; that the county board should meet every six months.

These reports were adopted.

This afternoon the delegates enjoyed a drive to the principal points of interest in the town and suburbs.

The concluding session was held tonight after which a banquet was tendered to the delegates by the local branches.

MARITIME BAPTIST CONVENTION.

Officers of Y. P. Union Elected for Current Year.

Yarmouth, N. S., Aug. 28.—At the opening of the convention yesterday a motion was passed that the secretary of the convention write to the joint amalgamation committee of Kings and Dalhousie informing them of the adverse decision of this convention in regard to Acadia and college federation.

The committee on the twentieth century fund stated that Rev. W. T. Stackhouse had consented to labor in conjunction with Rev. W. F. Adams for three months in raising the remainder of the \$50,000 required, asking only for travelling expenses during that period.

The report for home missions for New Brunswick was read by Rev. B. N. Nobles.

The meetings of the Maritime Baptist Young People's Union have been interesting. The number of delegates from the local societies is not large, but those present are determined to push their work with renewed vigor. The new officers are as follows: President, Rev. H. H. Roach, St. John; vice presidents, Rev. A. C. Archibald of Middleton and Mr. Ross Bethune of Charlottetown; secretary treasurer, Rev. W. J. Rutledge of Port Maitland; editor, Rev. W. L. Archibald of Lawrencetown.

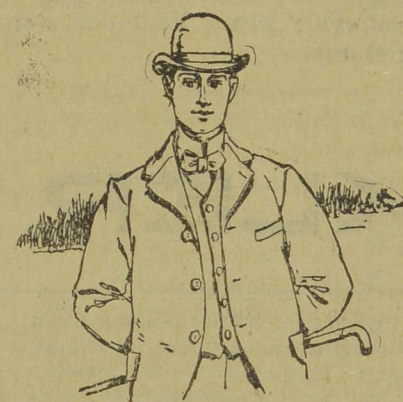
