THE LEEDS BYE-ELECTION.

Though the Liberal party in England has shown some aggressiveness of late and is highly encouraged by the result in North Leeds, Lord Rosebery evidently does not share the belief that it is on the high road to ousting the present administration. A late speech of his before the Liberal league is reported as follows:

"Lord Rosebery, in the course of a lengthy speech, dilated upon the recent by-election for members of the House of Commons to represent North Leeds. The speaker characterized the North Leeds verdict as having more significance than any single election since the late Mr. Gladstone was first returned from Midlothian, and as almost a vital blow to the prestige of the government. Yet Lord Rosebery warned his hearers that fifty such elections as that of North Leeds might not turn out the party in power. It showed, however, that the nation was beginning to look dispassionately at the government's record in domestic legislation, and with a cooler temper than it could during the South African war. The Liberal party had suffered a long period of sterility, said the speaker. It had been going through the valley of the shadow of death from want of concentration, and it had been allowing itself to become dissociated from the Imperial aspirations of the nation. The party had suffered by its unfortunate attitude in regard to the Irish question, and until the Imperialist Liberal principles prevailed within it there will be necessity for the continued existence of the Liberal League, which Lord Rosebery said did not threaten internal disunion, but formed a rallying point for others sharing the principles of its promoters."

Fredericton is to celebrate the King's coronation on Saturday and it behoves all citizens to put their shoulders to the wheel and endeavor to make the affair one worthy of the best traditions of the capital city of the province. It is very gratifying to learn that there is a general disposition on the part of our merchants and manufacturers to close their places of business at one o'clock on Saturday.

GOV'T MEETING.

A Number of Important Matters Under Consideration.

ST. STEPHEN WANTS A BETTER ENFORCEMENT OF SCOTT ACT.

A Cecil Rhodes Scholarship Likely to Come to This Province.

A meeting of the local government was held here last evening, all the members being in attendance except Premier Tweedie, who is still in the old country. Considerable business was transacted, some of which was of rather an important nature.

The Imperial Trusts Company was granted a license to do business in the province on condition of their depositing with the Receiver General \$25,000 worth of 3 per cent bonds and paying an annual fee of \$50.

The report of the royal commission on the St. John public hospital was under consideration and it was ordered that a certified copy of the same be forwarded to the chairman of the hospital board for his consideration.

The London Guarantee and Accident Company having purchased \$10,000 worth of provincial three per cent bonds and deposited the same with the government as security, an order was passed for a license to issue to that company to do business here. The government has arranged to have this concern issue bonds to provincial office holders, which will be accepted in lieu of private bonds.

Wendall P. Jones, of Woodstock, was appointed Judge of Probate, pro hac vice in re the estate of Elisha Slipp deceased.

The Herald learns that the government had under consideration a letter from the temperance organizations of St. Stephen, complaining that the Canada Temperance Act is not properly enforced in that town. The letter alleges that fines are collected periodically from offenders under the act, and that they are allowed to continue the sale of intoxicating liquors. It is understood that the government decided to forward the complaint to the police magistrate of St. Stephen and request him to furnish an explanation.

Among other matters dealt with were several smallpox bills from the counties of Westmorland and Gloucester.

The Board of Education met this forenoon, and in addition to transacting quite a large amount of routine business, had under consideration a letter from the trustees of the estate of the late Right Honorable Cecil Rhodes, which was forwarded through Lord Strathcona. The letter asked for suggestions in regard to the qualifications of candidates for a Rhodes scholarship and intimated that one of such scholarships was likely to come to New Brunswick, though no mention was made of this province in the will. It will be remembered that some time ago the government made strong representations to Mr. Rhodes' trustees on the subject, and it now seems that the request of the government, is in a fair way to be complied with. The government expects to finish the business of the session this evening.

Mayor Cochrane, of Montreal, has proclaimed Saturday, August 9th, a civic holiday in that city.

Storks Are Queer Creatures.

The owner of a house near Berlin found a single egg in the nest of a pair of storks built on the chimney and substituted for it a goose's egg, which in due time was hatched and produced a gosling instead of the expected storkling. The male bird was thrown into the greatest excitement by this event and finally flew away. The female, however, remained on the nest and continued to care for the changeling as though it were her own offspring.

On the morning of the fourth day the male reappeared accompanied by nearly 500 storks, which held a mass meeting in an adjacent field. The assembly, we are informed, was addressed by several speakers, each orator posting himself on the same spot before beginning his harangue.

These deliberations and discussions occupied nearly the entire forenoon, when suddenly the meeting broke up and all the storks pounced upon the unfortunate female and her supposititious young one, killed them both and, after destroying the polluted nest, took wing and departed and were never seen there again.

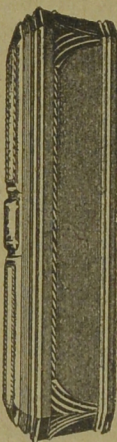
