USUAL ORDER REVERSED.

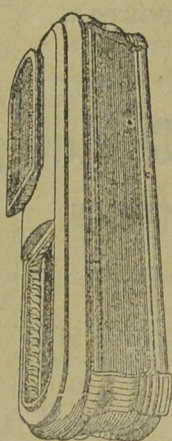

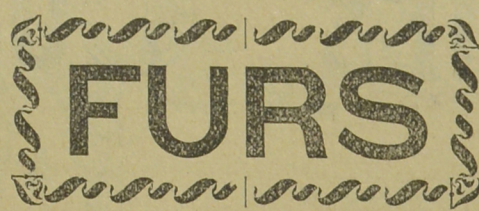

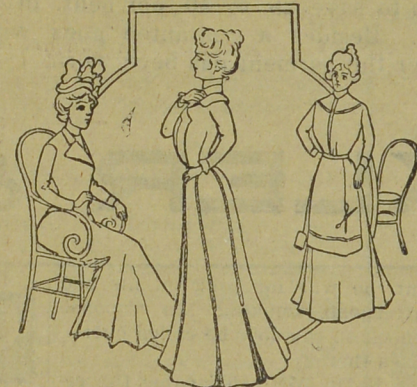
