Sold at Public Auction at
the Crown Land
Office.

THE SALE HAD A LARGE AT-
TENDANCE.

But Competition Was Not Very
Keen.

TOTAL PROCEEDS WILL BE IN EX-
CESS OF SEVEN THOUSAND
DOLLARS.

The sale of fishing leases at the Crown Land office at noon today was well attended and was one of the most successful ever held here. Among these in attendance were the following:

Deputy Surveyor General Flewelling officiated as auctioneer, and explained at the outset that the amount paid for a lease was to be the amount of the rental per annum, even if it exceeded the upset price. The result of the sale was as follows, the upset price being named in each case:

N. W. Miramichi R. from Little Falls, below the Clark Grant up to lower line of lot A, \$100—to Miramichi Fish and Game Club at upset price.

N. W. Miramichi R. from Upper line of lot C, up to Flaherty Brook, \$75—to Miramichi Fish and Game Club at upset price.

The price paid is for the right to fish with rod only for salmon and trout on the above named streams. The keenest competition was for possession of the Nepisiguit River, which was sold in three sections, and the total amount realized was \$565 in excess of the upset price. The streams for which no bids were received will probably be advertised and sold at a later date.

The surveyor general has decided to reserve the Upsalquitch river and branches for the use of tourists and others, to whom the right to fish will be sold at a small fee per rod.

The total proceeds of the sale amounted to the respectable sum of \$7,610.

A five year lease of the Big Hole on the Northwest Miramichi, now held by Mrs K. Quigley, of Newcastle, was sold by Auctioneer Stockford to Jacob Weidman for \$275 per annum.

THE RELIGIOUS CENSUS.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—A bulletin is issued by the census department giving the religions of the people. The number of specified denominations and sects is 142, embracing a population of 5,326,716.
