We have much pleasure today in publishing Hon. J. P. Burchill's excellent speech on the budget.

It is reported at Ottawa that the government have under consideration the despatch of another contingent of soldiers to South Africa.

Dr. Borden it is said will introduce an amendment to the militia act providing for an increase in the permanent corps, and the extension of the time for annual militia drill from twelve to nineteen days.

President Roosevelt is said to be taking lessons from a master proficient in the Japanese art of wrestling, probably in preparation for the onset of our Mr. Gourley when he goes over to capture Washington.

It looks as though Atlantic standard time would be adopted in this province. It is an hour ahead of Eastern Standard, and the same as the present Halifax time. The C. P. R., and I. C. R., are likely to adopt it, and Premier Tweedie has introduced a bill in the legislature to the same end.

The Sun's report of Mr. Fleming's speech makes Dr. Pugsley's travelling expenses for last year \$7,200 instead of \$200, an addition of \$7,000, and Mr. Farrie's expenses are run up to \$6,000 instead of \$600. Whether the errors are due to carelessness or maliciousness, the Sun does not explain.

The Sun editor who is at Ottawa writing "distilled poison" to his paper regarding the government, has made the discovery that Mr. Blair is losing the respect of his own party. Mr. Scott has been endeavoring to instil that kind of nonsense into New Brunswick people for a great many years, but has not met with any degree of success. As a matter of fact the Minister of Railways never enjoyed a greater degree of popularity among his friends in the province than he does at the present time.

A news item in the papers says that Dr. R. C. Weldon with his family is to spend the summer at Penobscue, Kings Co. What has happened to the professor's summer residence in Albert county? Some years ago when he desired to cultivate Albert in a political way he took up farming in that county, but evidently his two successive defeats for the Commons has driven him out of the constituency. Is it to be assumed that Dr. Weldon is now looking for political honors in Kings? That county has lost a former illustrious summer resident and amateur farmer Hon. G. E. Foster, who seems to have no further use for his estate at Apohaqui.

An opposition report is to the effect that another session of the legislature may be held before dissolution, and it is

stated in an opposition newspaper that at a government caucus "the gang almost unanimously favored the idea." This is of course a very dignified way of putting the matter. "The gang" applied to a political party comprising five-sixths of the legislature is neither decent nor dignified. Regarding another session, there is no reason in law or constitutional practice why another session might not be held before the present legislature is dissolved. Its term does not expire until June, 1903, and it rests with the government to say whether the House shall meet again before another general election. No doubt Mr. Hazen and his friends would welcome another session before being called upon by the people to retire from public life.

I. C. R. COLLISION.

NOT MUCH HOPE.

London, March 24.—There is reason to believe that Lord Kitchener in an interview with Mr. Schalkberger agreed to withdraw the banishment proclamation, issued in September, if Gen. Dewet and other Boer leaders surrendered.

There is little disposition here to view the negotiations hopefully. Officials express doubts of the ability of the Acting president and civilian leaders to induce such men as Generals Dewet and Delany to surrender.

London, Mar. 24.—Broderick announced in the house today that the acting president of the Transvaal asked for permission two weeks ago to pass through the British lines and confer with Steyn regarding peace. The announcement was received with cheers.
